Candlemas - Presentation of Christ in the Temple

One of my favourite festivals of the Church's year occurs on February 2nd - although in the benefice we celebrated it last month on Sunday 29th. It is the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, also known as

Candlemas. The set gospel reading for this festival is from Luke 2. 22-32. It tells of the occasion of the young baby Jesus being brought to the temple in Jerusalem by Mary and Joseph - to present Him to the Lord. This was a Jewish custom of the time for every first born male.

Our gospel account is one of the very few we have about the childhood of Jesus. All scripture tells us about the early life of Jesus is in Luke 2.40: 'that He grew and became strong, filled with wisdom and the favour of God was with Him'. When Jesus (aged 12) stayed behind on another visit to the Jerusalem temple, upon his return home similar words were written: 'He increased in wisdom, stature and favour with God and men' But why, may you ask, is this Festival also called Candlemas? It all has to do with light! In a gospel reading the aged Simeon sees the infant Jesus and proclaims that he is: ' to be the light to lighten the Gentile, which his eyes had at last seen as God's promise of salvation.' This is expressed in the beautiful prayer the Nunc Dimittis, sung or said at evensong and other times.

In the Old and New Testaments the number 40 is used to signify a period of time as a preparation before a major event or change . For example Noah had to wait 40 days for the flood waters to subside, the Israelites waited 40 years in the wilderness of Sinai before the entered the promised land and Jesus fasted for 40 days in the desert- a time we recall during the period of Lent . Although not recorded as such as a period of time in the New Testament there are 40 days from Christmas day to February 2nd. Symbolically a time of change from the 12 days of Christmas and the 28 days of Epiphany.

Like Christmas the Church christianised a pagan/celtic festival held early in February, namely the festival of Imbloc, to celebrate the signs of spring with the noticeably increasing length of daylight with the flowers commencing to bloom and new born lambs in the fields. The dark, long nights of winter were coming to an end. Candlemas symbolises the light proclaimed by Simeon as Jesus being a light (an awareness) to the Gentiles as to his identity as God's son and His mission - and the light (the joy) of the darkness of winter being dispelled. For Jesus is the supreme measure of candlepower- the old measure of the intensity of light- for He, through the power of the Holy Spirit, illuminates our lives through the Church, the sacraments, scripture and individuals.

Happy Candlemas!

The Letters of Peter the Apostle

Peter was foremost among the 12 disciples and became the leader of the first Christians. He is considered to be the author of two letters and names himself 'Simon Peter' at the start of his second letter. Both letters were written during AD 60-65 towards the end of Peter's life in Rome.

The first letter was addressed to Christians living throughout various Roman provinces in Asia Minor (now present Turkey). Peter described Christians as God's chosen people. The main purpose of the letter was to encourage those facing suffering and persecution for their faith and emphasised that, in spite of this suffering, they have a 'living hope'.

'Let us give thanks to the Father of Lord Jesus Christin His great mercy He has given us a living hope......

Into an inheritance that can never perish ... kept in heaven for you' 1: 3-4

This is followed in 2.11 to 4.11 by Peter detailing the Christian code of conduct as *'living stones and 'a chosen people'* and maintaining their Christian witness to the world by using *'whatever gift received for serving others'*. Chapter 4 concludes with although they experience trial and sufferings for their faith they should rejoice that they

'participate in the sufferings of Christ'.

The final chapter is an exhortation to elders 'to be shepherds of God's flock that is in your care' 5.2 and to young men' and to be 'submissive to those who are older' 5. 3

The 2nd letter is addressed to a wider circle of the early Christians with its main concern being to combat the work of false teachers and the resultant immorality from their teaching. In the last chapter the letter describes God's timelessness and concludes with the promise of Christ's return and God's judgement:



' do not forget dear friends that with the Lord a day is like a thousand years and a thousand vears like a day.

For the Lord is not slow in keeping his promiseHe is patient with you not wanting anyone to perish, but to repent '3. 8,9

Both letters are instructive for believers today, just as much they were for first century Christians. The letters give advice on how to cope with suffering, and instruct believers of their role in mission and outreach to the wider community.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I write this, we have had quite a mild winter, so far. We have only seen a slight flurry of snow and have only had a couple of frosts that are worth mentioning.

But it is dark. There is not much daylight about at this time of year. This January has also felt a little darker than previous years, as we mourn the loss of Geoff Willetts our beloved Reader.

On Thursday 2nd February in the church calendar it is the feast of Candlemas.

This ancient festival marks the midpoint of winter, half way between the shortest day and the spring equinox. It also means that 40 days have passed since the celebration of Christmas!

Candlemas is a festival based around the Jewish requirement that 40 days after the birth of a baby boy, he should be brought to the Temple to be presented to God. In the Bible, the book of Luke tells the account of Mary and Joseph doing just this with Jesus. It is why Candlemas is also known as 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple'.

