The Two Old Testament Books of Ezra & Nehemiah by lan Silcox



These 2 books complement each other in that they cover a period from about 538BC to 428BC when the Jews returned to their homeland from which they were exiled to Babylon some 70 years earlier. The return was not a single event; the first stage is recorded in Ezra chapters 1 and 2, the second in chapters 3 to 6 and the final stage is detailed in Nehemiah. The return was made possible by an edict of King Cyrus of Persia proclaiming at the end of the 2nd book of Chronicles '*The Lord, the God of heaven has given me all the kingdoms of the earth and He has appointed me to build a temple for Him in Jerusalem in Judah. Anyone of His people among you – may the Lord God, be with him and let them go up*' see also Chapter 1 of Ezra verses 2-4.

These people, the descendants of those originally exiled, are listed in detail in Chapter 2 of Ezra. In spite of opposition of the families of those who did not go to Babylon a start was made rebuilding the temple, the destroyed temple of Solomon, under the guidance of Zerubbabel, the grandson of King Jehoiachin, rededicated and a Passover celebrated - see Ezra 6: 13-22. The second party returns now with Ezra; a priest descended from Aaron and a scholar in the law - see chapters 7 and 8. Ezra as a priest and scholar was the leader in restoring the Jews religious life, worship and restoring their unique role of God's chosen people.

Nehemiah, also a returned exile, was appointed by Cyrus as governor of the province Judea and was a man of action who inspired the rebuilding of the Jerusalem city walls despite opposition; which overlapped the work of Ezra and both with their different roles were instrumental in restoring not only temple worship and practices but making Jerusalem secure from attack

So, what can we learn from them today? I would say that through prayer and God inspired leaders both religious and in our civil life our Christian heritage and values can be not only renewed, but be an example to society at large.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Over the past week I have had the privilege of conducting a Wedding and Baptism, as well as an all-age service. As the parent of a toddler myself, I know how difficult it can be to bring a small child to church, let alone to try and keep them entertained during a sermon! I found the following on the *Facebook* page for Grimsby Minster and I print it here to give some encouragement to all of you who bring young people to church.

"There you are at church. Your baby or toddler is restless. Perhaps even a little boisterous. You try to silence them, and nothing. You try to pacify them with food or toys, and nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do: you pick them up, and before a watching audience, you make the march out of the church. All the while you're a little embarrassed, maybe a little frustrated too. You might even think to yourself, "There's no point in coming to church. I get nothing out of it because I have to constantly care for my kid.

"I want you - mothers and/or fathers - to know just how encouraging you are to so many. The elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because to hear that brings back precious memories. Seeing young parents and their small children brighten her day; she may have just received bad news about her health but seeing the vitality of young ones removes - if but for a moment - her fears.

"The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He's always talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of goodness. But he sees you - a young family - in church every week. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the Church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to church.

"Bring your children to church! If we don't hear crying, the church is dying. As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half-asleep, keep on doing what you're doing. You are an encouragement, and you're starting off your children's lives as you should."


Jesus replied, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting. I have appeared to appoint you as my servant and to be a witness for me."



Possibly not the first time you've heard this, but Doug's hoping his car windscreen gets plastered in insects sometime this century or, better still, before 2050 or 2025. Years ago, travelling on holiday from the industrial power-house up North to the sunny South West my Dad always had to stop every few hours to clear the

windscreen of dead insects. Perhaps the aerodynamics of cars has improved and perhaps insects have got wiser about hurtling lumps of metal, but I can't remember stopping to clean a windscreen in any recent decade? There has been a lot in the press about the decline of insects and the need to protect bees (and not just honey bees) to facilitate pollination of crops and also the greater natural wild world. Many young people are understandably concerned and we are all being urged to plant plants which help encourage insects to thrive. Many other activities too look to reduce our impact on our planet. So, if you want to help a bit, get sowing and drive a bit more slowly so they can get out of the way – especially on the moor?

