MY DEAR FRIENDS,

Now that the summer is well nigh over, and people are back from their holidays, and days are shorter and evenings longer, it is time to think of the programme of our winter's work. Already the shop windows (which are so kindly lent for the purpose) are displaying bills announcing various coming events, and others will soon follow.

The Evening Continuation School is to commence on a wider basis than usual next week. The Lads' Brigade is to be worked in connection with it, partly to avoid the clashing of evenings. The drilling will take place every Monday evening, the first half of the time being devoted to the recruits, and the second half to the others. Tuesday evenings will be for instruction in Elementary Wood Carving, and Thursday evenings to Mensuration and Hygiene. The drilling will be under the direction of Dr. Dashwood Howard and his officers; the Wood Carving under the direction of Mr. Elsee, assisted by the Rev. E. S. Phillips, Dr. Howard and Mr. Arthur Singleton; while the other subjects will be taught by Mr. Basey, who will also assist on the other evenings. There will be a charge of twopence a week, which will be returned at the end of the session to all who make ninety per cent. of the attendances. It is hoped that a large number of young men and boys will make use of this effort to help them.

The Technical Instruction Committee have arranged for a Dressmaking Class to commence on Wednesday, the 4th inst., at 2.30, at the Eastbank Mission Hall, free of charge.

The S.P.G. Missionary Working Party will commence on Friday, the 19th inst., and will be held every alternate Friday throughout the winter. The members subscribe a small sum, part of which is spent upon materials for the work, and the remainder is sent to the Society. The work is generally sent to Africa or India.

The Band of Hope Meetings will begin again on Monday, the 15th, at Six o'clock, and will be under the control of the same kind helpers as last year. Other assistants will be heartily welcomed.

A meeting of the Winter Entertainments Committee will be held in a few days, when their plans will be formed. This season they hope to have great help from the Zephyr Dramatic Society, which it is hoped will add largely to the interest of the Entertainments.

I hope to arrange for our Annual Parochial Conversation to take place in about a month's time, at the Victoria Hall. There will be tea and a varied entertainment, including lime-light pictures of views on the Rhine.

A large number of subscriptions for the Day Schools have been received through Miss Barnard and Mrs. FitzWygram. The list for this year must close this month. I shall be grateful if any who have not paid their subscriptions will very kindly do so at once.

The monthly Sunday Afternoon Men's Services will be resumed on Sunday, the 14th inst., at Four o'clock. I must ask those who are already interested to help me by making the services known and inviting their friends.