While Jesus, Mary and Joseph were in the Temple, some people named Simeon and Anna saw the infant Jesus and proclaimed to everyone that he was God's promised Messiah – the one who would be a light to the world. And because Jesus was recognised as the light of the world, it became custom at this time of the year for people to bring their lights (candles), to church in order for them to be blessed – hence 'Candlemas'. We still use candles very often in church. They are symbols not only of Jesus being a light that shows us the way, but also help us to remember people and places in prayer.

The darkness of February is a good month to spend some time in candlelight in your own home, remembering that even though we are still in the darkness of winter, the days are getting longer and the light is returning. Jesus is the light of the world, a light which the darkness cannot extinguish. Where would you like to see his light shining this year?

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

Forgiving and Forgiven

Every time we go to church we bring an offering as a gift to God -- it is a very important part of our worship. There are many places in the Bible that teach us the importance of presenting an offering to God, but the truth is that God is more interested in what's in our heart than he is in what's in our hand.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said to people long ago, 'You must not murder. If you commit murder, you will be subject to judgment.' But I say, even if you are angry with someone, you are subject to judgment." He went on to say that you will face God's judgment if you call someone a bad name or curse them.

What did Jesus say we should do if we are guilty of any of these things? He said, "If you are presenting your offering to God and you remember that you have said something that hurt another person, leave your gift at the altar and go and ask forgiveness from that person. Then come back and offer your gift to God."

Before we give our offering, perhaps we should ask ourselves a few questions. Have I been angry with someone recently? Have I had any arguments lately? Have I called someone a bad name? Have I said something about someone that wasn't true? If so, we should ask God to forgive us and we should go to the



person we have hurt and ask them to forgive us. When we have done that, God will be pleased with our offering.

"Forgive" is a great old hymn written by Corinne Williams. The first verse of this hymn would be a good prayer.



Nature Notes by Bluebell - February 2017

"When icicles hang by the wall,
And Dick the shepherd blows his nail,
And Tom bears logs into the hall,
And milk comes frozen

home in pail,
When blood is nipped and ways be foul,
Then nightly sings the staring owl,
Tu-whit.

Three little jack snipe jink up and out of the short wet grass in the Barn Field; the drumming of a Greater Spotted Woodpecker rings out by day through bare trees; tawny owls hoot under the silver moon; robins and blackbirds, even a song thrush are singing, especially when it is just getting light in the morning. Blue-



bell's jackdaws are hanging around, and in the pure high blue firmament a pair of ravens demonstrate their wonderful flying skills. They mate early, in January, and are becoming more numerous (*Bird Atlas 2007-11*). They do not wait till St Valentine's Day, when by tradition the birds hold their Parliament to choose their mates, and start to sing.

Bluebell was excited to find star jelly again this year, this time near leats and bog on Dartmoor. These milky clumps of jelly are most likely unfertilized spawn from frog or toads, which swells up when exposed to damp and air, unpalatable to predators.

February brings a stop, start, hope of Spring, and snowdrops at Candlemas, when if molehills cast a shadow this is supposed to forecast cold weather:

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Winter'll have another flight. But if Candlemas Day be clouds and rain, Winter is gone and will not come again.

Lily is fascinated by moles. She stalks the lines of little red volcanic explosions and stands patiently motionless, one paw lifted, pointing, listening, ready to pounce like a cat or a fox. And she has actually caught a few moles, though not many.



What molehills signal today is the health of the soil. "A mole signals worms as reliably as a canary down a coal mine signals gas.....Darwin estimated that arable land contains up to 53,000 worms per acre ... "it may be doubted whether there are many other animals which have played so important a part in the history of the world as have these lowly organised creatures." Darwin; *The Formation of Vegetable Mould through the Action of Worms, 1881*, quoted by John Lewis Stemple in *The Running Hare 2016*.



GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG

By the time you read this, I hope you will have seen signs of winter loosening its grip; the daffodils, snowdrops and other budding signs of new life. And, oh joy, the rhododendrons!

Longer days, flowers to marvel at, buds aplenty.

Even the ivy and brambles are stirring – bah, humbug to those ever present nuisances! And, in my garden, the bittercress is determinedly on the march; unstoppable stuff! Before moving to Devon I rarely saw this magnificent weed, or perhaps I just didn't notice it? Now I see it everywhere. It is just <u>so</u> easy to grow (something for the grandchildren?). Part of the problem is the seed-heads which, if you touch them - and it's usually something else which



does, not you – they explode! **Boom!** And a radius of 3 ft is showered in seed. A very effective strategy if you want to reproduce. There are a few types – you can have *Cardamine hirsute* or *flexuosa* – both can sneak into your garden in container-grown plants – they're a free gift alongside the plant you bought. The upside – yes, there is one - they are very easily pulled out, complete with all the roots. Oh, if only dandelions were so easy!

Doug, hopes that Digger (who contributed the Garden Notes for years) has found his plot in paradise and is busy planning. I hope it's a good plot, a magnificent vista, that he's got his tools and his seed catalogues sorted and the orders flying. Maybe there are new things to learn, different plants, different climate? I'm sure there are, that's the joy of gardening — even each year is different – and he'll be very happy with that and I wish him well. Good luck with it Digger!




