MY DEAR FRIENDS,

First let me express the wish that the New Year may be a happy and prosperous one to all the readers of our Magazine, above all that the blessing of Almighty God may rest upon you.

The past month has been full of parochial events, but there is only space to make a very brief reference to each.

The Sale of Work proved a greater success than we had ventured to hope for. The room presented a very attractive appearance, thanks to the energy and the good taste of the many willing workers, a list of whom will be found below. The stalls were fixed by Messrs. Singleton and Sons, without charge. The Rural Dean, the Rev. R. Digby Ram, performed the opening ceremony, and helped us by his warm, encouraging words. The attendance from the opening to the close was very good. It was evident that everybody meant to make it a success and the result was most satisfactory. The Treasurer's account will be found below, from which it will be seen that the proceeds, after the payment of all expenses, amounted to over £60. Mr. H. C. Garrett, the Secretary, was as usual indefatigable, and we are greatly indebted to him.

The Provident Club money was paid out on the 11th ultimo, and amounted to £450, with interest. There is not space for the list of subscribers this month, but I may add that the amount received was ample, and left a substantial balance in hand.

The Dramatic Performance on the 9th ultimo secured a crowded attendance, and the efforts of those taking part were thoroughly appreciated. The next Entertainment is fixed for Monday, the 27th, when we hope the audience will be equally large.

I am glad to say the Offertories for Foreign Missions, on Advent Sunday, were an improvement upon last year, and on Christmas Day, the Offertories for the Poor Fund were very good. I have also received additional contributions for the latter, which are very acceptable, as the balance was previously on the wrong side.

The attendance at the Parish Tea was good and a thoroughly pleasant evening was spent. The tables were for the most part presided over by the District Visitors.

The Mothers' Supper followed on the 27th ultimo. Unfortunately the weather prevented several who were entitled to come from being present. An excellent entertainment was provided by the kindness of friends.

On the 19th ultimo we had an Entertainment in behalf of the Day School Prize Fund, promoted by Mr. Basey and the other teachers. The room was not full, no doubt owing to the fact that the month

was rather over-crowded with similar events. Perhaps the most interesting feature of the evening was the Action Songs by a number of girls belonging to the Band of Hope, who had been prepared by Miss Eastland, and gave very great delight. A group of infants under the direction of Miss Gass gave great pleasure in a similar way. We are greatly indebted to all who kindly assisted.

The Church Decorations for Christmas were again exceedingly well done. There were many helpers and they worked hard, and the result was most pleasing in every way. The service on Christmas morning was exceedingly bright, reflecting great credit on Mr. Dawkins and the choir.

I am glad to say that the number of Communicants was 207, which is an improvement upon last year.

## THE DAY SCHOOLS.

*Extracts from the Report of H.M. Inspector.*

BOYS' SCHOOL.—“The boys are under very fair control. . . . Improvement has been made in Map drawing, and the higher grant is recommended for Geography.

The Apparatus in the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Standards should receive most careful attention.

The Premises have been greatly improved by the addition of a new class-room, and great allowance has been made for the interruption by building operations in reporting on the work of the School.”

GIRLS' SCHOOL.—“The girls are quiet and orderly, and much of the work is nicely done. . . . The problem in the 4th Standard and upwards is attempted with greater success. Recitation has been well prepared, needlework is good, and I am able to recommend the higher grants for English and History.”

INFANTS' SCHOOL.—“Order as a rule is good and the School is in a creditable state of efficiency. . . . Recitation is nicely said, and both needlework and drawing are highly creditable.”
