

THE ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

There was a refreshing note of achievement and advance about the meeting this year. The Secretary's report made clear the vast amount of work that had fallen upon the Church Council as a whole in the past year, and in particular upon its Standing and General Purposes Committee; but this work had been much more fruitful in result than for years past. The Vicar in his address characterised the last year as one of "break-through," after a long period of frustration and battling with seemingly insoluble problems. Wayside, from being an inspiration, had become to many a source of gloom and despair, and only by a majority of one vote had the Church Council decided to retain it. But from the moment of that decision the whole picture began to change: and now Wayside had been put in good order at reasonable cost, the upper floor well let to a co-operative tenant, a new garage built, and everything (though one had always to be prepared for unforeseen snags!) seemed now very satisfactory from a financial point of view. And not only this—the lower rooms were more in demand than ever before for parochial meetings of all kinds. Wayside had now indeed become the asset we had hoped it would be. The Vicar commended the persistent work and care of Mrs. Warwick, which had played so big a part in bringing this happy result about. The Parish Hall, another great source of anxiety a year ago, had actually, for the first time for many years, made a small profit on the current account of its year's working, though still unable to put money aside for capital expenditure because of the debt to the Bank still to be paid off. But at last the steadily increasing deficit had been halted. The main reason for this encouraging improvement was, of course, the rent paid by our good tenants, the St. James's Nursery School. Their advent had been regarded with mixed feelings, but it had proved a real boon all round—and one benefit had been the chang-

ing of the small hall from a place of peeling, dirty walls, into a cheerfully decorated room in which people were glad to meet, at next to no cost to the Church Council. So the Vicar's tale of good cheer went on—the sale of the long-derelict and seemingly unsaleable land in School Road at a good margin of profit; the increase in Sunday collections and Free-Will Offerings—and then, to crown all this, the entirely new spirit which had come into our giving, and the complete transformation of the whole financial scene, as a result of the tremendous efforts made by the Christian Giving Committee, and the response achieved. When Wells proved beyond our means, it seemed as though we might remain bogged down for years in our financial Slough of Despond—but the Vicar said he was determined to do all he could to prevent this from happening, even if he had to "go it alone." This had fortunately not proved necessary: the right people were there to help. Mr. Whiteley had proved a tower of strength, and the small committee that came together had worked as a team, with great eagerness and enthusiasm. At last we were on firm ground, with the right way ahead clear. Then the Vicar spoke of another advance—the Parish Meetings, often spoken of as desirable, now at last a reality which it was hoped would grow in strength and interest. The Vicar said that this "break-through" on the broad parochial front had encouraged similar "break-throughs" elsewhere and was reflected in the increasingly flourishing position of most of our organisations. It had certainly been the most encouraging year since he came to the parish, and it gave stimulus and impetus to confront the tasks and problems not yet tackled.

A motion that one-tenth of the Church's income for 1958 should be given to Christian causes outside The parish was amended, after much discussion, to the effect that a tithe of the monies given through the Christian Giving Scheme should be thus allocated.

Bishop; Mrs. M. Beckett, Mrs. E. Taylor, Miss B. Rooney, Mrs. D. Childs, Mrs. J. C. Pyne, Mrs. J. M. Whiteley, Mrs. C. H. Stevens, Mrs. D. E. Warwick.

At the first meeting of the Council, Mrs. Warwick was re-elected as Secretary; Mrs. Allport was elected Assistant Secretary, and to take the place of last year's General Purposes Committee, a smaller committee, to be known as the "Executive Committee," was appointed. The members of this are: the Vicar, the Churchwardens, the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary, Mr. Nightingale (Hall Secretary) and Mr. Salisbury (Wayside Treasurer).

FROM BEYOND THE SPIRE

WORLD POPULATION GROWTH

In only four years, world population grew by about 172 million, which is equal to the total population of the United States today.

Until 1650, growth was comparatively slow and erratic. It was held in check by famines, epidemics, droughts, floods, wars and rebellions. Since that time, growth has been by leaps and bounds, at an ever-accelerating pace. It doubled during the two centuries between 1650 and 1850, and then more than doubled again during the one century between 1850 and 1950. At the present rate of growth—1.7 per cent. per year, nearly 45 million, or 123,000 a day—world numbers will double in only a little more than 40 years.

More people are living longer in

the over-populated, under-developed areas of the world. Few are enjoying a decent standard of living, and the poor may be growing even poorer.

It is in many of these areas that C.M.S. missionaries are working and witnessing today. The immensity of the task to which they are dedicated, increases daily. They depend as never before on **your** prayers and **your** sacrificial giving. (We give very little help from this parish at the moment, and this fact weighs heavily on our minds. Now that the Christian Giving Scheme is in operation, we want to begin to give to this vital work in a more worthy way. To help us in our thinking about it, we are hoping to have a C.M.S. representative as preacher at Matins on June 8th).
