BACK TO THE FUTURE

With apologies to those who adhere closely to the church year... Also, apologies to friends at Belmont Road and COR (*Grovehill*), for whom this letter is less relevant.

After his baptism, Jesus spent 40 days in the desert. This period of him withdrawing from the spotlight may well have been longer – I'm not sure anyone was counting at the time.

It would seem that such an interlude must have been a massive inconvenience to Jesus. Surely he would have been itching to get on with his God-given mission. 'Action stations!' – perhaps the advice Prince Philip might have given him. Instead, the Spirit led him into the wilderness. Sometimes an extended period of reflection is more of a priority. Jesus sought his Heavenly Father, in order to put the enemy in his place and so that he could get the proper focus for the mission that lay ahead.

Without wishing to claim too much for my sabbatical (24 May-31 August), there are some similarities with my withdrawal from the spotlight. Carey's deacons have just agreed a revised mission statement for our church, which will be discussed at our May Church Meeting. So, I am hoping that while I may not be at Carey for the next three months, we can still 'together' be reflecting on the mission that lies ahead of us. A

mission that will no doubt be shaped by the various new flats that are being built and occupied just over the road. Flats, which are being marketed towards younger couples, who are perhaps also thinking about starting a family. Like any church, Carey faces a particular challenge in 2021 about how to effectively share the good news of Jesus with the younger generations. I am hoping we will be able to establish three small groups to begin brainstorming over this summer about our three-fold mission statement, revolving around nurturing faith, sharing faith and reaching young people.

As well as spending time myself reflecting on this challenge, I will also be doing a historical study. I will be researching the role William Carey and his two sisters played in the West Indian Sugar boycotts of the 1790s. This was an important and popular protest to the slave trade, which is a reflection of today's Fairtrade and Trade Justice movement. This may seem quite academic and irrelevant to some. However, I hope to show, in a small way at least, how the mission of God, for Baptists of both yesterday and today, embraces a positive engagement with political issues.

There is much to ponder in 2021, particularly as the world continues to combat Covid 19 and its many variants. And as we continue to wake up to the enormous challenge of our current climate emergency. So, I look forward not only to having a break from usual duties, but also to returning with a renewed sense of mission and purpose.

'I turned around to see the voice of the one speaking to me... When I saw Him, I fell at his feet as though dead. Then (Jesus) placed his right hand on me and said, "Do not be afraid. I am the First and Last. I am the Living One. I was dead, and now look, I am alive forever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades".'

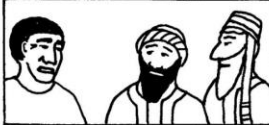

Luke 7: 1-10, Matthew 8: 5-13

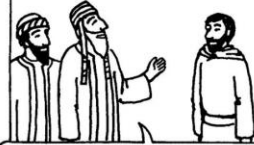
When the Romans invaded Israel, they used soldiers to keep order. For the centurion in Capernaum it was more than just a job...

But he says he understands authority and knows you have it. You only have to say so and his servant will be healed

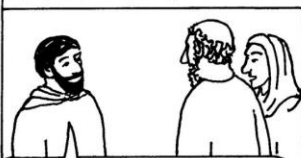

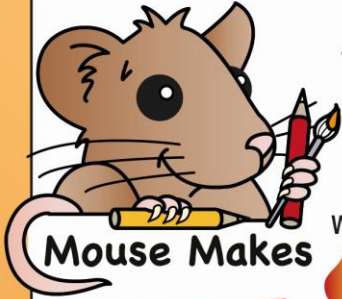

BANGLADESH, BHUTAN AND BRONZE AWARDS

The BBC2 series entitled 'Climate Change – Ade on the Frontline' has already been an eye-opener. In the programme, presenter, Ade Adepitan visits many countries to see for himself the extent of our current environmental crises. The second episode in this series, shown first on Sunday 18th April, has served to give more of an insight into the country which Carey's BMS Mission Partners, the Proctors and the Lynches know well, Bangladesh.

