Below you will find the Report of the Diocesan Inspectors respecting our Day Schools. I am quite sure it will be read with interest and pleasure. Year by year the "Report" has improved, and, although there is a higher standard to aim at, the point reached is highly satisfactory.

The Evening Continuation School for boys and youths recommences this month, those intending to attend should commence at once.

A large number of subscriptions for the Schools have been received. The year closes this month, so those who have not paid are asked to be kind enough to do so at once.

The Bible Class for Young Women, under the care of Mrs. Graffy Smith, has recommenced, and is held at the Eastbank Mission Room every Sunday afternoon, at 3.30. Will mistresses very kindly bring this before the notice of their servants, and, if possible, give them facilities for attending.

The Technical Instruction Committee of the County Council have arranged for a course of lessons in Laundry Work, to be given in the Eastbank Mission Room, on Wednesday evenings, commencing October 4th, at p.m. There will be a small charge of one shilling for the whole course.

The S.P.G. Missionary Working Parties will commence on the last Friday in the month. Ladies willing to become members are earnestly invited to attend.

The Band of Hope Meetings will be held on Monday evenings, as usual, commencing on the 16th inst.

A Meeting of the General Committee for the Winter Entertainments will be held on the 2nd inst., when the scheme for the coming season will be formulated.

I hope to arrange for the Annual Parochial Conversazione to be held in about a month's time. This year it is proposed to take the

Victoria Hall for the purpose. The Entertainment will be varied, but amongst other things, I propose to show pictures of Florence and the Higher Alps of Switzerland, and to give some account of my recent holiday. I hope it may be a large friendly gathering of members of the congregation and parishioners generally.

Boys' SCHOOL.—Each Division as a whole: 1st Division, Very Good; 2nd Division, Very Good; 3rd Division, Excellent.

"The School is again classed as very good. Sound and effective work has been done in Division I, and the answering generally was correct and thoughtful. Division II is much improved and is intelligently and faithfully taught throughout. The teaching in Division III is skilfully, accurately and suitably given, and the general result obtained is quite excellent.

GIRLS' SCHOOL.—Each Division as a whole: 1st Division, Excellent; 2nd Division, Good; 3rd Division, Very Good.

"The School has this year passed a very good examination. Division I is excellent: the explanation of the catechism has been clear and definite, and appears to have been fully grasped, and the answering in the Holy Scripture was general and accurate, while the tone of the class, as indeed of the whole school, is very pleasing. In Division II good work has been done, but of rather uneven character; the answering on the Old Testament

was general and correct, but the catechism explanation was somewhat thin, and in the New Testament, while there was some very intelligent and pleasing knowledge shown by some, one would like to see it more generally diffused. Very good and diligent work has been done in Division III, but more attention should be paid to little words in the repetition of the catechism."
