Greetings.


By the time you read this letter I hope that Conference will have agreed that I am moving to the Ashbourne Circuit to serve as your new Superintendent Minister.

An Island Chaplain

At the end of May, I had the privilege of serving for a week as the Chaplain on Bardsey Island (Ynys Enlli).



Bardsey Island is a small island (approx 2.5 x 1.5 miles) off the western end of the Llyn Peninsula in North Wales. The island is about 2 miles from the mainland, separated by the Bardsey Sound, a notorious and often choppy stretch of water. The crossing is made on a bouncy little yellow boat with the amiable boatman Colin.

Since 1979 Bardsey Island has been owned and managed by a charitable trust, and is a haven for wildlife with a large number of seals and an interesting and varied range of birds. There has been a bird observatory on the island since the 1950s, which is manned for most of the year. The Trust very much recognise the natural, scientific and spiritual significance of the Island.

Bardsey is a very beautiful place with one hill/mountain (Mynydd Enlli) rising to almost 550 feet, and a largely rocky coastline. There are nine rental properties on the island, along with wardens and a farmer and his wife, who is a fine cook and runs a small café.

The accommodation on Bardsey is quite basic with no running water, there being no rivers on the island, so all drinking water must be boiled and filtered. Showers and flush toilets are not remotely possible! There is only a small amount of electricity, largely provided by solar power, mainly in the rental accommodation to operate the fridges. It is necessary to take all food for a week with you on the boat.

Bardsey is much more than a small, beautiful island. It is a deeply spiritual place, as is felt by many visiting the island. It is often described as liminal, or a thin place, i.e. where heaven and earth feel very close.

There has been a Christian presence on Bardsey since at least AD 516, when St Cadfan founded a monastery there. It appears a monastic presence probably remained until the dissolution of the monasteries. The remains of a 13th century abbey tower can be found on the island.

Bardsey is known as the Island of twenty thousand saints, as many people, particularly in medieval times, chose to be buried there. In view of its spiritual significance it was at one time reckoned that three visits to Bardsey were equal to one visit to Rome.

In the 1870s a new Methodist Chapel was built on the island and remains in use today. As chaplain, each day I led a short service of Morning Prayer, and also Evening Prayer/Compline. Before each service the bell is rung to call people in. I usually had help with this from two young visitors staying at Ty Capel, the Old Manse, who rewarded the chaplain each time with a biscuit! On the Sunday morning I led a Communion service following the pattern of the Church of Wales, which was not very familiar to me. Whilst the numbers at services on this little island were quite small (2-11), the atmosphere was always very special.

When travelling over to the island, Colin the boatman had told me that a gentleman was visiting Bardsey for the day on the Sunday and wished, if possible, to play the harmonium in the Sunday morning service.

I therefore moved the time of the service to accommodate his arrival, the power of a Chaplain! He duly arrived with his wife and played very well including making a sound recording of it. It turned out this was three days short of his 80th Birthday and playing on Bardsey was very much an important part of how he wanted to celebrate his big birthday. Another day visitor, at the end of the service on his first ever visit to Bardsey, played on the harmonium a beautiful piece he had composed called "Bardsey Island", which he had written based on seeing the island from the mainland.

As well as taking the services, I think I probably met everyone, around 50 or so folks, staying on the Island that week. I also met many of the day visitors who had bounced across the water in Colin's little yellow boat. These visitors included people finishing the North Wales Pilgrimage, and I met a group from Derbyshire doing this.

Being the chaplain seemed to allow easy conversations with many people during the week, though one group arriving for the day were somewhat mystified as to why there was a chaplain on the Island. They suggested that perhaps the Island, or the journey to or from it, was so dangerous that a chaplain was needed in case not everyone would make it safely home!

Being half term, there were a number of young families on the Island, the majority of whom were Welsh, and it was lovely to see the children being able to play in a very carefree and safe way, which would not usually be possible on the mainland. The week on the Island included a rounders match totally organised by some of the youngsters; a Jubilee cake stall organised by other youngsters; and a Jubilee Beacon provided by Trinity House who control the lighthouses in England and Wales. There is a rather splendid lighthouse on Bardsey, which in recent years has switched to a static red light, rather than the original rotating white light, which unfortunately attracted a lot of birds to fly into it.

