Bible Reading

Psalm 55 v. 1 - 23

New International Version (NIV)

For the director of music. With stringed instruments. A *maskil* of David.

- 1** Listen to my prayer, O God, do not ignore my plea;
- 2** hear me and answer me. My thoughts trouble me and I am distraught
- 3** because of what my enemy is saying, because of the threats of the wicked; for they bring down suffering on me and assail me in their anger.
- 4** My heart is in anguish within me; the terrors of death have fallen on me.
- 5** Fear and trembling have beset me; horror has overwhelmed me.
- 6** I said, "Oh, that I had the wings of a dove! I would fly away and be at rest.
- 7** I would flee far away and stay in the desert;
- 8** I would hurry to my place of shelter, far from the tempest and storm."
- 9** Lord, confuse the wicked, confound their words, for I see violence and strife in the city.
- 10** Day and night they prowl about on its walls; malice and abuse are within it.
- 11** Destructive forces are at work in the city; threats and lies never leave its streets.
- 12** If an enemy were insulting me, I could endure it; if a foe were rising

against me, I could hide.

13 But it is you, a man like myself, my companion, my close friend,

14 with whom I once enjoyed sweet fellowship at the house of God, as we walked about among the worshippers.

15 Let death take my enemies by surprise; let them go down alive to the realm of the dead, for evil finds lodging among them.

16 As for me, I call to God, and the LORD saves me.

17 Evening, morning and noon I cry out in distress, and he hears my voice.

18 He rescues me unharmed from the battle waged against me, even though many oppose me.

19 God, who is enthroned from of old, who does not change - he will hear them and humble them, because they have no fear of God.

20 My companion attacks his friends; he violates his covenant.

21 His talk is smooth as butter, yet war is in his heart; his words are more soothing than oil, yet they are drawn swords.

22 Cast your cares on the LORD and he will sustain you; he will never let the righteous be shaken.

23 But you, God, will bring down the wicked into the pit of decay; the bloodthirsty and deceitful will not live out half their days. But as for me, I trust in you.



Church at Home Thought

The Green Bear wanted a friend, but he was rather choosy. He declined the offer of a girl Deer - well, boys don't want girls as friends - and so he set off to visit Master Pig who, he was told, might be able to help him.

Just when he was feeling hungry, an Owl flew by and dropped an apple for him to eat. **'What a kind, friendly thing to do,'** thought the Green Bear. The meeting with Master Pig was a disaster. Pig ran a business called **'Rent – A – Friend'** and offered the Green Bear ten minutes of his valuable time before going to meet some more important people. Feeling hurt and rejected, the Green Bear met the Owl once more.

He explained, **'I want a friend. Someone to play with,'** and was delighted with Owl's response: **'Can I be your friend?'** Perhaps with Owl as a friend the Green

Bear would learn that it is all right to have a girl Deer as a friend and the damage done by the Master Pig's rejection would be healed or repaired - we are not told.

Warts and all

The Green Bear (a Scripture Union video) has helped generations of people to explore biblical principles and to identify issues that get in the way of true friendship. The issues include prejudices such as sexism and racism, fear of what others might think, ambition and a desire for status.

Like the Green Bear, however, most of us find Owls who do not want to be the fair - weather variety of friend. Even so, they and we are not perfect, and so we have to accept each other warts and all.

Behind some of the descriptions of Paul's journey (**Acts 18**) are issues of relationship and friendship.

Read Acts 18 v. 6 – 11 and imagine that you were there. Feel the tensions. What were the issues that affected Paul's friendships in Corinth? The time came for him to leave. He travelled with friends (**Acts 18 v. 18**), rather than alone, before visiting several cities where he encouraged new friends who were believers. Encouragement of each other is a vital part of Christian friendship, and is something we can all do.

When friends let us down

One of the most painful experiences in life must be when a close friend lets us down. To be let down by those we have trusted with our innermost secrets leaves us with a range of emotions that are hard to handle, similar to those of intense grief.

The Psalmist in **Psalm 55**, our passage for today, felt overwhelmed, worn out and abandoned (**Psalm 55 v. 1, 2**).

When he discovered the cause of his problem (**Psalm 55 v. 3**) he was crushed, terrified and could not control his body - it would not stop trembling (**Psalm 55 v. 5**). He wished that he could escape (**Psalm 55 v. 6, 7**) and then, perhaps, the problem would go away. But it would not. The Psalmist's reactions were typical of those who suffer the shock of betrayal (**Psalm 55 v. 12, 13**).

David, the Psalmist, called down judgement on his enemies, who had influenced his friend (**Psalm 55 v. 15**) and perhaps he remembered times when he too had let down those close to him (**Psalm 51; 2 Samuel 23 - 39**). Then he turned to a period of quieter prayer and told God what it was like having a close friend who gave mixed messages (**Psalm 55 v. 20, 21**). Although he continued to struggle with the pain of what had happened to him (**Psalm 55 v. 23**), he found some peace (**Psalm 55 v. 22**) when he decided to leave his troubles with the Lord.

