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

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Dear Friends,

The Easter story is one which we are all familiar with. But before we can celebrate the joy of Easter Sunday, we must all pass through the cross of Good Friday. This past year has felt like a cross we have all had to bear, but we are an Easter people and we know that there will be joy and celebration when all of this passes.

We have only to watch the TV or see adverts on the internet, to see that modern-day culture encourages us all to miss Good Friday. The adverts tell us that we can have the perfect body, without the need for exercise or a good diet. Or how we can make a fortune, without any risk or having to spend years in education. Modern culture encourages us all to look for short cuts. Yet deep down we all know that unless we are willing to endure the struggle and the sacrifice, the final reward is rarely as it had been advertised.

Our Christian life is no different. During Lent, we are encouraged to 'take up our cross daily, and follow him'. This act of taking up our cross is at the heart of what Lent should be about. This should not be an act of sackcloth and ashes, but rather a celebration. A celebratory act of joyful self-abandonment and laying aside of all that keeps us from being the people God made us to be, people who like him love freely and unconditionally. Such self-abandonment is not easy because we have become secure and comfortable in what we know. To lay aside all we know can be a frightening and uncomfortable prospect. When we are afraid and uncertain we need to remind ourselves that behind the suffering of the cross, there is the risen Christ.

During Lent, I hope that we have all thought about what we might lay aside so that we can become the people we were made to be. We might have asked ourselves what the suffering of the last year has revealed to us about the society in which we live. Or about what we might need to do differently in the coming years? I wonder what cross we are being called to bear, so that we can not only truly celebrate Easter, but also live something more of the life that Christ promises to all who follow him.

So after what seems like an eternity, passing through our own Good Friday, we will have our Easter Sunday. On Easter Sunday the 4th of April, we will be returning to regular worship in church, when there will be a service at Lamerton and Marystowe. Sadly though, we are still unable to sing in church, so our usual 'Songs of Praise' services will change to ones of Evening Prayer.

During the lockdowns, we have made great use of social media and I hope that this continues in the future. We plan to put news of events on all of our platforms, to reach as many people as possible.

Benefice Cookbook



OPEN THE BOOK

It was a year ago when I last wrote about Open the Book. It is great to be able to have some news to share again!

Open the Book is a national Charity with **over 11,000 volunteer storytellers sharing Bible Stories with over 2,000 Primary Schools**. It provides a programme to follow which begins with a chronological series of stories from Creation through to Ascension. Thereafter the stories are grouped together around themes giving the opportunity for more insight and discussion whilst still providing the simpler story telling pleasure to the younger children.

The storytelling happened in the schools until last March; with the help of Open the Book training and Q and A, together with the IT skills of Reverend Andy (Lamerton) and Father Philip (Lewtrenchard) we are now doing live Zoom sessions and are still able to include the children in the stories. Using Zoom has been a learning curve that may well have peaked when the wine server at the Wedding in Canaan (on one screen) passed a glass of water to the Wedding Guest (another screen), who appeared to reach out and take it and then lifted a glass of red wine! It is, of course, a closely guarded secret as to whether the guest had blackcurrant juice or claret, but it was lunchtime!

In a different slant on story telling, the Palm Sunday story is being covered in the form of a newsflash with a roving reporter speaking with the crowds in Jerusalem (the classes in school).

I'm writing this while listening to Gardeners' Question Time. The daffodils are out, the sky is blue - although it won't be tomorrow - but, spring *is* here! The days are longer and the soil is warming. I hope you're looking forward to a successful summer in *your* garden. My tomato seeds are growing nicely and

garden. My tomato seeds are growing nicely and some other seeds have been planted; beetroot, chillies, salad leaves, courgettes, parsley, etc. The sweet peas sown a few weeks ago are coming on. I'll soon be sowing some other flower seeds nicotianas, pot marigolds.

