MY DEAR PEOPLE,

May I call your special attention to the Sale of Work on behalf of the Mission Work of the Church overseas? It will be held this year in the schools, and will be on a larger scale than usual. I hope it will be generously supported.

Mr. Elliott, the Secretary of the Free-will Offering Scheme which provides for our Quota (£62) to the Diocesan Fund, tells me that up to the middle of September he has sent £39 towards it, leaving £23 to be found between now and the end of the year; it is a debt of honour that this should be paid, and I trust as many of you as are able will contribute towards it.

We are much indebted to all the kind friends who helped with the Sunday School Children's Treat. I wish they were all present to see how thoroughly it was all enjoyed. Mrs. Knight kindly superintended the arrangements for the tea, and Mr. Jordan and Miss Lush looked after the Sports, etc. Mrs. Hugh Weir very graciously distributed the prizes, a list of which is printed elsewhere.

I am thankful that so many of you are able to be present at the 7.30 a.m. Holy Communion. I am confident that much blessing will come to all the work of the Church as a result. Will you please remember that I shall always be glad to receive requests for special intercessions?

Two or three more voluntary Church Cleaners are required, and names may be sent to me.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Services will take place on Sunday, October 9th. Offerings of fruit, etc., should be sent to the Church early on October 8th. The collections will be given to the Local Hospitals.

The "Socials" commence in the Boys' School on Friday, October 7th, at 7.45 p.m., tickets 6d. each, may be obtained of the District Visitors; at the Vicarage, or at Mr. Nightingale's, 12, Myrtle Road. We shall be glad of any help in the way of Vocal or Instrumental Music. I hear that there is a very attractive programme for the opening.

MISSIONARY WORKING PARTY.

The Meetings were resumed on Friday, September 23rd, at Miss Brewer's, "Revidge," and it was decided to hold *weekly* instead of *fortnightly* meetings this month, in view of the time before the Sale of Work being so short. SALE OF WORK.

The Annual Sale of Work for Foreign Missions will take place on Wednesday, October 19th, in the Schools. This is nearly two months earlier than usual, but the Committee have thought it advisable to take advantage of the School holiday during the week beginning October 16th, and hold the Sale in the Schools. The Church Room has long been found too small, and the Committee trust the change will be greatly for the better. Entertainments will be given in the afternoon and evening. In addition to the usual stall for plain and fancy needlework, there will be stalls for cakes, toys and plants, gifts for which will be very gratefully received by the Secretary, Miss Brewer. The "White Elephant Stall," which was so successful last year, will again be in evidence. Will friends be so kind as to put aside for this stall articles in good condition for which they have no use, but which others may find very useful? Tea will be provided during the afternoon. We hope to have the generous support of the members of the congregation and other friends. The Sale will be opened at 3 o'clock.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL (LONDON DIOCESE).

A two days' "Sale and Market" will be held at Sion College, Victoria Embankment, on Wed-

nesday and Thursday, October 19th and 20th. The Bishop of London will preside at the opening on the first day, and the Bishop of Willesden on the second day. The Stalls are being undertaken by the different Deaneries in the Diocese, Hampton Deanery being responsible for the Refreshment Stall, with Miss Jakeman, Larkfield, Hampton Hill, as Secretary. The Social and Sports' Clubs are not helped from the general funds, but are maintained from the lads themselves and from a small monthly Whist Drive at which the lads' friends are invited; these are held on the last Friday of the month. We have lately come into possession of two bagatelle tables which badly need repair. We are in need of cues. Will any kind friends who possess billiard tables and have any cues they do not require, kindly think of us? The next monthly Church Parade will be held on Sunday, 25th September. The band will attend if the instruments can be attended to in time. The recent dry weather has affected the drums so that some new skins are required. Several kind friends have offered their services at our Social Evenings, for which we are very grateful.
