**Easter Services.**—Good congregations have marked our services throughout Lent, and we are glad to say they were specially noticeable throughout Holy Week, Good Friday, and on Easter Day. The Easter decorations, we think were more than usually effective, and the hearty and musical rendering of the services seemed to assert a still further improvement of our Choir. The number of Communicants was about five more than last year; at the 7 o'clock service there were 29, at the Choral Celebration at 8 a.m. 66, and at mid-day 60, in all 155.

## In Memoriam.

We cannot let this issue of the Parish Magazine go forth without some mention of the loss we have all sustained in the death of our good old friend, Gen. W. F. HOPKINS, C.B.

A brave and honoured soldier, a true gentleman, an earnest Christian, his upright manly figure and handsome face with its snow-white locks will be missed by many, who, though personally unacquainted, yet liked to see his kindly look and meet him in their walks abroad. To his family and his friends his loss must needs be irreparable. Our heartiest sympathy is offered to those who are mourning his present separation from us.

**Confirmation.**—The Lord Bishop has intimated his intention of adhering to the date fixed by his predecessor for the Confirmation to be held in our Church, Friday, July 17th, at 3 p.m. Intending candidates should lose no time in giving in their names to one of the parochial clergy, as the classes will be commenced forthwith.

**Our Church Organ.**—Our Easter Day offertories were given to a fund which has now been started for the repair of the organ. The organ itself is a very good instrument, but somewhat old-fashioned in its mechanical structure, and very much out of repair. A thorough overhauling of the working parts, and in some cases their re-arrangement, cannot longer be delayed; and some additions in the shape of new stops would add very much to the effectiveness of the music. To do all would probably require an expenditure of at least £150, but the more urgent and necessary portion of the work could probably be carried out for £60 or £70. For this, contributions, which may be sent to the Vicar, Churchwardens, or Organist, are asked. It may not be known to some of our readers that this organ originally stood in St. Peter's Church, Eaton Square, which of late years has been the centre of a great work, principally carried on by Dr. Wilkinson, the present Bishop of Truro.

**Easter Vestry.**—The Vestry for the election of Churchwardens and other parish business was held on Wednesday in Easter Week, and about a dozen of the parishioners were present. Messrs. W. C. B. Hall and A. Storey again accepted office as Vicar's and People's Churchwardens. Their accounts were satisfactory, and showed that although the offertories have not yet risen to the desired average, all necessary expenditure had been met during the past year. However, the amount handed over to the Schools and to the Poor was much reduced, and it is hoped that during the present year the deficiency may be repaired. Messrs. H. P. Bowling, T. Bowling, A. Cutfield, J. Singleton, G. H. Barlow, G. Dowsett, and Capt. Isdell were elected as Sidesmen, and Mr. Chandler was again appointed Sexton and Verger.
