

It was hot and dusty in St. James's Road. The smells mingled; freshly brewed coffee, cardamoms and spices from the stall, the donkey, the little tractor collecting the refuse. We amused ourselves by taking a photograph of the Leathard family underneath the beautiful enamel street sign, St. James' Road, Jerusalem. That St. James's Road was an alley in our terms, but none-the-less important for that, because it led, up steps and round a few corners to the Cathedral of St. James. This cathedral is the most important building in the Armenian Quarter of the Old City of Jerusalem. A thick carpet hangs over the entrance to the church from the shady cloister. Inside the coolness and halflight after the glaring sunshine makes one wait a moment to re-adjust one's vision. Slowly a new perspective takes over; the sanctuary lit by candle, boys and men dressed in black habits, centuries of incense, representing centuries of prayers, seem to have soaked into the very stone. And in the chapel to the left of the entrance is the supposed site where James, the Apostle and friend of Jesus, Son of Zebedee and brother of John, was murdered on the orders of King Herod Agrippa I in 44 A.D. Legend has it that James visited Spain to spread the Gospel and so remains were taken to Spain and were laid to rest at Santiago de Compostella. The shrine at Compostella became one of Europe's greatest places of Pilgrimage in the Middle Ages and even today hundreds of thousands of pilgrims make their way to this shrine each year.

You don't have to go either to Jerusalem or Santiago de Compostella to celebrate St. James' Day (25 July) in a church dedicated to the first of the Apostles to have been martyred. Join us in Hampton Hill in your own Parish Church. This year we are delighted that the last weekend of July will be marked by a three day celebration, a Flower Festival, Open Days, Exhibitions, Trips up the Spire, Music in Church, a Barbecue and much else. On Sunday July 28 the whole Parish worships together at 11 am and we continue our celebrations with a shared lunch. You are most welcome to any of these events and we look forward to welcoming you.

What was clear at St. James', Jerusalem, what is clear in making the pilgrimage to the shrine of St. James in Santiago de Compostella is that one is not alone. We are part of a community, from which we receive much and to which we also give much. The same was true for James, he belonged to a group of friends gathered around Jesus of Nazareth. In that group he broke out of himself and formed a community that discovered a new vision, a new dimension a whole new pattern of living, but it cost him his life.

We celebrate St. James' Day because we align ourselves with him. We join into that community, the family of Christ throughout the world, we bring our community in Hampton Hill to be fashioned in the pattern of that first community of the friends of Jesus of Nazareth. We celebrate St. James' Day fired with the vision and the values of God's kingdom for his world today. Please join us!

### Emergency Accommodation in Richmond

#### (SPEAR)



SPEAR is a small charitable housing association run by a committee of local people who run a twelve bedded night shelter for men and women who have nowhere else to stay. The shelter has now been open for twenty months and in the first year over eighty young people under twenty-one stayed there, three over sixty-five and forty-six women. About seventy per cent of the people who stayed moved on to permanent accommodation. A wide range of counselling services are also available for those who need it. SPEAR's main aim is to provide a home - a relaxed atmosphere to help people out of the despair of homelessness.

Gamal Shoukry is SPEAR's Resettlement Officer, based in the Council Housing Department at the Civic Centre in Twickenham and he is concentrating on developing a lodging scheme. The idea is to find lodgings for people who are capable of looking after themselves and to offer support to both parties and to guarantee initial payment for the room if the lodger is receiving Benefit. Anyone interested in the scheme should telephone Gamal on 081 891 1411 Ext. 4480.

Anyone who goes up to Town these days is aware of the increase in homelessness, people in shop doorways and in the Underground tunnels abound so anything that can be done to help people in this situation is to be encouraged. SPEAR is also glad of donations of money, food stuffs, cleaning materials and toiletries. One of their most pressing needs, however is volunteers to help run the centre's coffee-bar in the evenings and chat to the residents so that the place feels more like home, duties come round about once a month. There are only two night shelters in the whole of Surrey so this is valuable work. ## Update

Behind an impressive screen hoarding, work on the conversion of our old Parish Hall in School Road into a new centre for the Community Care Group is now well under way. Plans for the proposed new Hall, which were unveiled at the Annual Church Meeting in April, and which are still on view in the Church, have (with some slight modifications) now been submitted to the Council for planning permission. As part of the statutory planning processes they will also be available for inspection in the local Public Library.

Estimates have been obtained for the re-decoration, stonework cleaning and modernisation of the lighting system in the Church for which a Faculty was recently granted by the Diocese. At the time of going to press, many matters, including the appointment of the Contractor, and the details of the colour schemes, have still to be finalised. However it is likely that the work will be carried out during August/September. There will be more details in the next issue of this magazine.

# Around the Spire

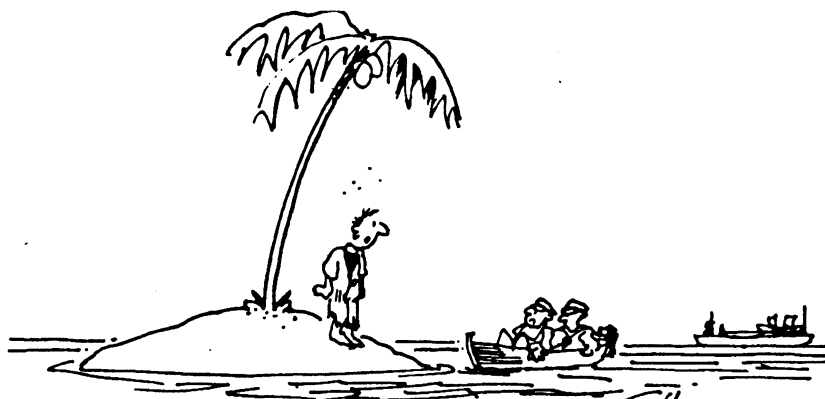

The Search Room of the Greater London Record Office is at 40 Northampton Road, Clerkenwell, London EC1R 0HB, telephone 071 606 3030 ext. 3820. It is open on Tuesdays to Fridays from 9.30 am to 4.45 pm. and Tuesdays except those following public holidays, from 4.45 pm to 7.30 pm. (Before planning a Tuesday evening visit searchers are advised to consult the Search Room Staff). It is not closed at lunch time although there are some restrictions on service. The Search Room will be closed during the third and fourth weeks in October.

It is regretted that the staff of the Record Office cannot do genealogical searches, however brief, nor check entries in registers. If you are unable to attend the office personally you may care to engage the services of a professional record agent. Lists of names and addresses of record agents have been prepared by the staff of the Public Records Office, Chancery Lane, London WC2, the Institute of Heraldic and Genealogical Studies, Northgate, Canterbury, Kent, the Society of Genealogists, 14 Charterhouse Buildings, London EC1M 7BA and the Association of Genealogists and Record Agents, c/o Mrs P.A. Berner, AGRA, 15 Dover Close, Hill Head, Fareham, Hants PO14 3SU.
