MY DEAR FRIENDS,

There are a good many things to draw your attention to this month. First and foremost is the RE-OPENING OF THE ORGAN, which is fixed for Thursday, the 21st inst., when the preacher will be the Venerable H. E. J. Bevan, M.A., Archdeacon of Middlesex, who will also dedicate the Organ. I hope we shall have a crowded Church. The Instrument is now rapidly approaching completion, and I understand it is likely to come up to our highest expectations. After these months of waiting it will be specially delightful to have it in the service. After the opening service a Recital will be given by Mr. Gilberthorpe. Service papers are printed and may be obtained at a penny each at Mr. Makepeace's, from the Organist, and from Miss Barnard, for the benefit of the Organ Fund. We still want £140, and so I hope everybody will try and swell the collection. The offertories on the Sunday following will also be for the Fund. The preacher in the morning will be the Rev. Prebendary Prosser, M.A. We shall have a Meeting very shortly to consider how we had best try to raise the balance yet required. If a "Sale of Work" should be decided upon we shall have to appeal for very widespread support. I hoped we might have been able to raise the whole of the money by means of subscriptions, and while people have been most generous in helping, this has not yet been sufficient. During Advent some well-known Organists have very kindly promised to give Recitals on Saturday afternoons, at 5.30 p.m., commencing on November 30th.

The CHORAL SOCIETY has made an excellent beginning, and upwards of fifty members have joined.

We should like to have at least a dozen more helpers for the WORKING PARTY. This is especially desirable if we are to have a larger "Sale of Work" to embrace the Organ Fund.

Another large event this month will be our ANNUAL CONVERSAZIONE, which is fixed for Friday the 22nd inst. Our well-known friend, Mr. Frederick Chester, has promised to come and he will be accompanied by Mrs. Chester, who will assist him. Mr. Gilberthorpe is also arranging a short Musical programme, so we are sure of a very bright Entertainment. The doors will be open at 7 p.m. Tea, etc., will be handed round. The Entertainment will commence at 8 p.m. Tickets, One Shilling each, may be had at Mr. Makepeace's, and from the District Visitors.

The JUMBLE SALE was quite successful. Miss Poley was assisted by Mrs. Poley, Miss Grace Poley, Misses Watts, Miss Lambert, Mrs. Will Tayler, Misses Anthony, Mrs. R. Smythe, Mrs. Sargent and Miss Isdell. The proceeds which amounted to £7 15s. 6d., were divided as follows:—C.M.S. £3 3s. 0d., S.P.G. £1 1s. 0d., C. & C.C.S. 10/6, Band of Hope, 10/6, Lads' Brigade, 10/6, Nurse Fund, 20/-, Poor Fund, 10/6, C.E.T.S. 5/-, Expenses, 4/6.

There will be a C.E.T.S. meeting on Friday, the 15th, when an address will be given by Mr. Boscombe, of Osterley Park, and pictures will be shown.

There was a good attendance at the last meeting of the C.E.M.S. for the Canada Lecture, and there were a good many present at the last Men's Service. Mr. Brewer has kindly promised to give a lecture on the places of interest and importance on the Thames, and to show us pictures, on Tuesday, the 26th, in the Church Room. This will be exceptionally interesting, and I hope every member will make a point of being present.

The BAND OF HOPE has begun well, and we have a good number of helpers.

The MOTHERS' UNION Service had to be in the Church Room, because of the men being at work in the Church, but we found it very homely and comfortable.

There will be a Special Service of INTERCESSION FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS on Wednesday, the 27th, and on Friday, the 29th (St. Andrew's eve), there will be a Meeting for prayer in the Church Room at 8 p.m., when we hope to have an address on Missions. On Saturday (St. Andrew's Day) there will be Holy Communion at 8 and 11 a.m.

On Advent Sunday, December 1st, we shall have our Annual Collections for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

I am asked to mention that the WAIFS' AND STRAYS' Society are holding their Annual Bazaar at the Caxton Hall, Westminster, on the 20th and 21st. Help is urgently asked for. Miss Brewer is acting as Secretary for the Society in this parish during the absence of the Rev. R. Leslie Morris. The outstanding collecting boxes should be sent this month to Mr. Urch, Northfield, Oxford road, Teddington.