At present an estimated 100 million people live in the world's largest delta - the Ganges. This part of Bangladesh is a vast area of very fertile land. But for everyone living here, their homes and livelihoods are already threatened by rising sea levels and by increasingly frequent and more violent tropical storms. The capital, Dhaka, has doubled in size to a population of over 20 million in just 10 years, largely because of people having to leave their ancestral homes in the delta.

Thankfully, the episode also showed some good news: a project to plant more mangroves to combat coastal erosion. However, it was made clear that this is only a temporary measure to buy time. Ade's next stop was the Himalayan kingdom of Bhutan, one of the world's few 'carbon negative' countries. Bhutan is also being affected by global warming in different ways. But Bhutan prioritises Gross National Happiness over the western economic measure of GDP (Gross Domestic Product). And Bhutan continues to implement a massive national strategy of planting suitable trees and creating more woodland. As Ade put it, 'One of the easiest and cheapest ways to combat global warming is to plant trees', although this always needs to be done in ways which understand the variety of natural habitats, including meadows, wetlands, peat moors, for example.

April's online environmental forum for Dacorum, 'Woodlands for All', is pointing us in a similar direction. And I hope this forum will encourage new thinking and prompt the particular steps needed for Dacorum to grow more local woodlands, for the benefit of our planet and also to benefit local wildlife and local residents.

One last, small piece of good news. Carey has just this month been able to apply for a 'Bronze Award' as an Eco Church. This award has yet to be confirmed by A Rocha, so watch this space. This reminds us that Carey's God-given mission includes responding to our environmental crises. It also reminds us that there are further steps we could make to become an Eco Church with a 'Silver Award'. This journey, like the earthly mission of Jesus, will require us to be focussed, to persevere and to be 'wise as serpents, gentle as doves'.

THIS MONTH 100 YEARS AGO

We continue our series about church life at Marlowes Baptist Church in the 1920's. In the June issue of Marlowes Notes in the Baptist Home Messenger magazine (which I have now found that we have after all – it is the May and July ones that are missing) the minister, T. Percy George, writes about the equivalent of our Central Baptist Assembly (see page 15):

'My dear friends,

The great event of the past month was the Annual Meetings of the Herts Baptist Association held at Boreham Wood. Marlowes was well represented, every delegate appointed being present. The morning session was devoted to business, election of officers etc. At that session my year of office as President ended, and I was glad of the opportunity of publicly expressing my appreciation of my own Church, in setting me free one Sunday a month to visit other churches. Some very kind things were said about the service I had rendered, but I quite recognise, had it not been for your sympathetic co-operation, I could not have given so much time to the work... The sermon of Dr. Dakin on the fellowship of his sufferings was a great utterance and I am sure that the message created a profound impression.

The afternoon was devoted to a Conference, the subject being "An Intensive Mission as preparatory to a mission to the outsider", opened by our new General Superintendent, the Rev. F.J. Walkey. His message was most searching, stimulating and suggestive. It was a scathing indictment of our indifference and the passionate appeal to do the work to which we were called. The conference was well sustained and everywhere there was the indication of a hunger and a craving for richer and fuller life. There is no doubt but what there is an attitude of great expectancy everywhere, and I am convinced myself that we shall soon witness a great spiritual awakening in all our churches. It is impossible to say along what lines it will, but this I know God has not created this anger to disappoint it.... It is for us to create the right atmosphere in our own church, to prepare the way for the working of the Spirit of God and when we are ready and prepared the blessing will not tarry....'

In Memoriam

Rev. George Thos Edgeley passed away on May 2nd, aged 77. Many will remember he is faithful and earnest ministry as Pastor from 1883 to 1893, during which period 262 members were added to the church, some of whom are with us in fellowship still, and others are doing useful work in churches at home and abroad. He was a man of robust character and of considerable ability as a preacher, being most successful as an evangelist in many centres. His services were in constant demand by Churches in our country and elsewhere. He had lived in retirement for some years: his last visit to Marlowes was when taking part in the funeral service of Rev. Walter Stapleton in 1906. Mrs. Edgeley survives, with two sons and three daughters, to whom we extend our sincere sympathy.