In a sense he 'let go' of what had happened to him and set out into the future, still bearing some of the pain but able to move on. To get to

such a point often takes time, but the pattern for all of us who may feel betrayed will be similar.

First comes the raw emotions that we must own. We might talk, write, cry or work them out of our system through physical activity. Only then can we reconsider what happened, think more clearly and decide what the most constructive and creative actions might be. God is there to support us through the pain of it all.

Have you ever been let down seriously by a friend? The Bible is realistic about the fact that even between best friends (**and even between Christian friends**) there are going to be times of difficulty in the relationship.

As we have said **Psalm 55 v. 1 – 23** shows David crying out to God with brutal honesty about a friendship that has turned sour. What can we learn from the passage then about how to handle friendships?

FRIENDSHIP UNDER PRESSURE

What is your reaction when a friendship seems to be breaking down?

ILLUSTRATION

A safari expedition in Kenya went horribly wrong and left two friends running for dear life as a lion gained on them little by little. Suddenly one of them stopped, kicked off his boots, reached inside his rucksack for a pair of trainers and put them on.

'You're mad: shouted his companion. 'Not even a pair of running shoes will make you run faster than a lion.' 'I don't plan to run faster than the lion; panted the man as he caught up again. 'I just plan to run faster than you.'

Do you wish you could walk away from the situation and escape the hurt (**Psalm 55 v. 6 - 8**)? Do you find yourself working out how you could get even (**Psalm 55 v. 15**)? Do you poison your friend's reputation under the guise of '**Christian honesty**' (**Psalm 55 v. 21**)? Or is your reaction to take the whole problem to God with

straightforward trust (**Psalm 55 v. 22**)?

All these attitudes are found in extreme form in this Psalm, but it is the final one which has the last word (**Psalm 55 v. 23b**). When we pray to the Lord about the betrayal of a friendship, we are praying to One who has known and understands the very real pain that it involves (**John 13 v. 21**).

FRIENDSHIP THAT ENDURES

Proverbs calls on us to cultivate friendship even when it is not easy to do so. For most of the world, one of the advantages of friendship is that one can immediately walk away from it when the going gets tough - unlike family or marriage ties. But the friendship of a Christian can stand out from that of others by demonstrating:

- That it is not dependent on getting something in return, so it can include the lonely or the poor (**Proverbs 19 v. 4, 6, 7**)
- That old arguments do not have to be dragged up again

and again (**Proverbs 17 v. 9**)

- That the gossip of other people cannot unpick it (**Proverbs 16 v. 28**)
- That it can survive storms as well as fair weather (**Proverbs 17 v. 17**)

FRIENDSHIP WITHOUT PRETENDING

Christians need friends both inside and outside the church. Having friends who share our faith is a wonderful thing, because there is a shared foundation to the relationship. However, it is vital not to use our shared faith in Jesus as an excuse for treating friends in a way which presumes on their good nature.

For David, the fact that they used to worship together only served to increase the hurt of his spoilt friendship (**Psalm 55 v. 13, 14**).

And it is also important not to seek friendship outside the church with the sole intention of evangelising people, because the

lack of integrity in that damages their perception of Christian love (one of Job's laments was that the only interest his friends took in him was to get him back on what they saw to be **'the straight and narrow'**, Job 6 v. 14).

Ecclesiastes 4 v. 10 - 12 reminds us of the great value of friends who, without ulterior motives, are there for each other faithfully through good times and bad!

Questions to Ponder



- Who do I associate with the most in my church? Why do I associate with these people more than others?
- If God loves me enough to send Jesus to die for me, how can I learn from his example in the way I love others around me?
- What type of friend do I want to be?

Intercessions

COMMUNION

AT HOME

Today is a Sunday that we would normally share communion together, if we were in the church building. This is a time when we would come together remembering the love and sacrifice that Jesus made on the Cross for our sins and forgiveness. As we still can't gather together physically as the body of Christ in order to share communion together, we are still able to gather spiritually as His church in our homes in order to share of the bread and the cup together.

We can do this by getting a small glass of red juice (*fruit juice, squash etc.*) and a small piece of bread and 'sharing these elements' at a time that is convenient to you.

(Normally as a church we will do this during the service at about 11.30am.)

Our normal practice would be to say these words:

For I received from the Lord what I pass on to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, (*you might like to pray at this point*) he broke it and said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me.' (*this is the time to eat the bread*). In



the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me.' (*now is the time to drink the cup*). For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

1 Corinthians 11 v. 22 - 26

If you would like to do this today with us, then please do so, and may the Lord's richest blessings be with you today.
