MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The MEMORIAL WINDOWS to Mrs. FitzWygram and to the Rev. the Hon. H. Bligh were unveiled on St. James's Eve. There was a good congregation and a very suitable service. I believe everybody is pleased with the windows. We are very grateful to Mr. Stutchbury for kindly acting as treasurer to the fund. A long list of subscribers will be found below. It was a great pleasure to us that Mrs. Bligh and Mr. Edward Bligh were present at the dedication, and we were delighted to have Dr. Prendergast to preside at the Organ.

The ST. JAMES'S FESTIVAL was extremely bright and pleasant. The weather was beautiful; the procession of the children as gay and attractive as it has ever been; the decorations at the Church were quite up to their usual excellence; the numbers of friends who gathered in the field and on the lawn were never more; and I do not think we ever had a larger attendance at the evening service, when the Bishop of Kensington preached. We are very grateful to all who sent contributions of flowers and to those who arranged them, and also to those who sent things for the children. I should like specially to mention Mr. Prewett, Mr. Howe, Mr. Hunt, Messrs. Larwood & Matthews, and Messrs. Singleton & Sons, and all the teachers and others who helped at the tea and games.

The final meeting for winding up the FANCY FAIR ACCOUNTS was held in the Church Room, on Tuesday, the 29th ult. Mr. Lowdell, the Secretary, read the financial statement, which is printed below, and the money was apportioned as stated in accordance with the resolution passed at the first meeting when the Fancy Fair was determined upon. I think we all felt that it was an occasion for mutual congratulation, and very hearty votes of thanks were accorded on the proposal of Mr. Percy Hunter, seconded by Mr. Lavington, to Mr. Lowdell, for the splendid work he had done as Secretary; to Messrs. Gray & Hill, Mr. A. B. Gray, Messrs. Singleton & Sons, Mr. Lange, and to all the contributors and helpers for all their valuable help. Some of us felt that we should like to have voted for a larger sum for Missions, but we felt we were bound by the terms of the resolution when the first committee was appointed. The debt on the Organ has now been paid off, and we have £92 in hand towards a Church Hall. It was decided that a meeting should be held in the Autumn to decide upon a scheme.

Now that the memorial to Mrs. FitzWygram is an accomplished fact, we must turn our attention to the one to Miss BARNARD, and Miss Lambert is hard at work in collecting subscriptions. A very good sum has already been received, and Miss Lambert will be glad to receive others as soon as may be convenient.

The Churchwardens ask me to draw attention to the seating in Church, and to ask those who are not seat-holders to speak to them or to the Verger before going into a seat, except the free seats. They will try to keep the seats for seat-holders until the service has commenced. Seat-holders are asked to kindly help them by being there in good time.

The CHURCHYARD presents now, on the whole, a very pleasing appearance, but it might be still further improved if all who come to attend to the graves would be more careful in the disposal of dead flowers, jars and glasses. May I ask that these things be not thrown under the bushes nor left about? The C.E.M.S. Committee are doing their best, but they do appeal to the people to help them.
