

The Sanctuary Stained Glass Windows

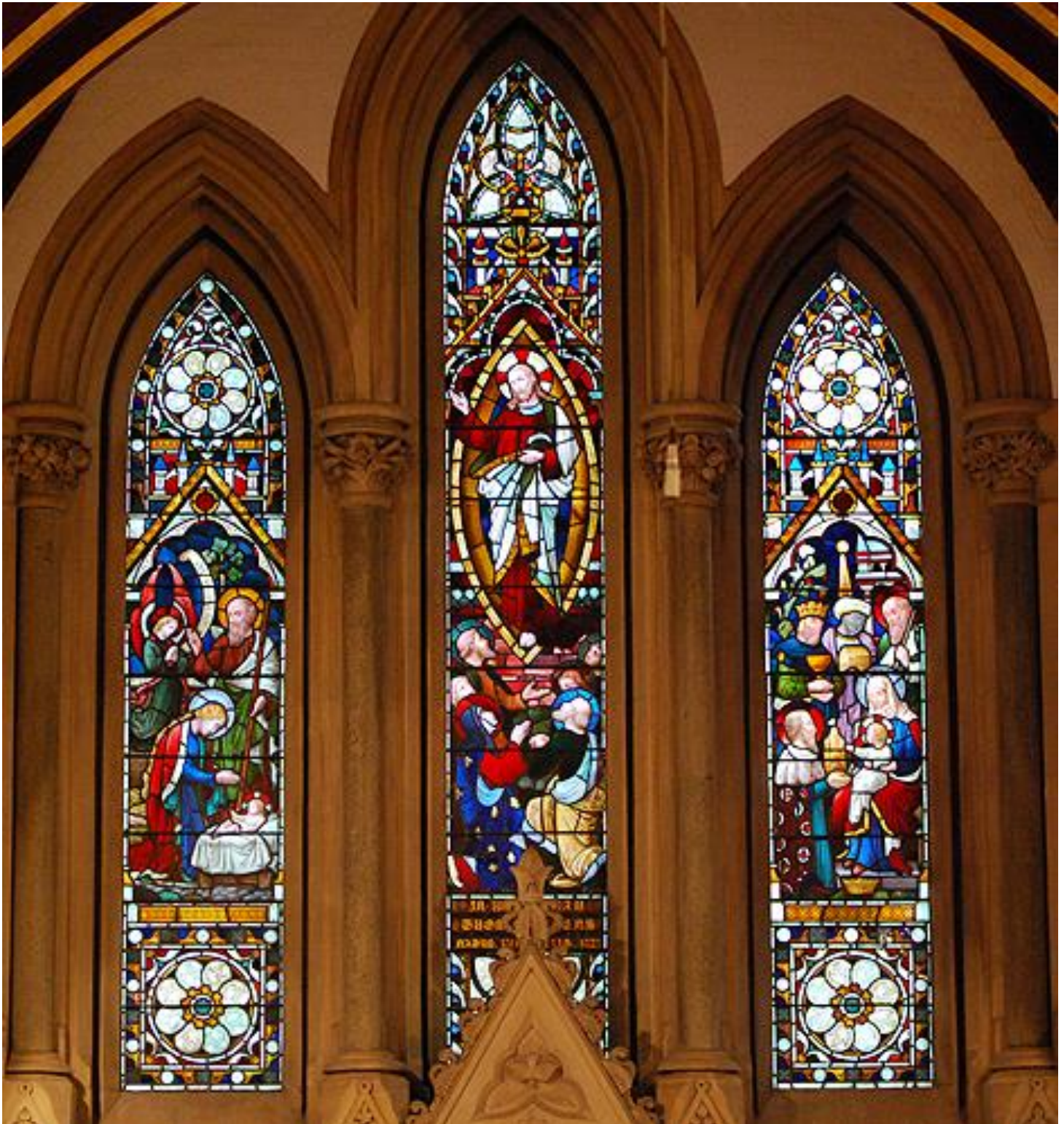
The Great East Window above the high altar in the sanctuary (1875)

Left panel: 'The Birth of Jesus'

Central panel: 'The Ascension'

Right panel: 'The Visit of the Magi'

The inscription reads: *"In memory of Thomas Emeas born 1814-died 1875".*



The Sanctuary Stained Glass Windows 2

"The (original) chancel, with its admirably proportioned arch and triple lancet windows, gained vastly in effect from the introduction of stained glass of geometrical pattern to the eastern window, an offering from the Revd John Fitz Wygram. The late east window will be removed to the west end of the church and a new beautifully stained window by Baily of London, of three divisions (one the gift of G T Ewens, chapel warden) will take its place. The alterations are again from the designs of the architect of the church, W. Wigginton. The estimated cost is £700 exclusive of the window, of which the Rev. F. J. Fitz Wygram has donated £400." South side of the sanctuary left panel: 'The Last Supper'

The inscription says: "Love One Another"

South side of the sanctuary right panel: 'Stoning of Stephen'

The inscription says: "Faithful unto Death"

On the south side of the sanctuary there is a sedilia (two stone canopied seats) and within this space are two stained glass windows. There is a bronze plaque running beneath both windows inscribed: "To the honour and glory of God, and in loving memory of Emma Bligh Christmas 1881". Mrs Bligh was Henry Bligh's first wife.
