LENT 2022



Lent begins on March 2nd with **Ash Wednesday**. Two communion services to choose from - South Crosland at 10am and Armitage Bridge at 7pm. A grand way to begin Lent. If you have palm crosses you would like us to burn to create ash for those services, please give them to Julie or me.

It is a wonderful season of the church calendar, often called "the church's springtime". As I write, we are in the wake of Storms Dudley and Eunice and snow is gently falling but not laying. But the snowdrops are

out in the churchyards and polyanthus are flowering in our garden. Promise of meteorological spring just around the corner. The days are lengthening a bit too and I find myself starting to do bits of spring cleaning!

There are spiritual disciplines which we regularly take on in Lent. One is fasting. Real fasting is choosing to do without something we don't control well so we can be closer to God's will for us. So it might be comfort eating or chocolate or alcohol or caffeine. But it might be choosing not to watch as much TV.... Or giving up "retail therapy" Or not buying anything wrapped in plastic. It's important to choose something that challenges us and to keep it private. It's between me and God - or you and God.

Another spiritual discipline is **praying** deeply. Maybe take on praying for particular people or places or causes during Lent this year. Or pray silently at some point in the day. And another is **giving** to a charity.

One important spiritual discipline is being part of a **Lent study group**.

Here is what will happen this year:

Saying Yes to Life, a book by Ruth Valerio, came out at the start of 2020. It was Archbishop Justin Welby's choice for Lent Book 2020. We were going to run it as our Lent course then. Then Covid and lockdown came and everything changed. Except the reason why Ruth wrote the book.

About Dr. Ruth Valerio

She is Global Advocacy and Influencing Director at the Christian Charity Tearfund. She is an environmentalist, a theologian and a social activist. She and her family enjoy living sustainably - taking care of creation and being thoughtful in everyday living.

We're going to use it for Lent 2022 instead. Here are 3 ways you can get involved.

1. Buy the book

You may want to read the whole book. It is not available in the library but I have 3 copies. There are plenty of cheap copies on Amazon Books UK too.

2. Join our course at home

You can join in our Lent course with a simple summary of each chapter, bible readings and discussion questions. We will give you a booklet with a paper copy of each session to work through at your own speed and at a time to suit you. Let Julie or Debby know if you want one of these booklets

3. Join our Zoom course

If you want to join our online Zoom Lent group, let Rena know. She will send you the booklet electronically, with a copy of each session as an email attachment, and also the Zoom link to join the online sessions,

which will be on Thursday evenings starting at 7.30pm. Dates are March 3, 10, 17, 24, 31 and ending on April 7.

There will also be a special **Cafe Church** meeting at Newsome Berry Brow at 4pm on Saturday March 19th. It is called "A Carbon Conversation" and is a chance to think about how we can measure our carbon footprints and then gradually reduce them so we do less damage to the planet. Plenty of good company and good food too!

The Sunday services will all have a Lenten theme until **Mothering Sunday,** March 27th, which has its special place in our hearts as we give thanks for our mothers, and Jesus' mother Mary and all the mothering that takes place in our churches and our community.

Armitage Bridge Ringers

Bickering Bell Ringers

In bygone days the antics of church bellringers was often recorded in the local press, indeed in the 1800's ringers often fell out with clergy and each other over "bad behaviour", which usually included drink and money. At that time ringers were paid for their services and could make extra income by entering and winning "Striking Competitions"

Below is an article that appeared in The Huddersfield Chronicle in October of 1851:-

KIRKHEATON
The Late Prize Ringing

To The Editor Of the Huddersfield Chronicle Sir, In your paper of Saturday last is a paragraph from a correspondent, containing the following sentence:-

This party (the Dewsbury) rang their practice peal so well that little doubt existed as to where the premium would have gone had right been done.

Now, this sentence conveys a charge of partiality or of dishonesty on the parts of the censors (judges), and an inference that the ringers to whom the premium (1st prize) awarded were not rightly entitled to it. We need not here refer to the alleged misconduct of the censors, or notice the other misrepresentations of your correspondent; but we will say if the Dewsbury ringers are authors of the paragraph in question, and if they really believe the Kirkheaton ringers did not fairly merit the prizes they obtained at Kirkburton, they (the Dewsburyans) can *imagine* a mode by which may be determined their

true position as ringers; and, we may add, that if the paragraph be meant for anything but an empty boast, and a mere ebullition of disappointment and chagrin, they will adopt that mode of satisfying themselves on the subject.

A parade is made about an old man, aged 72 years, having *assisted* in getting 43 prizes. Now, though *few* of us are half his age, we may state, for the information of your correspondent, that within the last five years we have had awarded to us ten prizes – seven 1st: one 2nd: and two 3rds, amounting together the sum of £54.10s.

That the Dewsbury set can ring well, no impartial judge will deny, but their connection with their present censor will not add to their fame or their respectability, for their bullying and tricky manner in which that personage "assists" his party in the censors room is so marked as to become a disgrace to the noble art of campanology, and disgusting to every honourable censor.
