

The churchyard at St. James's is a real asset. Not only is it a useful shortcut, it is also a place to use, to enjoy the quiet, the impression of nature in cultivated care, without being over-regimented. Some of the graves are lovingly tended, others have been rather neglected and a few we know to have been damaged. It is also listed as a place of local scientific note, because of its flora and fauna. As I write the snowdrops are in bloom, against the odds. Soon the cycle of growth will bring crocus, daffodil and then bluebell to carpet the churchyard, transforming the stark winter scene until it seems but a distant memory. Our churchyard is indeed a place for all seasons, with something new to offer whatever the month of the year.

This natural cycle seems to add extra emphasis to this month's celebration of the central theme of our faith - Christ's death and resurrection. If we mark them and attempt to live them day by day the events such as the entry of Christ into Jerusalem, the tightening grip of the encounters of Holy Week, the betrayal, arrest, torture, mocking and execution of Christ also seem to follow and inexorable cycle. These events seem to have a momentum of their own, culminating, almost inevitably in the crucifixion.

And yet, the resurrection asserts that this inevitability does not end in death, but in life, in fullness of life, in life transformed. For the resurrection is not some sort of spiritual eraser, with which we wipe out the events of Holy Week - far from it. The point of the resurrection is that it comes because Christ lived through the events of rebuttal, betrayal, imprisonment crucifixion and death.

When the Christian community meets together, Sunday by Sunday, and supremely on Easter Day to break bread and share the common cup over which Jesus agonized, on the night before he was killed, we are affirming that the truth about his life, his death and his resurrection is the truth about our lives too. For we are sure that once and for all the case for love has been made and has been won. And furthermore, we are part of it.

For Christian people Holy Week and Easter is not about an attempt to recapture a dim ancient memory of a man called Jesus in far off Jerusalem, but of committing ourselves to continue and to grow in a reality which betrayal, torment and death could not destroy then - and cannot destroy now.

We will sing on Easter Day

*Love's redeeming work is done;
Fought the fight, the battle won...
death in vain forbids his rise;
Christ has opened Paradise*

So please use the cycle of nature in the churchyard and also use the pattern of Holy Week and Easter to immerse yourself in the conviction of the risen life,

now; and in living it out. You will, of course, be very welcome to join us at any of the services during Holy Week and Easter.

CANDLEMAS

Or any other donation.

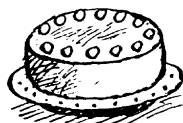
Equally important is for as many people as possible to join the club as members and be part of the body administering the building and its activities.

CHILDREN'S CORNER



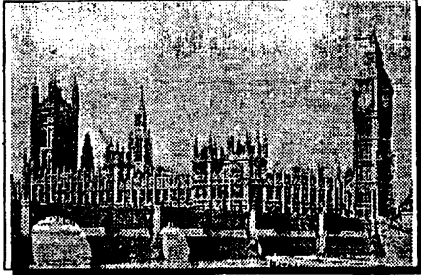

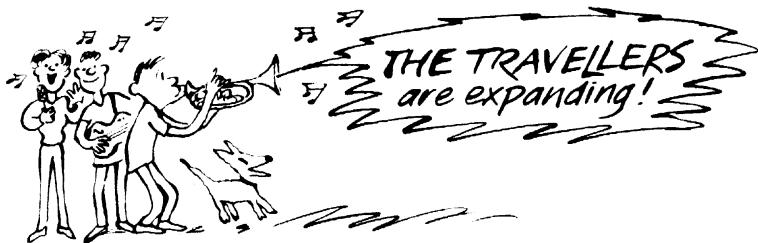

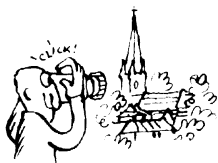
HELP
