The recent Sale-of-Work for Missions was a great success, and we shall remember the kind and encouraging words of Bishop Stileman who "opened" the Sale. The net result was £28 13s. 6d., which will be divided equally between C.M.S. and S.P.G.

I have received, through the kind intervention of a Parishioner, who desires to remain anonymous, the sum of £20 from the "Kingston Trust," this money is to be used for purposes in connection with the Church.

There has also been handed to me by the Misses Ovington-Jones, £15 0s. 2\(^3\)d., the proceeds of their carol singing during Christmas time, in which they were assisted by the Misses Cameron. This generous amount will be distributed, chiefly by the District Visitors, during the New Year, in gifts to the old and deserving poor, irrespective of creed. The thanks of the whole parish are due to those who organized this plan and with such success.

Although there could not help being many sad memories at Christmas time this year, still the Services in Church were bright and hearty, the decorations were simple and effective, and we are greatly indebted to those who sent flowers, &c., and to those who gave much time and care to their arrangement.

I wonder if any parishioners would feel disposed to provide the means for re-fitting the choir boys with cassocks, &c., I will very gladly give the approximate cost.

You will see elsewhere in this Magazine the reports of the Inspectors in Religious knowledge in connection with the day schools. You will, I am sure, all agree that they reflect very great credit on Teachers and taught.

I hope to preach the usual sermon on Some aspect of the War at 11 a.m., January 2nd. On Sunday Evenings in January I propose giving a Course of Addresses on "The Gospels for the Day."
