Bishop of Peterborough announcement

The next Bishop of Peterborough will be the Right Reverend Debbie Sellin
Downing Street has announced today. Bishop Debbie, currently Bishop of Southampton,
will be installed at a service in Peterborough Cathedral in early 2024.



‘The role of Diocesan Bishop is not completely new to Bishop Debbie who has been the acting Bishop of Winchester following the retirement of Bishop Tim Dakin in February 2022.

One of Bishop Debbie’s priorities has been to encourage parishes to thrive. In her current diocese there is a rich variety of landscapes from urban to very rural, coastal and the new forest and she is dedicated to helping parishes in all these different contexts be the best they can be; guiding them through vacancies, celebrating those who are flourishing and coming alongside those who would welcome additional support.’

Our new Bishop, part 2—the full text sent to clergy this morning

Today (28 September), we welcome Bishop Debbie and her husband Paul to the Diocese starting at [William Law Primary School](#) where Chris Dalliston, Dean of Peterborough, will formally welcome her and she will lead a short harvest reflection. Following this Bishop Debbie will visit [Grange Park Church](#) in Northampton to see how Christians from different denominations have been working together to impact their communities. Later, she will visit [The Chapel Gym](#) in Corby, to see how the gym changes lives for the better by offering the potential to improve both physical and spiritual health. The day will conclude with evensong at [Peterborough Cathedral](#).

It was important to Bishop Debbie to announce her appointment among young people. Her own commitment to faith developed at a Crusaders youth group and she started full-time ministry as a Children and Families Worker. Debbie was brought up in a rectory surrounded by church life, but a clear calling to ordained ministry came later in life, being drawn initially to work in a caring profession which resulted in a career in NHS Management.

It was whilst Bishop Debbie was caring for her own young family that she felt a definite call to ministry which deepened over time, leading her to begin her ordination training in 2004. Whilst serving in parish ministry she also took on the additional role of Area Dean, something that gave her a wider perspective and introduced her to the workings of the Diocese. From these roles, she was appointed Bishop of Southampton, something she describes as ‘exciting and daunting at the same time’, but felt ‘a deep sense that this was what God wanted for me that only grew stronger and stronger’.

During her time as Bishop of Southampton, Bishop Debbie has been involved in a variety of roles. As non-executive chair of Love Southampton, her passion for seeing social transformation through ecumenical outreach and community engagement was enhanced. She has also been an Ambassador of the Rose Road Association which provides direct care for children and young adults with complex physical and learning disabilities and support for their families.

The role of Diocesan Bishop is not completely new to Bishop Debbie who has been the acting Bishop of Winchester following the retirement of Bishop Tim Dakin in February 2022. In an unsettled environment, Bishop Debbie spent time listening and understanding the challenges that people were facing, whilst working towards building reconciliation and unity.

One of Bishop Debbie’s priorities has been to encourage parishes to thrive. In her current diocese there is a rich variety of landscapes from urban to very rural, coastal and the new forest and she is dedicated to helping parishes in all these different contexts be the best they can be; guiding them through vacancies, celebrating those who are flourishing and coming alongside those who would welcome additional support.

Welcoming Bishop Debbie to her new role, John Holbrook, Bishop of Brixworth said; ‘I am thrilled that Debbie has agreed to serve as the next Bishop of Peterborough. She has great experience of bringing unity and identity to a large and diverse diocese, a heart to champion young people and support those at the margins of society and a mission to see our parishes and their communities thrive’.

Debbie is married to Paul, a Professor of Physics, and has two grown-up sons. In her rare downtime she enjoys cooking, reading and craft, spending time with family and taking coastal walks.

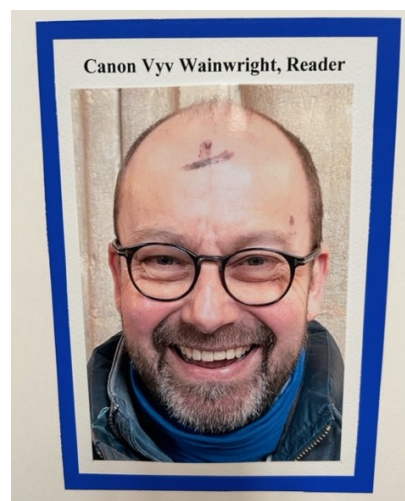

Crochet Twiddlemuffs (Sensory Bands)

Your finished muff (or band) can look something like this, or however you wish it to be.



Size Three crochet hook

Same quantities of yarn as the knitted version

Using 2 strands of DK or 1 strand of Chunky yarn chain 22 sts, so the 1st st to join circle.

1st row: 2ch, counts as 1st st, 1 st into each st to end, so to top of 1st to finish (22 st's)

2nd row: 2ch, counts as 1st st, 1 st into next st to end, so to top of 1st to finish (22 st's)

3rd to 20th row: As 2nd row

These rows complete the lying.

You are now crocheting the outside. As with the knitted version I use a strand of DK and one of my fancy yarns. Again, I use the hand method of design and 1 row of treble make one band.

21st row: 2ch, 1 st into same place (this forms an increase to 24 sts in each row), 1 st into each st to end, so into top of 1st to finish (24 st's)

22nd row: 2ch, 1 st into next st to end, so into top of 1st to finish.

