



As well as reviewing Jesus' life and claims, the book explains questions such as why He was at odds with religious authorities; the influence of Roman occupation; the interactions with contemporary resistance movements; and the prominent role of women in His disciple community.

QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE – A CELEBRATION OF FAITH AND SERVICE – SAVE THE DATE!

A four-day Bank Holiday from 2-5 June 2022 will mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee next year. This is an amazing opportunity to bring our communities together for the celebrations, which end on Pentecost Sunday.

HOPE Together, the Church of England, the Methodist Church, Biblica and other key partners are currently planning for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, with a specially commissioned souvenir book for us to give away; a new anthem for communities and churches to sing; a '70 Acts of Service' community challenge for us to adapt to use together with churches and other organisations in our area, and lots of resources for children and schools.

Rachel Jordan-Wolf, HOPE's executive director said, "Churches are in an ideal place to bring communities together for national celebrations. We have the tables, chairs, crockery and PA systems – and we love making cakes!

"It is so appropriate that the nation and Commonwealth should be celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on the same weekend as Pentecost, the day when the church celebrates the gift of God's Holy Spirit."

The anointing of God's Holy Spirit was central to the Coronation and, in preparation for the day, The Queen prayed: 'Come, Holy Spirit, and daily increase in all of us, and in me, thy humble servant, thy manifold gifts of grace; the spirit of wisdom and understanding; the spirit of counsel and strength; the spirit of knowledge and true godliness, and fill us, O Lord, with the Spirit of thy holy fear, now and forever. Amen.'

The beautifully illustrated souvenir book to be published for the celebrations uses rarely seen prayers, which the Queen prayed in preparation for the Coronation, and highlights how God has answered those prayers over the past seven decades.

The 'Platinum Jubilee Celebration of Faith & Service' will build on the successful partnership facilitated by HOPE Together, which enabled local churches to bring their communities together for the Diamond Jubilee and the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations.

Over the next year HOPE will provide churches across the country with all the resources and ideas they need to run a great all-age community event that will celebrate the Queen's 70 years of faith and service. We can plan to get our church involved, invite our community to the party, and round off the weekend with a special guest celebration service for Pentecost.



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TRACING YOUR FAMILY HISTORY

hurch of England parish registers were first kept in 1538. But experts warn that it's difficult to trace your family history that far back. Records unfortunately were lost or destroyed during the Civil War and the Commonwealth. Unless you belong to the nobility your tree will likely start, at best, from the reign of Charles II (1660 – 1685).

In that case my Aunt Dorothy did remarkably well in the pre-internet 1970s to research the Dowlen family as far back as 1638. She traced them to be dwelling in mid-Sussex by the River Adur that runs 22 miles inland from Shoreham-on-Sea towards Burgess Hill and Ditchling. For many years I assumed that these Anglo-Saxon ancestors of mine lived off the land in agricultural or farming occupations. But when I delve a little deeper, I learn that the Sussex Weald wasn't simply farmsteads. There was chalk-quarrying (to make lime for builders); there were forges and furnaces (especially pig-iron); there were trades in brick, charcoal, timber and glass. So maybe my ancestors earned their living in one or more of those occupations.

The River Adur was an important commercial conduit. Steyning was a large Saxon port. So, my ancestors might have been shipbuilders? - or were employed loading cargoes on and off boats? Unless I can book a ride with Doctor Who for time travel in the Tardis my questions will never be answered!

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GARDENING TIPS

ontinue to water runner beans peas and tomatoes regularly - pay special attention to tomatoes as irregular watering can result in fruit splitting. Use slug pellets sparingly in conjunction with grit and copper bands and check they are pet and child friendly.



Stake tomatoes as necessary and feed as soon as flowers appear - following instructions on packet for correct amount and regularity.

Continue to deadhead daily to prolong flowering on roses and other annuals and/or perennials.

THANKS TO ALL KNITTERS

would like to thank all the knitters who have been supporting King's College Hospital in their hat knitting campaign. We still require hats but would now also like to ask for knitted squares for the babies. These squares can be put in the cots next to the baby with breast milk on them so that they feel close to their mothers when separated. The knitting pattern is below.

ABBREVIATIONS

k = knitk2tog = knit 2 togetherst(s) = stitch(es)yo = yarn over

Cast on 5 stitches. Knit 1 row. Next row Knit 3, yo, k 2. Next row Knit 3, yo, k 3. Next row Knit 3, yo, knit to end.

Repeat last row until the sides measure 10cm.

Next Decrease Row Knit 2, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k to end.

Repeat last row until there are 7 stitches on needle. Next Decrease Row Knit 2, k2tog, k2tog, k to end. Bind off remaining 5 stitches.

Photo of squares knitted by Myra. You can see they are knitted starting at a corner so increase and decrease like a diamond.
