Ramblings from the Rectory

Well, here we are in June already – summer is upon us “and not before time” I hear you say – those long sunny days where we can sit in our beautiful gardens or plan visits to the seaside and have fun, are here at last. I love summer because it is a time when everyone begins to feel more relaxed as the heavy winter woollies are put away and the bright and colourful summer clothes are brought out.

Summer is usually the time when we plan our annual holiday too and perhaps you have already got yours planned. Maybe it is a week or two away in some lovely holiday resort or perhaps you will visit friends or relatives you haven't seen for a while or perhaps you will just have some fantastic days out with the family. Whatever your choice of holiday may be it is a time to put down your worries for a day or two and have some fun and quality time with those you love.

But you know when the holiday is over and we return home the reality is that everything that was there before we went away is still there when we get back. The cleaning still needs to be done, the finances still need to be sorted out, the garden needs tending more than ever – just because it is summer doesn't mean the jobs are any less.

The Ecumenical Prayer Cycle

This prayer book has prayers from a rotation of nations each week

Week 16, beginning this year on Easter Day had prayers from Belarus, Moldova, Russia, Ukraine

Each section begins with a brief summary of the 'faith history' of the countries represented:

Here is the introduction about Russia and Ukraine:

The largest country in the world, Russia, stretches from Eastern Europe to the far east to Asia and is filled with rich cultural treasures and vast reserves of oil or natural gas. Its blend of Byzantine and Slavic culture, combined with authoritarian French rule, have powerfully influenced, and reigned over, much of this area throughout history. It has at least 160 ethnic and indigenous groups. In the 20th century, there was a massive war devastation resulting from the Bolshevik revolution and the two world wars, with some political resentment still lingering.



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Ukraine, the largest country that is all in Europe, is referred to as the "global breadbasket". The country has had ongoing political struggles over whether it will lean towards Russia or the West. Human rights violation and corruption often prevail in these countries.

PRAYERS:

Day 1: Christ our God, sun of righteousness, by your divine touch you give light to the eyes of the blind man who has been deprived of light since birth.

Enlightened also the eyes of our souls, and make us sons and daughters of light so that we cry out to you in faith: Great and beyond words is your compassion towards us!

Loving Lord, glory to you!

Day 2: PRAYER OF ST SERAPHIM OF SAROV

Lord, cleanse me of my sins and have mercy on me.

There is no way to measure my sin, have mercy on me.

Lord, forgive the many times I disobey thee.

Master, I bow down before thy cross and glorify thy resurrection.

Lord, when I sin in what I say and do, have mercy on me because of thy great compassion.

Day 3: PRAYER AT THE BEGINNING OF THE DAY

O Lord, grant me to meet the coming day in peace.

Help me in all things to rely upon your holy will.

In every hour of the day reveal your will to me.

Bless my dealings with all who surround me.

Teach me to treat all that comes to me

throughout the day

with peace of soul,

and with firm conviction that your will governs all.

In all my deeds and words guide my thoughts and feelings.

In unforeseen events let me not forget that all are sent by you.

Teach me to act firmly and wisely, without embittering and embarrassing others.

Give me the strength to bear the fatigue of the coming day with all that it shall bring.

Direct my will, teach me to pray, pray you yourself in me. Amen

Day 4:

Come, my Light, and illumine my darkness.

Come, my Life, and revive me from death.

Come, my Physician, and heal my wounds.

Come, flame of divine love, and burn up the thorns of my sins,
kindling my heart with the flame of your love.

Come, my King, sit upon the throne of my heart and reign there.

For you one are my King and my Lord.

Day 5: PRAYER FOR ENEMIES

Lord Jesus Christ,

you commanded us to love our enemies,

and those who defame and injure us,

and to pray for them and forgive them.

You yourself prayed for your enemies, who crucified you:

Grant us, we pray, the spirit of Christian reconciliation and meekness,
that we may heartily forgive every injury and be reconciled with our
enemies.

Grant us to overcome the malevolence and offences of people
with Christian meekness and true love of our neighbour.

Day 6 :

Will you enlighten me so that I can recognise your light and perceive
your love?

My God, give me a heart to love you and eyes to see you,

Give me ears to hear your voice and lips to speak about you.

Give me taste to appreciate you, the sense of smell to catch your
perfume.

Give me hands to touch you and feet to follow you.

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On earth and in heaven, I desire only you, my God.

You are my sole desire, my consolation, the end of all anguish and suffering

Day 7: PETITIONS FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE

Again we pray, O Lord our God, hear our supplication and on account of your merciful lovingkindness - grant peace to our world. Quickly put down the upsurges of violence and bring to nothing the power of the cruel and the unjust. Establish peace and justice throughout the world so that the poor and innocent may flourish and so that the wicked may be brought to repentance and turn to love.

