MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The MISSIONARY SALE OF WORK on the 15th of last month met with a very fair amount of success. The net result of it was £28. We are most grateful to all those who gave so much time in assisting.

Everybody has been talking and thinking about the CORONATION for the last few weeks, and now it is all over, but the impressions of it will never be forgotten. The religious character of the ceremony was strongly emphasized, and the crowning of the King was carried out in an atmosphere of prayer, which, I have no doubt, found sympathetic expression in every part of the wide Empire. The local celebration was, I believe, a surprise to us all. The unanimity and the enthusiasm were delightful. The procession was really wonderful as a village display.

It was a special pleasure to me to welcome the members and officials of the District Council to church on the Sunday after the Coronation, and I was glad so many responded to the invitation.

The SUNDAY SCHOOL EXCURSION to Southsea on Tuesday, the 27th ult., proved to be successful in every way. The weather was brilliant, and the Naval Review being still on, there was unlimited interest and delight for every one. The children behaved excellently, and so the work of the teachers was comparatively light and pleasant, and they all carried out their duties so as to give the children the utmost enjoyment. Our numbers at tea were 188.

The Annual Tea and Meeting of the COMMUNICANTS' GUILD is fixed for Tuesday, the 11th inst., in the Vicarage Garden, at 5.30. I

hope the members will all try to be present. After tea there will be games and a short entertainment in the Church Room.

A similar function will take place for the members of the MOTHERS' UNION on Thursday, the 20th inst. This will commence by Service in the Church at 3.30 p.m., after which we shall adjourn to the Vicarage Garden, when an address will be given by a lady from Headquarters. Then will follow the usual tea.

There will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7 a.m. and 8 a.m., and the usual services at 11 a.m., 3.15 p.m. and 7 p.m. Mr. Gilberthorpe will give an Organ Recital at the close of the Evening Service. Gifts of flowers for the decorations will be thankfully received on Monday, the 24th inst.

The Hampton Hill and Hampton FLOWER SHOW is fixed for Wednesday, the 26th, and I understand it is likely to be particularly good in the ladies classes, and also in those of the Cottage Gardeners. It is hoped that all those who have got anything to show will show it, and that all who are interested in the keeping up of such a practically useful institution as this will take care to give it their patronage.
