MY DEAR FRIENDS,

I must say very few words in my monthly letter this time, because of the large batch of ACCOUNTS which has to be printed. It will be noticed that the total sum raised during the year was £937 12s. 8d. This is a very goodly sum and I should like to express my deep gratitude to all who have assisted, especially those who have acted as Secretaries.

The ORGAN RE-BUILDING FUND continues gradually to grow. A large number of the promises have already been paid and we have £160 in the bank. I shall be glad to receive the payment of the outstanding promises as soon as may be convenient, and further promises of assistance will be most gratefully received by the Churchwardens or myself. While speaking of the Organ may I say that we have vacancies in the Choir for one or two good tenors, and I should be glad if any willing to give their services for this good work would communicate with me or with Mr. Gilberthorpe as soon as possible.

As announced in the "Surrey Comet" a fund is being raised for the Presentation of a TESTIMONIAL TO THE REV. E. S. PHILLIPS, I believe it is universally felt in the parish that a suitable parting gift to Mr. Phillips after his long and faithful service is most natural and right, and there is sure to be a general and widespread response to the appeal. Mr. C. H. Carpenter is most kindly acting as Secretary for the fund, and contributions may be sent to him at "Carlingford," Acacia Road, or given to the District Visitors. A meeting of Churchwardens and Sidesmen will be held in a few days to decide upon the form the Testimonial should take, and appoint a Committee to carry out the details.

The ANNUAL MISSIONARY SALE OF WORK has been fixed by the ladies who have attended the working parties for Wednesday, June 12th, from 3 to 6.30 p.m. The admission will be by ticket, price sixpence each, up to 5 p.m., the ticket entitling the holder to tea; after 5 p.m. the admission will be free. Flowers and Plants. 5. Sweets. 6. Paperwork. Tickets for sale are already in the hands of the District Visitors and others. Arrangements are being made by Mr. Phillips for some short, bright, open-air entertainments. Further gifts of articles for sale will be thankfully received at the Vicarage, or by any of the helpers. The proceeds will be given to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the Church Missionary Society, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society.

On Sunday, June 16th, the Annual Collections for Richmond Hospital will take place. The Hospital is much used by patients from Hampton Hill, and we have never enough tickets for the demands. Your generous support is asked for.

The Annual Meeting of the C.E.M.S. was held on the 14th ult. An excellent report was read by the Secretary, Mr. Evans, who also read Mr. Jordan's report on the work in the Churchyard. Mr. Oatway presented the financial statement, which, by a special effort, shewed a small balance in hand. The reports and balance sheet having been adopted, the Vicar was re-elected President, and Mr. Evans and Mr. Oatway were re-elected to their respective offices. The old Committee was appointed with the addition of Mr. Lovell and Mr. Kestin. On Tuesday, June 25th, there will be a Social Evening for members and associates, and the last Men's Service for the Season will be on Sunday, June 30th, at 3.45 p.m.
