PARISH LETTER

Cray Valley Parish Lent Course

This year's Lent course took place, like most things, on Zoom. A virtual meeting of community, formation, laughter and discussion centred around the themes of the spectacular Les Misérables. Over the course of Lent, we used the characters from Les Mis to provoke thought on issues such as compassion, penitence, forgiveness and forgetting - such easy words, such hard themes.

We started every session together in a big group, watching clips from the film and discussing the theme for the session. We then broken into 'rooms' to discuss the themes more closely. These rooms allowed us to explore ideas and to listen to each other's thoughts before we all got back together to share what we had discussed.

I personally enjoyed looking at the role of the Bishop and the impact of his compassion and forgiveness that seeps through the whole story. After we watched the scene where Val Jean is captured, having stolen all of the church's gold and silverware, and returned to the Bishop - who pretends he gave Val Jean all of the stolen items and reminds him he 'forgot' the precious candlesticks (which he then hands over) - Mother Jessie asked what would we do if, in the middle of a service, she gave someone all of our church's precious items? Effectively asking, do we value the tangible items of our church more than the needs of its people? It certainly got all of us thinking.

A common and re-occurring thread of the Lent course was forgiveness but with an emphasis on forgetting. We all agreed that we should forgive (despite how impossible this sometimes feels) but forgetting – surely, we don't need to forget! Actually, the Bible is full of examples that tell us that we should forgive AND then let go completely by forgetting. Forgetting is an essential part of forgiveness! As you might imagine, this led to a lot of discussion about how challenging this is, as well as a fun race to find a relevant Bible quote about forgetting that Reverend Jane came up trumps with! What was the impact of this course? Perhaps a reminder of how important it is to take time to wrestle with challenging issues, to laugh together, to agree and disagree, to learn from and with each other. A reminder that we all struggle to forgive and we all struggle to forget – that we are all imperfect but that we do have a perfect example in Christ Jesus. A reminder that, like the characters in Les Misérables, we are all on journeys of transformation, facing events that change us for a while or irrevocably, sometimes for the better and sometimes for the worst, but that as Christians, we never need face the journey alone.



Give Thanks appeal raises funds for vulnerable people


Christian Aid's latest appeal, which enables people to give thanks for their Covid-19 vaccine and help others in crisis across the world, has raised $\pm 130,000$.

y Dad was Michael William Dowlen (1920 - 2004). He told me that his very first memory of childhood was being taken to the window of his parents' house in Streatham to see soldiers



driving the buses during the General Strike of 1926. In the attached photo dated 1948 my Dad is running away from me! Oh dear - was I that awful? Another amusing thing to note is that in every photo of my Dad in the 1940s and 1950s he is always wearing a jacket and tie or blazer and tie (his stripy school blazer more often than not) – even on what I presume must have been hot summer days. At weekends he would allocate generous time to play cricket with me in the park or the back garden; or on wet days or during winter a cricket board game 'Stumpz'. My favourite cricketer was Peter Parfitt of Middlesex and England. In our games I always was Middlesex or England and Dad was fobbed off with being one of the other counties or countries. Looking back on it I realise that my Dad was generous because somehow or another in our games Peter Parfitt always scored the most runs and my team always would win!

GARDENING TIPS

S pare 20 mins a day to walk round garden. Pinch the dying flowers off daffodils and allow 6/8 weeks to die back naturally, enabling a better flower next year.
