

PARISH LETTER

ay 23rd was the feast of Pentecost – the birthday of the church. Pentecost marks the end of the Easter season and celebrates the day on which the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus' disciples in wind and flame. They were filled with



the Spirit's gifts and burst out of the room in which they had been hiding to speak the Good News of Jesus to the crowds in Jerusalem. The people were gathered from many nations and all heard the Good News in their own language as the Spirit gave the disciples the ability, at that time and in that place, to speak in that way.

The disciples had been locked down since Jesus' death, venturing out on a few occasions but still living in fear of the Roman and Jewish authorities. The Holy Spirit, which Jesus had promised them at his ascension, gave them hope, courage and the words to say to share God's love with all gathered in the city. Then they followed Jesus' instruction and took the message out wider and wider to the ends of the earth. Without the Spirit's help the account of Jesus' life would never have been passed down to us.

As we continue with the gradual lifting of lockdown, we might be fearful too; worried about how and when to venture out, who to meet and who to let into our homes, how close to let anyone get and who to keep away from, when our regular activities will restart and when they do how different they will have to be?

Like the disciples the Holy Spirit to help us. I can't promise that we will be able to speak many languages, but the Spirit gives us, like the disciples, the gifts we need at the time we need them. St Paul tells us that the fruit we show when the Spirit is within us are these – love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control – and I'm sure we could all do with some help to demonstrate some of these.

The feast of Pentecost may be past, but we can ask the Holy Spirit to come and help us today, maybe not in wind and flame, but with peace and God's love. Then, like the disciples we can become part of God's story and keep on spreading the Good News of Jesus, so it reaches to the ends of the earth or even just around the corner. *Jessie*





St James the Least of All

On getting to church at a social distance

The Rectory St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

Since your parishioners mostly live in an area of half a square mile, where their only concern in getting to church is whether to take the underpass, or to risk a dash across the ring road, you may have little understanding of the problems our folk have in travelling our long country lanes to church, especially as we are

keeping our social distance from each other.

Several parishioners have decided that they can't possibly share cars even with their own spouses, as in their 15-room homes they have successfully (and in some cases, happily) avoided each other for months. So the lane



outside the church has filled up each week with Mercedes nudging Audis, and Land Rovers easing in between Bentleys.

Others arrive on horseback. But they are careless about leaving their horses to graze in the churchyard, and I have had to remind them twice that flowers in memorial vases are not fodder. The horses do help to keep the grass down, but unfortunately our verger now objects to standing outside during Mattins, holding the reins of half a dozen horses. He says it is not part of his job description, which only confirms my view that there is entirely too much fuss these days about having job descriptions at all.

Major Crompton's devotion to his new sit-on lawnmower has inspired him to travel to church on it. Since he is unable to uncouple the mowing apparatus, the tarmac on his two-mile drive is acquiring interesting patterns. His drive at two miles per hour along narrow lanes means he arrives leading a procession of cars with drivers given the opportunity to exercise the Christian virtue of patience.

Mrs Pendleton, on the other hand, leads a small but select group from the Mothers' Union who are all keen cyclists. They all arrive on a whoosh of fresh air, their hair in total disarray, but with pink cheeks glowing with health. Nobody in church minds sitting near them, as anyone who can manage to peddle an old three-gear bicycle up the hill to our church is most unlikely to be sickening for anything.

Finally, of course, the majority arrive on foot, having negotiated fields, stiles and assorted cattle on the way. The countryside may well praise God, but one does wish they wouldn't bring quite so much of it into church.



The story behind the HYMN: 'Lord, for the years'

Here are some of the verses of the hymn which can be found in full on the internet.

Lord, for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way, sought us and saved us, pardoned and provided: Lord for the years, we bring our thanks today.

Lord, for that word, the word of life which fires us, speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze, teaches and trains, rebukes us and inspires us: Lord of the word, receive your people's praise.

*Lord, for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim; Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name. ...

This well-loved hymn was written in 1967 by the Revd Timothy Dudley Smith, who later became Bishop of Thetford. He later confessed: "I wrote it on a train when I was very pressed for time. I'm thankful if something I write gets picked up, but I suspect anyone who does something in a rush later regrets that they didn't find time to apply the sandpaper a bit more!"

Dudley Smith had been asked to write a hymn for the centenary service of the Children's Special Service Mission, now Scripture Union, in St Paul's Cathedral. His commission was to write words that could be fitted to Jean Sibelius's *Finlandia*, as it was to be accompanied by an orchestra with this tune in their repertoire. And so – 'Lord for the years' was written.

Dudley Smith need not have worried about lack of time – his lyrics were a 'hit' in the cathedral on the day and went on to become so well-loved that George Carey chose the hymn to be sung at his consecration as Bishop of Bath and Wells, and then again later, in 1991, on his consecration as Archbishop in Canterbury Cathedral.

