Though not a very full Meeting, it was a very unanimous one, which took place on March 16th in connection with the Finance Scheme. The amount allocated to this parish to be raised this year is £55, and the free-will offering method has been adopted, which enables everybody to take a share in the work of the Church. The Easter Vestry will be held in the Church Room, on Thursday, April 16th, at 8.15. Matters of considerable importance will be discussed, and I hope the parishioners will make a point of being present—ladies, as well as men, please!

Mrs. Coad Pryor will be glad to welcome the members of the Working Party, on Friday, April 3rd.

In future the Celebration of the Holy Communion on Saints' Days will be at 8 a.m. instead of at 11; but the 11 a.m. Thursday Celebration will be continued as usual.

I am being constantly asked for letters for the local Hospitals, and shall be glad to receive any spare ones that may be sent to me.

We hope to present about twenty candidates at the Confirmation in Hampton Parish Church, on March 30th. These will make their first Communion on Easter Day, and I commend them to your earnest prayers. I draw your special attention to the C.E.M.S. Meeting in the Church Room, on Tuesday, April 21st, when a Missionary Address will be given by Dr. T. Jays.
