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Easter Services.—Easter Sunday was a bright and joyous day. The church was very tastefully decorated, and thanks to the large presents of Aruns and other lovely flowers, was rich in the choicest beauty which our gardens can produce. The services, as usual, were well attended, and there was a large number of communicants, over fifty of whom attended the 7 a.m. service. The Choir mustered well and strong. There were over forty both morning and evening. All of them with the organist seemed intent on making the service as good as a large body of voice, well trained and kept together, could make it. Their efforts were very successful, and the anthem was especially well and carefully sung. We can only record the externals,

but we trust that our bright decorations, our hearty services, our large congregations, were but the outward and visible signs of much inward spiritual light and joy in the hearts of many worshippers, that there were many to whom the Resurrection Day conveyed its full message of welcome to Eternal Life.

Confirmation.—A confirmation was held by the Bishop of Marlborough in Hampton Wick church, on Friday, March 28th, when about sixty were presented for confirmation, of whom twelve were from this parish.

Tower and Spire.—The total cost of the building was £2447, of this £2014 has been paid, and £97 more has been promised, so that there still remains a deficit of £336 to be made up. Towards this contributions are earnestly solicited either in the shape of cash payments or else as promises which will only become payable when the whole is subscribed. It is hoped that by a united effort this much to be desired object may soon be obtained, so that we may be free to direct our best energies to the wished for, but still absent, clock.

Industrial Exhibition.—An Exhibition for the encouragement of home industries has been arranged to be held in the Vicarage Gardens on the occasion of the Hampton Hill and Hampton Horticultural Show in July. The Vicar, Messrs. H. P. Bowling, W. C. B. Hall, J. Singleton, and A. E. Jones, will act as a committee to carry out the scheme, and Mrs. FitzWygram has undertaken the duties of Treasurer and Secretary. The full schedule of prizes will be advertised in Horticultural Society's Report. In the meantime we would state that there will probably be three classes. Class I. for Men. (Division A)—Works in wood, stone, &c. (Division B)—Needlework, knitting, shoemaking. Exhibitors not allowed to take prizes for work in their own trade, but may show if not for competition. Class II. for Boys. (Division A)—Works in wood, &c., frames, boxes, &c. (Division B)—Needlework, knitting. Class III. Open Class for any article made by exhibitor. All exhibits must be entirely the work of the exhibitor. Entrance fee 2d. each exhibit. The exhibits of those who may be willing to give them will be sold, and the proceeds given as a subscription in the name of the exhibitor, to the Tower and Spire Fund. Some prizes have already been offered, and we would take this opportunity of inviting offers, as quickly as may be, from those who may be willing to make up the deficiencies in the prize list. Easter Vestry.—Nothing very new transpired at the Annual Vestry which was held on Wednesday, April 9th. The accounts show that the present amount of the offertories is barely sufficient to meet the current expenses of the services, and the churchwardens wish it to be known that very urgent repairs are deferred for want of funds. Mr. W. C. B. Hall was again nominated churchwarden by the Vicar, and Mr. A. E. Storey was also re-elected. The sidesmen appointed are the same as last year, viz., Messrs. T. Bowling, H. P.