The hymn continued to be widely sung and loved, until in 2002 Timothy Dudley Smith was asked to write an extra verse for it so that it could even be sung around the time of the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Many of the words in the hymn are true for the Queen herself, as she celebrates her 95th birthday this month. She does indeed thank God 'for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way'...

And so indeed the 'extra' verse added for the Queen has also held true:

Lord for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim, Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name.

GETTING BACK TO NATURE IN CHURCHYARDS

hurch communities and their visitors are being urged to join a week-long survey this summer of the creatures and plants that inhabit their churchyards.

Church land, which is often uncultivated or undeveloped for generations, is regarded by conservationists as a likely refuge for precious and endangered plants and other wildlife. Put together, it is



estimated to cover an area similar to a small national park.

The "Churches Count on Nature," between 5 and 13 June, is a citizen-science event in England and Wales in which people are asked to report the animals, birds, insects, or fungi they find. The data will then be collated on the National Biodiversity Network.

The organisers, the conservation charities Caring for God's Acre and A Rocha UK, and the Church of England and the Church in Wales, hope to create links with schools and wildlife groups, and encourage people who might never have been in a churchyard to discover the quiet space they offer, especially in urban areas.

The Bishop of St Davids, Dr Joanna Penberthy, said: "Churches Count on Nature is an important and imaginative project open to all denominations. At the end of Genesis chapter one, we are told 'God saw everything that he had made and behold, it was very good.' Churches Count on Nature gives us a chance to see a little of what lives in our part of God's acre, and I do encourage you to get involved."

The Bishop of Reading, in Oxford diocese, the Rt Revd Olivia Graham, who is a member of the Church of England's Environmental Working Group, said: "We read in the Gospels that Jesus was deeply rooted in his natural surroundings, the rhythm of the agricultural seasons, the lilies of the field, the birds of the air.

"As Christians, we notice and celebrate the beauty and rich diversity of God's creation. And from our thankful hearts flows our deep desire to care for and protect it."

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

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GARDENING TIPS

Did you know "No Mow May" is a campaign by the Plant Life charity which asks garden-owners to avoid mowing their lawn in the month of May? (This will also work for the month of June). Let flowers bloom until the end of the month, providing a feast of nectar for our hungry pollinators.

A six-foot long row of Ox-eye daisy have self-seeded behind a new daff. border in our lawn. This feels like a good opportunity to experiment with a wildflower space. I've dug up spent daffodils and heeled them in spare ground to die back. I bought a box of wildflower seed bombs and spaced them along a dug and weeded area and watered well, covering with mesh to protect bombs.

REMEMBERING 'YOUR HUNDRED BEST TUNES'

During the funeral of H.R.H. Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, my thoughts roamed to the long-running BBC radio series 'Your Hundred Best Tunes'. It was broadcast on Sunday evenings and its host Alan Keith continued as presenter until his death aged 94 in 2003. The programme had started in 1959 on the old Light Programme. Richard Baker took over until the series was cancelled in 2011.

What was the thought association that occurred to me during the funeral ceremony? On my mother's side I have many family ancestors whose professions were maritime. The family originated from Portsmouth and moved to Dover and Folkestone. So, I have always been especially stirred by the 'naval' hymn:

Eternal Father, strong to save, Whose arm doth bind the restless wave, Who bids the mighty ocean deep Its own appointed limits keep; O hear us when we cry to Thee For those in peril on the sea.

Alan Keith played many hymns on his Sunday night programmes and I always hoped to hear that one. It is wonderful word-poetry. I'm sure that in my childhood hymns like this instilled in me a love for verse and rhyme. The best-selling author Philip Pullman has echoed this experience, explaining that his all-consuming addiction to words stemmed from his singing hymns at school and coming across such wonderful lines as *pavilioned in splendour and girded with praise*. He declared: 'You are not sure what it means. But it feels lovely and it sounds great. It is there to be enjoyed.' *Jerry Dowlen*

THANKS TO ALL KNITTERS

would like to thank all the knitters who have been supporting King's College Hospital in their hat knitting campaign. We still require hats but would now also like to ask for knitted squares for the babies. These squares can be put in the cots next to the baby with breast milk on them so that they feel close to their mothers when separated. The knitting pattern is below.

ABBREVIATIONS

k = knit k2tog = knit 2 together st(s) = stitch(es) yo = yarn over

Cast on 5 stitches. Knit 1 row. Next row Knit 3, yo, k 2. Next row Knit 3, yo, k 3. Next row Knit 3, yo, knit to end.

Repeat last row until the sides measure 10cm.

Next Decrease Row Knit 2, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k to end. Repeat last row until there are 7 stitches on needle. Next Decrease Row Knit 2, k2tog, k2tog, k to end. Bind off remaining 5 stitches.
