(I am writing this letter on the 1st birthday of my grandson Joe.)





The image on the left above is of a Giant Sequoia tree named after the author Mark Twain. It is 18 feet in diameter and the photo was taken in 1891. Imagine sawing through that using the saw shown in the picture??

The image on the right is of another Giant Sequoia tree named after the Civil War General Sherman and is the largest single stem tree in the world. It's estimated to be over 2500 years old.

I've had the privilege of visiting Sequoia National Park in California and standing next to this giant redwood.

If you want to get a physical impression of the grandeur of God, there can be no better way.

FOCUS

I've also been fortunate enough to visit the Grand Canyon and the Rocky Mountains, Niagara Falls and other such examples of nature at its most spectacular.

Of course, if you really want to immerse yourself in the grandeur of God you simply need to look up into the sky.

Our solar system is part of the spiral galaxy we call the Milky Way which actually contains between 100 and 400 billion stars and a similar number of planets.

In what we call the 'observable universe' there are between 2 billion and 2 trillion galaxies.

The nearest galaxy to our earth is the Andromeda Galaxy which is 2.5 million light years away.

Now that's what I call the GRANDEUR OF GOD.

Does that put our 'earthly problems' into context? Into perspective?

Over the past three years we've been preoccupied with Brexit, Covid and Global Warming.

Brexit has almost been put to bed.

Covid is still around and still serious but the the inventiveness and ingenuity and collaboration of God's greatest creation, humankind, are putting up quite a fight.

Vegetarian Recipes

One Pot Tomato Orzo

Vegan. Serves 4

This easy one pot Basil and tomato recipe is perfect for busy weeknight meals. Its full of flavour, satisfying and ready in 30 minutes.

Ingredients.

1.5 tbsp olive oil 1 x 14oz tin chopped tomatoes

4 cloves garlic 2 ½ Cups vegetable stock

3 tbsps capers

½ tsp crushed red pepper flakes

½ cup fresh basil, chopped. (can be substituted with parsley)

½ tsp salt

1 1/2 cups orzo pasta

1/2 cup dry white wine

Method

1. Heat the oil, add garlic, oregano, crushed red pepper flakes.

- 2. Saute a few minutes until garlic is lightly browned.
- 3. Add the orzo and stir to coat well. Cook for 1-2 minutes to lightly toast the orzo and incorporate the flavours. Move around to prevent sticking.
- 4. Add white wine and cook for 1-2 minutes.
- 5. Add tomatoes and juice and simmer 2-03 minutes.
- Add the vegetable stock and seasoning. Bring to the boil, then simmer gently for 7-10 minutes,, until the liquid has mostly been absorbed and orzo is tender.
- 7. Stir often to prevent sticking
- 8. Remove from the heat and add the capers. Stir to combine. Check the seasoning. Let it stand for 1-2 minutes without a lid to thicken up.
- 9. Serve with vegan parmesan.

Chestnut Pate en Croute

Serves 6

This is a great dish to make for Christmas. (It looks like Beef Wellington), will freeze, cuts well and is delicious hot or cold.

Ingredients.

250gm Frozen Puff Pastry, or home made short, or wholemeal

For the Nut pate

235gms Butter	1 tablespoon
of brandy (optional)	
1 medium onion finely chopped	¼ teaspoon paprika
1 clove garlic crushed	½ teaspoon
dried thyme	
1 stick celery finely chopped	Sea salt

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50gms walnuts, grated 150gms cashew nuts, grated 100gms chestnut puree 50gms cheddar cheese, grated 1 egg to bind and glaze Black pepper 100gms button mushrooms, sliced

Method.

- 1. Roll out the pastry into an oblong
- Melt butter, sweat the onions and celery, till soft but not coloured
- 3. Remove from the heat, stir in the garlic, nuts, cheese, egg, brandy, salt and pepper
- 4. Mix together well. Check for seasoning.
- Place the mushrooms down the centre of the pastry, leaving sufficient pastry to place over the nut mix to fully enclose it.
- 6. Place the nut mix on top of the mushrooms.
- 7. Seal well and glaze with egg.
- 8. Bake in hot oven for about 30 minutes for the puff pastry to rise.
- 9. Reduce heat and cook for a further 20-25 minutes.
- 10. Serve hot with your favourite sauce and seasonal vegetables. Serve cold with salads.

VEGAN OPTION: Use vegan cheese, omit the egg and glaze with non dairy milk.