Let us all say: **O Lord, hear and have mercy**

Loving Lord, visit us in your love and mercy and bring peace in our time, especially in . . . Provide for the needs of those driven from their homes by injustice and the power of the sword. Calm their terror, and grant them, swiftly, your peace and loving-kindness.

Let us all say: **O Lord, hear and graciously have mercy**

Again we pray, O Lord and only lover of us all, visit the lowly and deliver them from their distress. Protect our Christian brothers and sisters, especially in . . ., from the persecution and terror that they face. Yes, O Lord, deliver all religious minorities from fear and oppression. Give quick aid and relief to the refugee children on our border, fleeing from violence and poverty. Deliver all, O Lord, who call upon you in the hour of distress.

Let us all say: **O Lord, hear and have mercy**

Again we pray for the people here present who await your great and abundant mercy, for those who show us mercy, and for all Christians of the true faith.

Lord, have mercy

O Most gracious Lady, O God-bearer, our hope, friend of orphans, defender of strangers, joy of those who sorrow, protection of those treated unjustly, look upon our troubles, look upon our grief, help us in our weakness, guide us who are strangers, protect the persecuted and defend those who have no other recourse before the violence of the sword and the cruelty of the wicked. For you are the refuge of all who cry out in distress. Amen

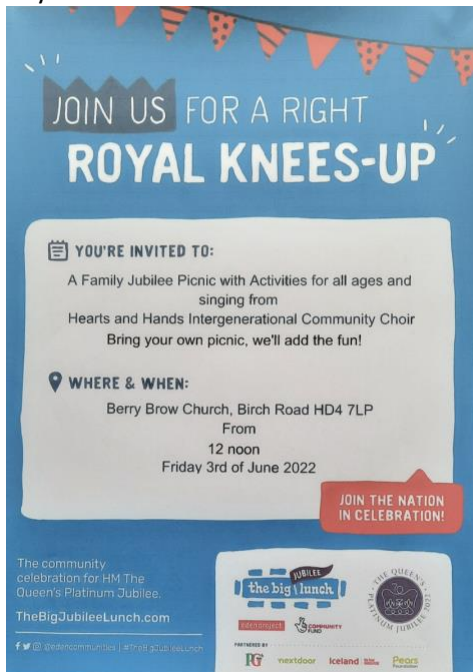
We raised £300 in May which will support the Humanitarian Crisis in Ukraine from our Coffee Mornings, a good result!!

As a reminder, St Paul's of Armitage Bridge maintains a link with the parish of Sokorabolo, in the Diocese of Royra in Tanzania. 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So that same army of volunteers arrived at 8.30am on the Monday morning and repeated the process and by 9.45am the scene was set once again.

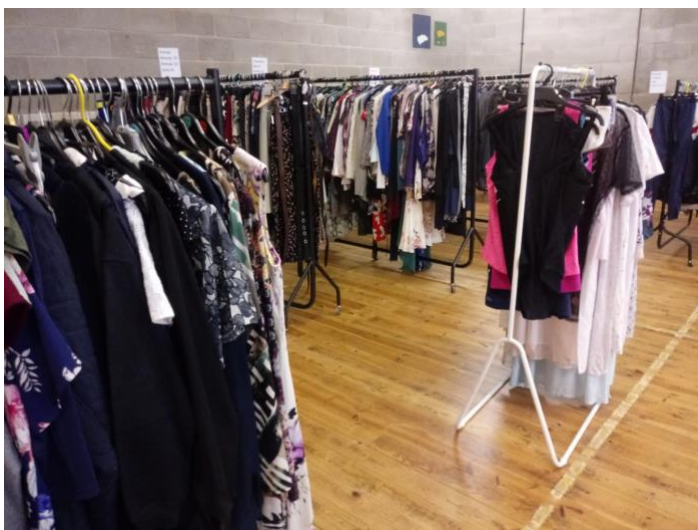
At 10.00am the doors opened and our customers poured in. It was a wonderful sight to see so many of our local friends and neighbours busy wandering around seeking a bargain.

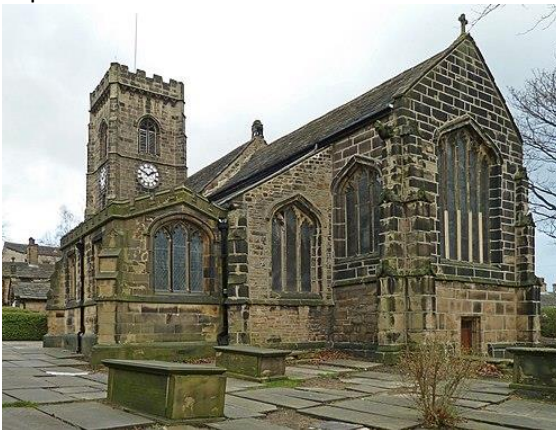
Armitage Bridge Ringers

Akin to many traditional pastimes and hobbies, the art of change ringing on tower bells has had its ups and downs over the years as trends in social activities change. Below is an article that appeared in 'The Ringing World' in March of 2022:

