MY DEAR PEOPLE,

The Missionary Working Party's Sale of Work on Tuesday, October the 23rd, will be the event of the month. We shall be very grateful for articles to help furnish the various stalls, and we hope for a great crowd of buyers. Gifts should be sent to the Vicarage, on or before Monday, October 22nd.

One is frequently being asked to draw the attention of the people to various meetings in London and elsewhere, about matters which, though not connected directly with the parish, may find amongst the readers of the Magazine some who are interested or may like to become interested in them. Just lately I have been asked

by a Council of men and women, under the Presidency of the Bishop of Manchester, to bring to your notice a meeting at the **Albert Hall, on Thursday, October 25th, at 8 p.m.** It is one amongst other meetings which have been held in preparation for a Conference which is to take place at Birmingham in April, 1924. The aim of that Conference will be "to discover how the principles of Jesus Christ can be applied in social, political, industrial, international and home life, so as to bring about a truly christian order of human society." From time to time I shall give more information about the movement (known by the name of C.O.P.E.C.), and the Conference in particular. The speakers at the Albert Hall Meeting will include the Archbishop of York and the Bishop of Manchester, who will speak respectively on "The Call to the Church" and "C.O.P.E.C.—Its Methods and Aims." If any of you would like to attend this meeting, I can obtain tickets, for which there is no charge. I have also been asked to bring to your notice the season's programme of the St. Paul's Lecture Society, an announcement of which you will find amongst the news.

The Monthly Socials will begin this month. These gatherings are commonly known as the Vicar's Socials, and so I shall look forward to meeting you all on these occasions.

ST.
