The three objects of the Society are very simple. I.—To uphold the sanctity of marriage. II.—To awaken in Mothers of all classes a sense of their great responsibility, as Mothers, in the training of their boys and girls (the future Fathers and Mothers of England). III.—To organise in every place a band of Mothers, who will unite in prayer and seek by their own example to lead their families in purity and holiness of life.