My week as a chaplain was most enjoyable and rewarding for me, and hopefully useful and encouraging for those who often shared parts of their lives with me. The week was harder work than I had perhaps expected, but perhaps 13 services in a week takes its toll. I also normally don't have the privilege of meeting and sharing with so many friendly and fascinating people in one week.



Bardsey is a most special place, surrounded by God's amazing creation, including for instance listening to the seals singing their hearts out! The chapel too is a significant place, and I often found there and, particularly at the end of a service, a special and extremely peaceful atmosphere.

Bardsey is a great place for encounters with ourselves, one another, with God, and God's amazing creation. It is a great place to be a human being, rather than a human doing.

Ashbourne Methodist Church

Summary of Church Council – 8th June 2022

At the Spring Meeting all the usual areas are given the opportunity to report: Worship, Children & Young People, Outreach, Safeguarding, the Link Project, Resources etc. In addition, there were two other main reports: Oversight and Trusteeship of Churches within the Circuit, and Marriage and Relationships.

Worship – Catherine Green presented a summary of feedback concerning the alternative worship stream. The council agreed to continue with the current format and will seek to recruit new leaders through the safer recruiting system. They are also looking for a co-ordinator to support and maintain the rota.

It was recognised that the **Friendship Lunch** is growing, **Craft and Chat** continues its weekly outreach work and is preparing for its next yarn bombing. **Gateway** is receiving regular bookings and **House Groups** continue to support their members and the community around them.

The Link – Tony Walker announced that the Ashbourne Town Team are bidding for ‘levelling up’ funding and ‘The Link’ and its potential for the town as a performance venue is now the bid for Derbyshire Dales. This has meant that the Gateway Centre is now looking to be remodelled and planning and development proposals (Architects have provided this FOC at present) to convert the facilities into modern self-catering units. Proximity to the Tissington Trail makes this an attractive option for walkers and visitors to the town. The whole proposal will be available to review shortly as this bid must go in by 6th July. Ian Marsh has more details for those interested to see the whole ‘levelling up’ proposal.

Cornerstone – the kitchen and servery have been refitted and redecorated and produce can be made for the Thursday market. As the lease was signed later than expected, reopening has been delayed until early July.

Appointments – individuals proposed for election at the Annual Church Meeting will be displayed on the Church notice board in the next 2 weeks.

Oversight and Trustees of Churches within the Circuit – a paper has been prepared by the circuit following changes to standing orders from conference with proposals for managing smaller churches in the future. More discussion is needed on the implications of this for AMC.

Marriage and Relationships - It was proposed that when the Rev Nicola Briggs arrives in September, the leadership team would action a consultation with the whole Church, led by Nicola. This consultation to take place and its decisions actioned and implemented before the end of the next Church Year (August 2023)

Food is the main problem for the impoverished community. Financed by contributions from the Methodist Church, the Wondering School children are fed with porridge every day while at school.

Security and vandalism excessive. John Wesley School in Pinetown help by providing safe parking of Phakamisa's vehicle.

The Phakamisa community give thanks for God's protection throughout this time. And are grateful that all the staff have kept their jobs.

"We are keeping fine and looking forward to what we hope will be a good rainy season. Already we are hearing of people being struck by lightning and buildings having their roofs blown off. Pray for help and comfort to those affected. Pray for the government of Zimbabwe at all levels and for all in authority to carry out their duties without resorting to corrupt practices.

Praise God that schools reopened at the end of August and early September and we have been very busy trying to catch up and preparing students for their examinations. Online learning was attempted during the periods of lockdown, but many of our students didn't manage to benefit.

Isabel is back in the office too and making some trips to the circuits. Teenage pregnancies and youth drug abuse are some of the issues that she is helping to address. We pray that people will be vigilant and take necessary precautions to avoid a new wave of Covid infections. There will be many people coming home through the borders mostly from South Africa.

At Hillside Methodist Church attendance is much lower than it was pre-pandemic. Some elderly people and people who have not been vaccinated are hesitant to return. Since most of the children are not attending, many parents or grandparents have to stay at home too. I broadcast Sunday morning service on Facebook, but the internet connection is unreliable. I am still putting Sunday services on the circuit website, mostly in audio format.”