100 Years Ago In 'The Ringing World'

24th March 1922 ELLAND BELLS REOPENED

On Saturday last the bells of St Mary's Church Elland, were officially opened by a representative gathering of ringers from Selby, Tong, Bradford, Dewsbury, Earlsheaton, Birstal, **Armitage Bridge**, Shelley, Kirkheaton, Meltham, Huddersfield, Kirkburton, Lightcliffe, Halifax, Leeds and other places. A special service was held in the church an address being given by the Archdeacon of Huddersfield (The rev R.O.M. Harvey) on the art of change ringing. He commented on the ignorance that prevailed among the outside public on the subject of change ringing, which was an exclusive art, and said that it ought always to be the aim of a ringer not to rest content until he had explored further fields.



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After the service over 100 sat down to tea in the parish Room and during the afternoon and evening, until 9pm the bells were kept going in various Minor and Major methods, after which the handbells were brought into use, and brought to a close one of the most pleasant gathering of ringers that the town of Elland has had for some years.

The easy running of the bells added much to the pleasure of those who had the chance of having a pull. G.H.S.

Partly what is interesting about this article is 100 years on there is now no regular ringing at Elland and for many of the other towers mentioned above membership is down in single figures. Other towers that in the past years have had top notch bands but for various reasons do not now have regular ringing are All Souls Halifax, St Peter Sowerby, St Peter Bradford (Cathedral).

100 years ago the vast majority of ringers would have been male, this is not the case now as reflected in our band where we have currently 9 female and only 3 male members. It is heartening to realise that 100 years on Armitage Bridge ringers are still able to ring our own bells regularly while offering help and support to many local towers.

These items can go in your green bin:

- books remove hardback covers first
- cardboard
- deodorant sticks
- drinks cans, food tins and empty aerosol cans
- junk mail and envelopes
- newspapers and magazines
- plastic bottles with caps removed, including pop, milk and cleaning product bottles
- Pots - such as yoghurt, soup and face cream pots
- telephone directories
- tubs, such as those for margarine, ice cream and laundry tablets
- trays, such as those for meat, ready meals and fruit and vegetable punnets
- Make sure that your recycling is clean and dry before you put it into your green bin.
- Place all items loosely in your green bin or green liner if you do not have wheeled bins. Don't put them in other bags.

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Annual Walking Weekend. Berry Brow Methodist Walking Group.

Earlier this month 13 of us set off for our weekend away after a two year break.

The first meeting point was St Leonard's Church at Chapel le Dale for a 3 mile 'easy' walk. There is a memorial in the church to the men who died from injury or cholera while building the Ribbleshead Viaduct, and the Settle to Carlisle section of the Leeds to Carlisle railway. It was a cold, very windy day and when we stopped for our lunch, a number of serious walkers were coming down from Wharfedale looking cold and miserable, having been walking from 6.00am, completing 16 miles already, and Pen-y-ghent and 7 miles more to complete the 3 Peaks Challenge- we were very pleased to be walking at a lower level.

Walk completed we arrived at our accommodation. Fernleigh, a Christian conference Hotel on the esplanade at Grange over Sands; always welcoming, warm, comfortable, relaxed and serves good food.

The weather the next day was completely different; blue sky and sunshine- our most strenuous day as we climbed the Hoad- a lighthouse shaped monument at the highest point of the coast at

Ulverston. It was a good climb, but the view was worth it. Thankfully the rest of the walk was at sea level, through lovely meadows with beautiful May blossom and wild flowers, to a pub by the water's edge for some much needed refreshment.

Evening entertainment is 'do it yourself'; we had a hilarious game of 'cricket', quizzes, lively discussions and lots of fun.

Our third day was Sunday; we had a free morning. Some explored Grange, and some went to boost the congregation at the local Methodist church which was equipped with the latest technology. We heard a good message and the hymns were accompanied by a cello, violin and guitar as the regular organist was playing at a special service at Cartmel.



After Sunday lunch of Roast Beef and Yorkshire pudding a gentle walk was ideal; along the embankment by the salt marshes, taking in the lovely village of Cark, and interesting wild life including egrets and other wild life.

As we were eating breakfast on our final day it started to rain; we donned our wet weather gear and went to Cartmel as planned. We are not just 'fair weather walkers' - but the rain was torrential and we would have been soaked, so we went to buy our Cartmel 'sticky toffee pudding', visited the Priory and then made our way home.

A soggy end to an enjoyable weekend. Group walking is always the first Saturday of each month at 1.30pm from Berry Brow/Newsome Road South Methodist church.