23rd to 40th row: As 22nd row, changing yarns as necessary.

41st row: As 22nd row, so into top of 1st and finish off to finish.

You now have a 40 row Twiddlemuff tube.

Sew your twiddlemuffs to the lying as necessary, and add any extra decoration to the outside.

Tuck the lying into the outside and crochet the two ends together to finish.

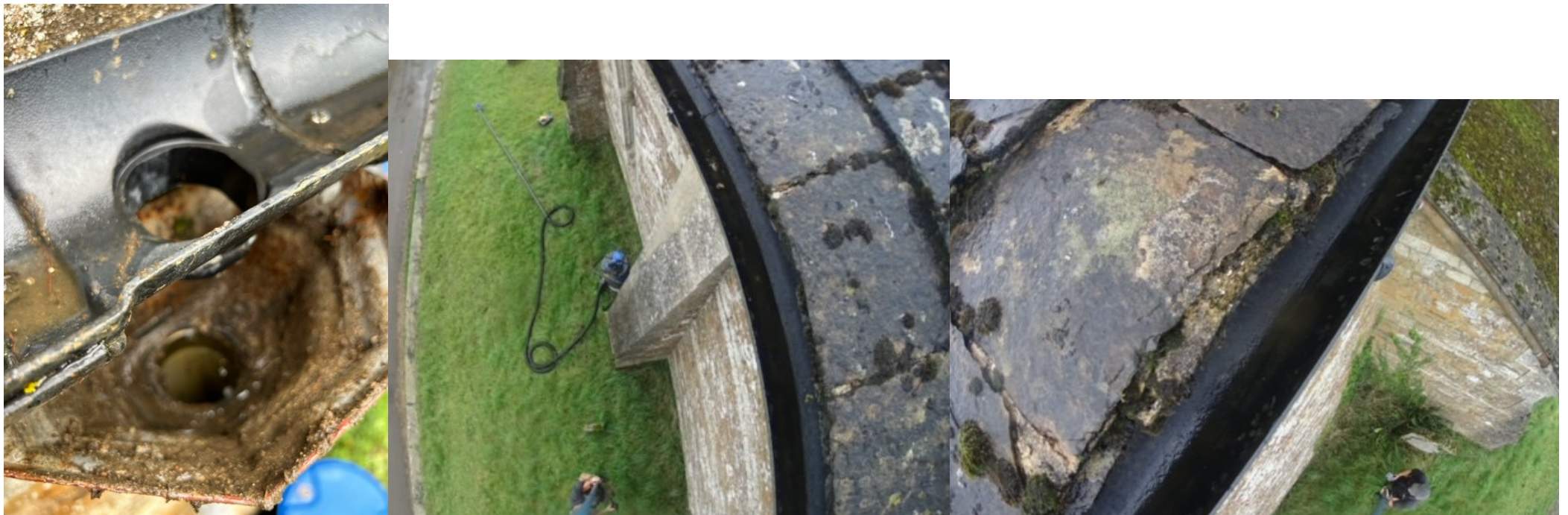

Rutland Foodbank 2022-23 — Headline Statistics

- In the last 12 months 776 emergency food parcels have been provided by Rutland Foodbank to people facing hardship.
- During 2022-23 the foodbank supported 264 households across Rutland by delivering 7-day food and toiletries parcels.
- Of concern, 413 of the parcels were provided to 150 households which included children.
- Nearly 20% of the parcels were provided to those in work but struggling to afford food.
- As part of the Trussell Trust Network the Rutland Foodbank is calling for a stronger social security system that ensures we can at least cover life's essentials, like food, heating, and clothes.
- New annual figures from the Trussell Trust show that almost 3 million (2,986,203) food parcels were given out across the UK network – more than ever before.

New figures released by Rutland Foodbank have revealed that 776 emergency food parcels were provided to people facing hardship last year – with 413 of these going to households which included children.

The Rutland Foodbank has seen a 10% increase in the number of emergency food parcels distributed compared to last year. There was a 17% increase in the numbers fed compared with last year (2021-22).

2,123 children and adults were fed. The number of children fed (954) was up by 19% and adults (1,169) up by 16% compared with the previous year. This is the greatest number of people the Foodbank has ever provided food for.

We received 38,379 kg of donations from individuals, local charities, local community groups, our village donation boxes and local businesses. We distributed 35,315 kg to clients in 776 parcels.

Ingredients for 44,583 meals were distributed.

The levels of need were particularly acute in winter. January was the busiest ever month for the Foodbank since it opened, with 85 emergency food parcels prepared by volunteers.

Since 1st April we have provided ingredients for over 18,000 meals. Despite an anticipated and completely understandable drop in food & toiletry donations we are still able to pick & pack 7-day packs and continue our delivery service across the whole county. We are able to manage our stocks by buying in items we distribute regularly and which we find we short of from time to time. Fortunately, we have some very generous supporters who help fund this via regular giving. It would be remiss of me if I didn't acknowledge our amazing volunteers, supporters and donors who together are helping fellow Rutland residents who are struggling at this time. A wonderful community effort. **Thank you all!**
