Our Church Hymns.—The Choir is now supplied with the New Edition of "Hymns Ancient and Modern," containing a large number of additional hymns. The new hymns will come into use on and after Whitsun Day.

Confirmation.—A confirmation was held at Hampton Church on Monday, March 28th, at 7 o'clock in the evening. About 80 candidates were confirmed, most of them belonging to Hampton. There were five from Hampton Wick and five from Hampton Hill. The names of the latter were Leonard Coe, Alice Mary Lush, Lettès Agnes Jessie Rait, Jessie Mary Wright and Anna Warwick.

Our Schools.—Both Boys' and Girls' Schools are at present labouring under a disadvantage, as it has been found impossible to fill up the staff in either school. The difficulty is probably in great part due to the extra requirements of the Education Department, and the consequent number of failures of those who sat last year for the Queen's Scholarship Examination. We will ask our subscribers to expect a visit from one of the collectors during the course of the month. We will remind them that we more than ever need their support to enable us to carry on the Voluntary Church Schools. The so-called Free Education does not relieve, in the smallest degree, that part of the funds which has been hitherto supplied by voluntary effort.

The Members' Subscriptions amounted to £8, of which £3 10s. was paid for materials, 10s. for postage, &c., and the balance, £4, was sent to head office. The work parties commenced on Friday, October 9th, 1891, and continued each fortnight till April 8th, 1892. Members have made 265 attendances. Various lectures and readings have been given on the different aspects of women's work in Africa and India. Two large boxes of work were packed and sent off to the office of the Association, 19, Delahay Street, Westminster, containing 16 frocks, 31 pinafores, 3 aprons, 7 shirts, 9 petticoats, 30 articles of babies' clothes, 2 boys' suits, 5 wraps, &c., 1 pin tray, 1 box, 4 balls, 4 scrap screens and 9 scrap books.

Easter Services.—After a very cold Lent we have succeeded to a fine Eastertide. Our services were bright and joyous and the congregations large. The choir mustered in full force both morning and evening, there being 40 or upwards on each occasion, and the singing was thoroughly hearty. The decorations were confined to the chancel and baptistery, both of which had been prepared with much taste.

Easter Vestry.—Only a few attended this year. We wish more would make a point of coming to support the Churchwardens in transacting the business of our parish Church. The accounts presented a better appearance this year than last, and it appears that the offertories have increased considerably during the year. The Vicar again nominated Mr. W. C. B. Hall as his Churchwarden, and Mr. A. E. Storey was re-elected Warden for the Parish. The Sidesmen were all re-elected: Messrs. A. Bowling, H. P. Bowling Trevanion, G. H. Cremer, G. Dowsett, J. Embleton, G. Evans and V. C. Griffiths. A resolution of condolence with the family of the late Mr. W. Blanchard, with an expression of appreciation of his bequest of £500 to the poor of Hampton Hill, was passed unanimously.