A member of the audience is asking about a preparation to spray on apple trees to stop the fruit falling? An interesting chemical solution is proposed. Another question is about red spider mites; again to be given the chemical treatment. A solution to a slug problem is a non-chemical device sold at some inflated cost - a block of wood and a mallet! There's a 'fair sprinkling of women in the audience' apparently and one of them asks about the uses of soot (although everyone is pronouncing it 'suit' when I'd pronounce it 'sutt'). The chairman says how it's 'typical of a woman to ask one question but want three answers'. Can it be used as a fertiliser, an insecticide and as a feed? 'Is it worth saving the 'suit', she asks? You see she collects it when doing the spring cleaning; 'You men don't know what that is!. Spring Cleaning!' That aside, it's all terribly well-spoken, posh even. Well, it was the first, recorded on 9th April 1947. If you would like to listen it's on the BBC <u>Archive</u> website, just search for Gardeners' Question Time there. You'll find the very first one from 1947 and 622 others. You'll also find lots of Gardeners' World episodes.

Don't forget to feed your roses. Now is the time. And, take care when out in the garden with tools and machinery; don't go and hurt either yourself or any wildlife. Watch out when strimming for example. Don't hit a frog, or a nesting hedgehog. Remember they both like slugs. Very useful if you can't afford that wooden block and a mallet.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

Grey light, grey trees give way to lambs and daffodils, shafts of sunlight on a little clump of primroses. Spring bounds in, the air is rinsed with light, and birds begin to sing. Our wonderful dawn chorus starts. In Bluebell's garden the tawny owl is still hunting when the first robins and blackbirds welcome the new day.

Bird song is an exclusively learned behaviour, and this is very rare. Humans do vocal learning, so do dolphins, whales, elephants and bats, and over 6,000 species of birds. These include perching birds (Passeriformes), hummingbirds and parrots. Song-birds are Passeriformes, and their songs possess the greatest diversity of vocal learning behaviour anywhere in the natural world.

Which is most beautiful, the song of the blackbird, nightingale, robin, wren, or skylark? Artists, poets and musicians have long loved songbirds and been inspired by the little feathered creatures. Mozart had his starling, Keats his nightingale and Beethoven based the famous "fate" motif of his fifth symphony upon the song of a Viennese yellowhammer ("a little bit of bread and no cheese"). Many birds sing with a local dialect.

Female robins, dunnocks and starlings and many tropical songbirds sing, though song used to be seen as an exclusively male trait, used for territorial defence, and wooing of a mate.

In the 1950s, following the declassification of technology originally used to identify warships in the Second World War, the use of spectrographs triggered a golden age of song research.

It was proved that there are two distinct phases in the song learning process: the initial "sensory phase", when the young bird learns a template of its song, and the "sensorimotor phase" when it learns with high accuracy the song of its family, which then crystallizes, though some birds, canaries, and starlings, can add new material throughout their lives and are "open-ended" learners.

FARMING LIFE, BY HAYSEED



Spring is just around the corner - any livestock farmer has his (or her) hands full at that point. The beef cows are starting to calve and the main flock of ewes are in full swing lambing.

Although the official date for Spring to begin is the 15th of March, there is still much winter fodder to be fed. It will be a few weeks before we get a good grazing crop of grass, a must for any dairy herd. Ideally they need a fresh grazing area every day to maintain consistent milk production and whilst quotas have been removed a number of years, consistency to your milk buyer is a mainstay of a good milk contract and sound pricing.

It was once stated by The Devon Grassland Society - in one of their quarterly newsletters - that grass leys were one of the most demanding crops on the farm and one of the worst managed! A very bold statement but grassland management has to be of a high standard. The winter season gives the farm grass leys a good rest. Hayseed's livestock are still housed so that makes it possible.

Lime content and the pH readings have already been mentioned in the past - I can't talk about grassland unless I mention that good old Farm Yard Manure AGAIN! Providing it is well rotted it contains a number of essential trace elements for the grass roots. It also makes it easier to spread if it is well rotted too. Another important task requires giving the grass ley a good chainharrowing. This levels out the odd rough patch and aerates the grass "sward". It gives the grassland chance to "breath" That is followed by rolling the grass, ideally a week or so later after some rain, this will encourage regrowth. The next job depends on the farming system - Artificial fertiliser in the form of Nitrogen, Phosphate and Potash (N.P.K) as it is known provides leaf and root growing elements. If the farm is organically registered then leaf and root trace elements are provided in a different way.

All of this leads us back to the fact that you can't "take out" without "putting something back" - A bit like life really.

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
