BELL RINGING by Peter Hartley

The Nation has mourned the death of Queen Elizabeth II and we have shared in the grief of the new King and the Royal Family and shown them our loyalty and support whilst they have been called to grieve in public. Especially in the last twenty years the long-standing plan “London Bridge” on the death of the Sovereign has been worked on to ensure the myriad of detail fully involves all the agencies of the State. This careful labour has borne fruit with the magnificent and moving scenes we have witnessed. We have seen those who have a proper and visible public role to play. But there is a vast array of people who work away willingly though often unseen – the chair arrangers, the crush barrier providers, the street cleaners, the riggers of the media now properly an integral part of state ceremonial. There are the posties, transport drivers, caterers, first aiders and volunteer marshals who have looked after the general public now also a proper dimension of state ceremonial. Park keepers have laid out flowers, blankets and water has been provided. The police and security services have kept us all safe. So many and very many more ensured all honour was properly paid to the late Queen.

I have been asked for a little detail on what our unseen but heard band of Cobham bell ringers did on the death of Queen Elizabeth II for we have tried and wanted to play our part in the national thanksgiving for the life and long reign of our quietly remarkable Queen. We had guidelines of ringing protocol from the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, drawn up in accordance with “London Bridge”, and helpfully all towers were asked to do their best. We did.

On Thursday 8th September following the announcement of the Death of The Queen the flag was flown at half-mast on the church tower and a bell was tolled 96 times.

The next day, as directed, the tenor bell, the heaviest and deepest sounding, was tolled half-muffled from Noon to 1.00pm. A muffle is a leather pad strapped to one side of the clapper so that the bell sounds softly and loudly alternatively.

At 7pm we rang fully-muffled with the tenor open at backstroke. This is only ever done on the death of the Sovereign. Bells 1 to 5 have muffles on both sides of the clapper with the heavy tenor still only half-muffled. So only every 12th bong is loud with each cycle of handstroke and backstroke. We rang Rounds (1 2 3 4 5 6 1 2 3 4 5 6) and calling the bells into Queens (1 3 5 2 4 6).

On Saturday 10th September for the Accession Council and Principal Proclamation the flag was raised to full-mast for 24 hours and all muffles were removed. We rang Rounds, Queens and Kings (5 3 1 2 4 6) and some method ringing (changing patterns or order) with the bells open in celebration of the new Reign of King Charles III.

On Friday 16th September at the Vigil of the Princes we rang a fully-muffled Quarter Peal of Grandsire Doubles in final tribute to the late Queen. The tenor bell always remains half-muffled or open at backstroke giving a loud steady rhythm every 12th sounding.

For Sunday Service ringing fully-muffled we rang Rounds, Queens and Kings.

On Monday 19th September for the State Funeral, with our bells fully-muffled, from 10am to 11am Rounds were rung and for the last 10 minutes each adult Cobham ringer tolled the tenor for a minute.

The next day with the ending of National Mourning the flag came down and the muffles came off.

Our lovely Band of Cobham Ringers of Byron Aldous, Christian Antrobus, Stuart Edwards, Florence Hemp, Martha Hyde, Mike Hyde, Nigel Pagram, Simon Williamson and me had willingly and with pride played a part in an historic moment marking, with many emotions, the ending of a Second Elizabethan Age.

And in St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle I had attended The Committal of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and had bade

a loving farewell to my Queen,

a grateful farewell to our Queen,

and a world-wide farewell to The Queen.

Postscript : Times are always changing.

In this year of very significant change a visiting band of bell ringers plan to ring a full peal at Cobham on Thursday 10th November between approximately 10.30am and 1.30pm consisting of 5,040 changes.

North Kent Embroiderers



Our last meeting included an excellent talk by Lydia Stonely of www.pollyhadadolly.co.uk Lydia used lots of different dolls to illustrate what she was saying and all her work was beautiful. She began making dolls' clothes at the age of ten, when she was given a sewing machine, but went on to read Industrial design at Brunel. She worked for several big companies until she was expecting her first daughter, when she

started dressmaking, which fitted in better with looking after children. She then began making dolls for her daughters and was "hooked".

Although the basic process is the same, there is a lot of variation in her work because each doll is unique and personalised. Lydia makes them according to the information given by parents. All her dolls are based on North European dolls and have been inspired by the work of Rudolf Steiner (1920's).

The dolls' bodies are made using sheep's wool from British breeds. This means that it is sustainable, the doll is warm to hold, it is anti-bacterial and can be washed.

Lydia showed us and explained how the head and other body parts are made from the wool, and how she then covers it with very stretchy material, using a variety of skin shades. She also explained how she embroiders the eyes and mouth, to create 'simple' faces, and uses beeswax crayon to colour the cheeks/ put freckles on.



Hair is either crocheted and attached, shown by a different colour fabric, or by needle felting of the 'body wool'.

Finally, she explained how she is required to do Certified Safety Testing on each doll – for flammability, washing, strength of seams etc and to ensure that no pins or needles are left in the doll's body. She gets help with this through the Toy Makers Guild.



The other service was in Cobham on the 18th taken by Rev'd Elizabeth Chapman. We are grateful to both clergy for taking these services. Bell 6 was tolled at Luddesdowne church on Friday the 9th at 12 noon, and on the 19th for an hour from 10am before our Queen's funeral service. Also all 6 bells were rung on the 11th at 1pm for the Royal succession.

We had our churches open at various times for anyone to come and sign the condolence books, to light a candle, to have a time of quiet, reflection and/or prayer, and some people left flowers by the Jubilee Tree in Luddesdowne churchyard. For those of you who came into our churches during these times we hope you found it helpful.



On the 25th September Luddesdowne had their Harvest Festival service, at which the fresh produce that was on display and brought to the service went to the Ellenor Hospice, we were able to take two carrier bags, a plastic tray full and a large box full. The packets and tins went to the Foodbank and Sue and Colin had a car load full (95.5kilos / 210lbs). Our thanks to Holly for spreading the word on Whatsapp as we found produce at the church that morning. Thank you to all who donated.

The service was conducted by Rev'd Keith White and the collection was given to Tear Fund towards the Pakistan Emergency Flood Appeal, which we were able to send an amazing £640.00. A letter of thanks is on P.19 A big thank you to Sue and Elizabeth for decorating the church, making it look wonderful in the church and in the porch.

Dear Friends

Thank you so much for your gift of £640. Your support will make an immediate difference to people suffering because of the floods in Pakistan.

'In the beginning the water came very slowly, so we didn't realise how serious the situation was,' says Naseebo, a 43-year-old mother of five from south Punjab. 'Then very suddenly the water was overwhelming.'

'Initially the roof of my house was dripping with the rain but it could not sustain the pressure of the heavy rains and eventually it collapsed. We managed to take a few items from home, but the flood has left me and my family with basically nothing.'

Tearfund's local partner is providing families like Naseebo's with cooked food, safe drinking water and tents. 'Without that help, I really don't know what we would have done,' says Naseebo. '[They] made sure we were safe. Without them I don't want to think about what could have happened.'

November

Winter is on its way

Leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots in situ. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up.

RHS - Top 10 jobs this month

- 1 Clear up fallen leaves - especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- 2 Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- 3 Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- 4 Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- 5 Plant out winter bedding
- 6 Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- 7 Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubble wrap works well
- 8 Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
- 9 Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden
- 10 Use a seasonal bonfire - where this is allowed - to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting



