


Hello –

Letter from the Vicar, Revd Pam Davies

Dear Friends

As I am writing I am looking out of my study window at the rain coming down on what should be a summer's day. As the saying goes 'the weather can't make its mind up what to do'. It's not too dissimilar when we come to voting. Do we vote for this one or that one in the General Election on the 4th July. The important thing is to vote.

In Britain we have a freedom to vote and have choices many other countries do not have. This got me thinking of how we view freedom. A television commercial announces that buying a certain car or flying with a certain airline will make you "free." People celebrate their country's independence with songs of "freedom" on their lips and ringing in their ears. Politicians, business people, advertisers, salesmen, military leaders and recruiters—all know how to use "freedom" to attract attention and draw interest. Few words are as common while carrying so much weight. Freedom is a basic human desire, so we would expect to read about it in the Bible. While the Bible speaks often of freedom, its focus is most frequently related to the spiritual freedom a person can experience in Christ.

Everyone raised in Sunday school knows "the truth will set you free" (John 8:32) and "it is for freedom that Christ has set us free" (Gal. 5:1). Freedom is not just a British or humanitarian theme; it's also God's theme, its God's Gospel message and what he wants each of us to have. God wants us to have a freedom from all that restricts us in this life and separates us from God. The gospel is unconditional good news. It is not about not having to do something, or obey someone, which is always bad news. No, the gospel is indeed about 'receiving' which is always good news. It's the good news about what freedom you and I 'get to have' as we joyfully let God, through the Spirit, do his work in us: the certainty of knowing we are never facing things alone, we are always loved and the certainty of victory over sin and death. Only when we embrace that victory will we truly be set free.

As we meet together in church each Sunday we are discovering the freedom in knowing Christ, come and join us and discover this new freedom which is waiting there for you to have. Your sincere friend and minister

How to make Lesley's worm bin! What you will need:

A black plastic dust bin with a lid; 3 or 4 house bricks to stand it on; a water but tap; some short, narrow wooden slats, cut to roughly fit in

the bottom of the bin (optional); rubble/larger stones; smaller stones; gravel; piece of sacking/hessian to fit over the stones/wooden slats; circle of old carpet/ bubble wrap (cut to roughly fit top of bin); electric drill with drill bits of 1cm and size of tap fitment and a container to fit under the tap to collect the resulting 'liquor'. Around 100 brandling or tiger worms, gathered from your compost heap, or available to buy at fishing tackle shops or online. I keep the bin warm through the winter months by wrapping the outside with bubble wrap and carpet- ensuring the row of air holes are not covered. A 'stirring' stick! Supply of 'kitchen scraps' - chopped, raw veg and fruit peelings (scant citrus). NO COOKED OR RAW MEATS/ FISH etc., as these could attract vermin.

Choose a flat, sheltered, but accessible site in your garden, e.g. beside the compost heap, or shed. Ensure ground is level, place house bricks in small circle and sit the dustbin on top. Vital that it sits firmly without any wobbling. Use electric drill to make circle of 'air

Building your worm bin:

holes' in the lid and row around top of bin - about 10cm from the rim. Change to the larger drill bit and make access hole for tap near the bottom of the bin. (Take care with all this drilling, to avoid cracking the plastic). Gently screw tap into access hole for a tight fit. Place bin on bricks and add layer of rubble/ larger stones to cover base. Add layer smaller stones/ gravel, then place slats of wood on top (trimmed to roughly fit), leaving a drainage gap between each (optional). Place circle of hessian/ sacking over slats/ stones, to aid liquid drainage. Place a 'bedding' layer of your compost or soil on top of the fabric, add the worms in the centre and then cover with a layer of your 'kitchen peelings'. Loosely place the carpet circle on top, then the lid and the container beneath the tap - checking it's in the 'open' position. Your worm bin is now ready to run! **Notes:** Add peelings <u>regularly</u> and use the stick to gently stir into the under layer where you will see the worms! On removing the lid and carpet, stand back to allow any fruit flies to disperse. Don't be phased by resident slugs and wood lice, as they contribute to the composting process. Continue adding and stirring until bin is full, then leave to break down before adding more. If the mix becomes too wet, the worms will migrate to the rim of the bin—so stir in some shredded paper or cardboard, to absorb excess moisture and balance the mix. Check your container regularly, as the 'liquor' is an excellent allpurpose liquid foliar feed; but dilute roughly 1:10 with rain water before use. Every 3rd year, I completely empty my bin by gently removing the top 'humous' layer containing the worms—keeping it moist and dark. Dig out the 'compost' down to the wooden slats and store. (I mix this with other soils, to treat my special plants!) No need to disturb the slats and drainage layers - just add back a thin layer of the compost, followed by your 'humus' layer containing the worms and start feeding again. If the slats deteriorate - just replace! You can also purchase lime pellets and worm 'treats' online, to balance the process and enhance the worms performance. **Enjoy!**

Colin Campbell

In loving memory of Colin Walter Campbell who sadly passed away on 31st January 2024.

Colin was an Essex boy, who played rugby for his county and was a county athletics champion as a teenager. He joined the Army at 18 and served several tours of Germany and Northern Ireland.

