It was pleasant to see so many men at the Lecture on Egypt on the 25th ult. in connection with the C.E.M.S. I hope members will make a point of being present at the Corporate Communion on Sunday, the 7th inst., at 8 a.m.

The ANNUAL MEETING of the C.E.T.S. on the 10th ult. was well attended, although it was a wet evening, and Dr. Leeson's clever and scientific address was most valuable. There will be a splendid Entertainment in the Schools by the St. Alban's Nigger Troupe, on Tuesday, the 16th inst., for the benefit of the funds; the tickets will be sixpence and threepence, with a few reserved seats at one shilling.

*Inspectors' Reports on Religious Knowledge, Nov. 1st, 1913.*

BOYS' DEPARTMENT. Present: 182 out of 191.

1st, 2nd and 3rd divisions as a whole, "Excellent."

4th Division—"Very good."

"The School is again quite Excellent. In Div. i, thoroughly earnest and spiritual work is done with high aim and ideal. The boys might be led to think a little more about the New Testament subjects, and the sin of perjury should always be emphasized in explanation of the Commandments."

"All subjects in Divs. ii and iii deserve all the praise I can give. Div. iv. is taught very faithfully and the answering is bright and pleasing, though not quite orderly enough, but the class is far too large."