If you haven't got a gooseberry bush you're missing out. Mine are coming on fine and you don't see many in the shops. I've sown some Kohl Rabi – which I've never grown before – just as an experiment. Delicious eaten raw grated in salads, or in place of turnips, it says on the packet. Why not sow something new and exotic yourself? What the heck if it fails to excite later in the year, but it could be absolutely lovely. Somehow the plums seem to have survived the recent frosts, which is more than I can say for some of the Zinnias which I was too quick to 'acclimatise'. Fortunately, there's more seed in the packet. The courgettes are coming on and the beans and the cucumbers and the lettuce and kale. It's not too late if you're behind!

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

"Glory be to God for dappled things-For skies of couple-colour as a brinded cow; For rose-moles all in stipple upon trout that swim; Fresh-firecoal chestnut-falls; finches wings Landscape plotted and pieced – fold, fallow, and plough;" Gerard Manley Hopkins – Pied Beauty

Spring is unfurling into summer and the bluebells are beginning to fade, but they have been wonderful and many still lie in the shade of the woods, under the tender green of new beech leaves, and amongst the red campion, cowparsley, and bursting green shuttlecock ferns in our deep Devon lanes. Also, in the woods and in some hedge banks, early purple orchids *(orchis mascula)* can be seen in breathtaking pools of deep purple among the dogs mercury and wild garlic.

"Half the world's bluebells grow in Britain: they have played their part in our island story." (John Lewis-Stempel). Their sap made the glue used for centuries to bind pages in books and feathers to arrow-shafts, and the starch for ruffs and lace.

There is good news on our beautiful native bluebells: genetic research is proving that they are far more fertile than the invasive Spanish bluebell and fears that our bluebells may be driven into extinction are almost certainly groundless. (Professor Pete Hollingworth, Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh, *Conservation Genetics, Times May 8th 2019*). The UK bluebell has flowers on one side of a curving stalk, the Spanish one is paler and sturdier, with flowers circling the stalk.

Hawthorn or May blossom is overwhelming the trees with creamy white blossom, all along the hedgerows. There are a lot of grey squirrels about. "Shadow tail" is destructive to trees and even nesting birds, but the tree-rat's beautiful tail and lively athleticism and inquisitiveness give it charm.

Dartmoor hill ponies, semi-wild, have grazed Dartmoor for at least 4,000 years. Now modern agricultural policy is putting these unique animals at risk. As recently as the 1950's 10,000 ponies roamed Dartmoor. Today, their numbers are down to about 1,000. The problem is a consequence of DEFRA subsidies intended to encourage grazing animals which help maintain the Moorland, but which favour cattle over ponies. A simple change in DEFRA's subsidy policy could save them. That change needs to be made, and soon. (From The Times May 18th 2019).

FARMING LIFE BY HAYSEED




The last time I wrote, I was concerned about how much forage we had and if it would last the rest of winter. I needn't have worried had I. We farmers were blessed with an early spring, with plenty of grass. I see lambs are putting on weight and my calves from spring born cows are all growing away well, 'specially with sunshine on their backs.

Dairy cows are milking well but in all fairness, there's nothing better than grass grown in May and June! We're also feeding some winter haylage that's left over to the cows to help keep milk quality up. I've been doing that since I first started working with cows more than 50 years ago but it's now referred to as "buffer feeding" and in some quarters as a new innovation.

As I write this in mid May, some of my neighbours have had their first cuts of sileage and with two or more cuts this summer it was good for them to get this done. Hayseed's herbal lays are just a bit slower growing but I anticipate us harvesting haylage by the time you read this.

"All the best hay's made on Midsummer's day".... There's another old farming quote for you to muse over. Midsummer, now celebrated on 21 June, was originally a feast day of St. John the Baptist and was celebrated on 24 June. Either way, with a pen name like mine I'll be hoping for a good summer with a successful crop being made on both days if I'm lucky.