We met at school, but weren't married until 1961. He received his commission in 1966, the year Andrew was born and Debbie followed two years later, in Germany.

Colin left the Army and moved the family to Kent where he trained as a Primary School Teacher before teaching in local schools and began tutoring for 11+ exams when he retired early. He became a Lion and spent time raising money to build the Lions Hospice, now Ellenor, in Gravesend.

Colin's favourite pastime was his caravan and holidaying across Europe independently, using his foreign language skills as he went, later we started travelling further afield and did a house swap in California, travelled New Zealand amongst other places. He loved all kinds of sport but running and Rugby Union were his passion. In 1983 at the age of 45 he ran the London Marathon, in 3hrs 19 minutes, something he was very proud of. He was an active member of Luddesdown Church and worked hard for the maintenance of it for many years.

Despite being desperately ill for some time, he remained 'fine' and kept his stiff upper lip to the end, displaying his army training to the last.



BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

Jan Morris wrote that she had concluded that Barchester had all but vanished, even from Wells. A Bedfordshire church crawl had been planned by me with a ramble of words afterwards for the magazine. Plans changed. However, at the College reading that perceptive and evocative article by Jan Morris on Wells reminded me of several visits to that special place. A city since the tenth century Wells is untroubled by a railway station nor a motorway.

The superb Cathedral rejoices in four hundred statues on the medieval west front, the amazing scissor arch at the crossing to support the central tower and the picturesque 14th century double row of houses of Vicar's Close. Despite the best efforts of the Church of England the Bishop of Bath and Wells still lives in the Bishop's Palace and the swans in the moat continue to ring the bell for their food. This glorious cathedral has the heaviest ten bell ring in the country with the tenor bell weighing 56cwt. Enjoying a walk round the city streets on one visit to Wells we ringers popped into the fine parish church of St. Cuthbert. Their eight bell ring has a tenor weighing a considerable 27cwt. Ringing friends now living in nearby Wookey are happy to ring in their parish church with a ring of 6 bells with an 11cwt tenor. (Cobham has 6 bells with a 13cwt tenor). Intrigued by almshouses I was amazed to see adjacent to St. Cuthbert's a cluster of four sets of almshouses from the 15th to 18th centuries, two endowed by former Bishops. Close by were also two more sets of almshouses, one for 'poor decayed woolcombers'. None had the roofing problems Cobham College and us pensioner residents are currently suffering. D-Day in 1984 was the 40th Anniversary and also Derby Day. While The Queen Mother was at the races Queen Elizabeth II was in Normandy. The late Queen was again in Normandy on the 6th June for the 50th, 60th and 70th Anniversaries.

On the 5th June 2019 Her Late Majesty, in pink, was on Southsea Common with the other Dignatories for the 75th Anniversary of D-Day. Queen Elizabeth II was the only person on the royal dais who had served in the Second World War. The next day we rang our Cobham bells for Stewart Pickerings Thanksgiving service. Now this year a new King and Queen are in Normandy for the D-Day 80th Anniversary.

Church towers were asked to ring at 6.30pm on the 6th June. So just before the Two Women Event in the church our band of ringers rang our bells as part of the anniversary commemoration..



1984 - the burning of York Minster

Forty years ago, on 9th July 1984, York Minster was struck by lightning, which set fire to the roof and destroyed the south transept.

It was the most recent of five fires that have occurred there over the years: the causes have ranged from workmen burning coals (1753) through arson using torn-up hymnbooks (1829) to an unattended candle (1840) and a tarpaulin catching fire (1971). Although night lightning was the official explanation in 1984, some suggested that God might have been reacting to the very recent appointment as Bishop of Durham of the Rt Revd David Jenkins, a famously controversial cleric whose comments had seemed to cast doubt on the virgin birth and the Resurrection. He had been consecrated at York Minster three days earlier.

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Habgood, described that idea as "ridiculous", though some – including a few members of the fire service – felt that arson by objectors could not be ruled out. As many as 114 firefighters from were involved in tackling the blaze. Insurance cover on the Minster had just been increased by its treasury department: the damage to the south transept, with its wooden vaulted roof, amounted to £2.25 million.

York Minster is a huge landmark: many consider it to be one of Europe's most impressive Gothic buildings. The glass in its famous 16th century Rose Window, which had recently been renovated, cracked into 40,000 pieces, but the new lead edges held it all together. Queen Elizabeth attended the rededication ceremony in October 1988. This year a new exhibition called *Out of the Ashes* tells the story of the blaze and marks its anniversary.

Keep plants looking good by regularly dead-heading, and you'll enjoy a longer display of blooms. Make sure you keep new plants well-watered, using grey water where possible, and hoe off weeds, which thrive in the sunshine. Top 10 RHS jobs this month

- I. Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt
- 2. Care for houseplant while on holiday
- 3. Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise
- 4. Deadhead bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, to ensure continuous flowering
- 5. Pick courgettes before they become marrows
- 6.Treat apple scab
- 7.Clear algae, blanket weed and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up
- 8. Order catalogues for next year's spring-flowering bulbs
- 9. Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if not given a spring feed
- 10. Harvest apricots, peaches, and nectarines
