#### A VIEW FROM THE CLERGY



October means Autumn is well and truly here as the weather turns chilly and the nights draw in. It has always been one of my favourite times of year — the colours of the leaves turn such beautiful shades of red, orange, bronze and purple, and the sky on a good day can be a brilliant blue against the warmer colours of the season. Even when the blessed warmth of summer is gone, there is still so much to enjoy if we take the time to look, and so much of God's good creation to celebrate even as it begins to hunker down and the earth takes a well-earned rest.

Rest for the earth, and rest for ourselves, are part of God's grand design; in Leviticus 25 God says to Moses 'When you come into the land which I give you, then the land shall keep a sabbath to the LORD. Six years you shall sow your field, and six years you shall prune your vineyard, and gather its fruit; but in the seventh year there shall be a sabbath of solemn rest for the land, a sabbath to the LORD.' Like us, the earth needs its rest.

It will be very easy in the coming months to forget our need of sabbath rest, swept up in the busy-ness of Harvest, Remembrance and Advent, let alone the run up to Christmas. But this is a season to stop and reflect, to remember and give thanks. I encourage you to make time for such moments of thanksgiving — be they walking through leaves or curled up with a hot chocolate. However long or short a time you have, it will be time well spent.

#### **Sham Family Recipe No.4**

#### Afghan Firni (milk custard desert)

Some real comfort food to enjoy this Autumn!



#### **Ingredients:**

3 cups of milk (any sort of milk will be ok)

3tbs of corn starch

3/4 of a cup of sugar

1/4 tsp cardamom

3-4 saffron threads soaked in 1tblsp of hot water

2 tsp of rose water (optional)

Pistachios and berries for garnish (optional)

#### Method:

- 1. Mix the corn starch into 1 cup of the milk and fold until lump-free.
- 2. Heat 2 cups of milk with the sugar on a medium heat and stir until the sugar dissolves and tiny bubbles form around the edge of the pan. Stir continuously.
- 3. Next, add the corn starch mixture. Stir constantly on medium-low heat until it thickens. Make sure you scrape the bottom to prevent it from sticking or burning.
- 4. After that, add the cardamom, saffron, and rose water if desired.
- 5. The mixture is done when it coats the back of the spoon and doesn't runoff.

- 6. Next, pour the custard into a dish and cover with cling film. Ensure the film touches the custard to prevent a skin from forming on the top. Leave to cool until firm.
- 7. Top with pistachios and berries before serving.

#### **Shoebox appeal 2025**



The Christmas shoebox appeal coordinated by T4U (Teams for You) will be going ahead as normal in November 2025. Preparatory work, led by Judith Powell, is already happening at St James' church, Meltham Mills. I know many of you have contributed to this appeal for many years and are keen to get involved again. Many people from our church also help throughout the year and at the warehouse in November.

So, how can you help? You could fill a shoebox for a child. I have access to plenty of shoeboxes already covered in Christmas wrapping paper, so if you need any to get started, give me a shout. I also have a stock of leaflets with the label to put on the shoebox lid, which I will take to our churches. You could also contribute items ("fillers") for the packing team at St James' to put in shoeboxes.

#### What to put in your box or provide as fillers (examples)

#### **Practical supplies**

- Toothbrush and toothpaste
- Hairbrush/comb
- Facecloth and soap
- Stationery/pens/pencils/paper
- Gloves/hats/scarves
- Craft Pack
- Sewing Kit.

#### A few small gifts

- A soft toy
- A doll
- Ball
- Game or puzzle
- Bubbles
- Musical instrument i.e. harmonica/recorder

St James' church will be open 3-21 November for us to deliver your boxes, so I would be grateful if you could get them to me by **Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> November** I can collect them from church or just let me know if you want me to collect from your house. We are always grateful for people to come and help process the filled shoeboxes before they are sent abroad, even for an hour or two. Please ask me if you need more details. Refreshments including lunch are always available!

If you don't feel you can fill a shoebox but would still like to help, you could pay £20 for someone else to fill a shoebox on your behalf or pay £3.50 to help with the ever-increasing transport costs.

Last year, T4U sent over 60,000 shoeboxes to various countries in Eastern Europe, including nearly 3,500 from Meltham. This year, the shoeboxes will be heading to the Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Bosnia and Romania, and we are hoping to bring "love in a box" to even more needy children.

#### <u>Armitage Bridge Ringers - News From The Belfry</u>

As ringers it is not very often that we get the opportunity to have a leisurely look inside a church where we are visiting to ring. However, on our recent visit to South Wales we had the pleasure to have a look inside St. Meugan's, in Llanfeugan, situated in the middle of nowhere about 5 miles south east of Brecon near to Pencelli.


The church dates back to the 13th century and was reputedly built by Ralph de Mortimer of Pencelli Castle. It sits in a hollow in the Brecon Beacons and is surrounded by ancient yews. As churchyard trees, yews are seen as guardians of the dead, yet as evergreen trees they also symbolise hope and renewal. The yews at Llanfeugan are large imposing trees at the eastern end of the churchyard and are estimated to be over 2,000 years old and probably planted on a sacred site pre-dating Christianity.

Back in the day a popular pastime in Wales was that of "handball", which was played at St. Meugan's in an area west of the tower. This area was kept free of graves to allow the game to be played. A 19th century parishioner recalls the time when the rector and his cohorts played together until the church bells stopped ringing. They would adjourn the game for the duration of the service and resume it again afterwards. Behind the ball-court was a pit where cock-fights were held, especially on Holy Days - the very idea!!!

The bells themselves are now a superb ring of 8, tenor weighing slightly over 12cwt (600 kilos) and are tuned in G. The original 4 bells were recast with 4 more being added in 1921 by Taylors of Loughborough. They were again restored following a bell fund appeal in 2004. Ringers from all over the world travel to ring at Llanfeugan which have one of the finest rings of 8 bells anywhere.

However, the most fantastic aspect of the tower is that it contains hundreds of bats. We were given special permission to view these bats, with the bells ringing out we had to ascend the tower quietly and in small groups to observe what were probably common pipistrelle bats hanging upside down within the bell tower. Although "bats in the belfry" it is a well-known saying they are not usually found where bells are rung regularly as they do not like the vibration. In any case this was a sight that none of us present had seen before and was something we will remember for many years to come.

If anyone is interested we do have a booklet in our tower "The Story Of Llanfeugan"
