We are again approaching *the* great Festival of our Church, and although we shall miss the personal guidance of a gracious and soul-inspiring friend, we shall do that which will be in accordance with his mind and teaching if we enter heartily into all the services of the Easter-tide and grant him to see how blessed his work has been. Many opportunities, as indicated below, will be afforded to all worshippers, and we pray that there may be such an intensity about the witness we shall bear to Him that there may be a large ingathering into His fold. Easter Day sets before us—empty tomb, and in the words of the Evangelist St. John, his own full realisation of the very truth of the resurrection of our Lord; that through His death and resurrection we have been translated out of darkness into light, and as St. John learned, by the vision of the risen and ascended Lord—"alive for evermore," that strength and grace were given to his awe-struck spirit by the touch of the compassionate Master, so are we taught that the Christian life is the outflow of the risen life of Christ our Healer. Let us pray that we may come to this Festival in the spirit of penitence which is the temper in which

we can best see the spiritual and know God, and that the revival of a soul from the death of sin to a life of righteousness is an extension of our Lord's Resurrection.

During Holy Week there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m., and on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, services of Ante-Communion at noon, and Evensong and short address at 8 p.m. Friday, being Good Friday, there will be Matins with Sermon at 10.30 a.m., and the Service of the Three Hours will be taken by the Rev. F. M. Tapley, Vicar of All Saints', Twickenham. On Easter Day there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7 a.m, 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. There will be Matins and Sermon at 11 a.m.; a Children's Service at 3 p.m., and Evensong and Sermon at 7 p.m. In Easter Week on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 7.30 a.m., and on Tuesday and Thursday at noon.
