Questions in Faith

Sooner or later every Christian is approached by someone who asks a question they cannot really answer. This can be embarrassing and can undermine both their own faith and the faith of the questioner – if they have one! In this series I throw up questions and suggest answers designed to appeal to people of faith and no faith at all. Some examples:

- Do we have to hate our family to become disciples of Jesus? (See below)
- Do you believe in Angels? Where is the evidence?
- Why did Jesus sometimes refer to peoples' sins while healing them?
- Did Jesus's miracles really happen? How did they work? Why were they necessary? Do they happen today?
- Why do bad things happen to good people?
- Why does God allow innocent children to die?
- What is the point of the devil? Has God lost control?

First Question – a particularly disturbing one! ***"If anyone comes to Me and does not hate his father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters - yes, even his own life - he cannot be My disciple"*** Luke 14:26(NIV)

This is a profoundly worrying command for most Christians. Firstly, this may be an issue of translation of *Luke's* record of this event. The Greek word **Hate** (misei) can be translated 'hate or detest' - but also 'love less' or 'esteem less'. The translation are divided. Personally, I prefer the '**New Life**' Bible one which reads: *"You cannot be my disciple, unless you love me more than you love your father and mother, your wife and children, and your brothers and sisters."*

Secondly, Luke never met Jesus. Matthew however actually lived with Lord for the great part of his ministry. Therefore, Matthew's version may be more accurate – and useful.

"Anyone who loves his father or mother more than me is not worthy of Me; anyone who loves his son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me." Matthew 10:37 (NIV)

For my part I feel that we must love God more than all the absorbing complexities of 21st Century family life – but not hate them. This is still a demanding teaching but possible – and is in fact a pillar of our faith (Matthew 22:36-39). Personally, I am with Matthew on this one. He was there. Thank you to those of you who took advantage of our "open" day on Sunday 11th July to come and see the bells and who supported us with donations and purchases of Pat's lovely goodies, proceeds from which and the collection from the evening service that day amounted to some £560 – very many thanks to all of you.

The next stage of the current works is to repair and/or replace the floors in the bell chamber and the clock chamber and to remove the rest of the oak frame, part of which has already been brought down. Thanks to a very kind offer from the Tavy Turners & Carvers Club who have offered to make items for us from the timber, we hope to have some lovely things for you to purchase in time for Christmas! In the meantime, Pat is continuing to put more of her handicrafts on sale in our on-line shop, so please keep "dropping in" occasionally for new things for you to buy.

Although Covid restrictions are beginning to ease, we have decided it would be unwise to make any long-term plans for fundraising events but we hope we may be able to arrange something at fairly short notice between now and Christmas – so please do keep your eyes and ears peeled for further news!

Ellacombe Chimes Bicentenary

The Chiming system was designed by Revd. Henry Thomas Ellacombe, who took up his post at St Mary's Church in Britton near Bristol in 1817. The design was such that each of the bells within a tower would have an iron hammer fixed to the wooden frame beside it. A small rope from that hammer would feed down the inside of the tower and collect in one space enabling one person to chime all 6 bells at once. That practice is known as 'Chiming'

Revd. Ellacombe created the Chimes as an alternative to having to use local ringers. The chimes were installed at his local church in 1821 and many churches worldwide subsequently adopted his invention. The Bicentenary Celebrations were held on Saturday 26th June and involved countless churches and towers worldwide that have an installed and working chime device.

We are fortunate in having a set of Ellacombe Chimes at Lamerton and these were played on that Special Day. The Tavistock Deanery has 23 churches with rings of bells of which 5 are fitted with Ellacombe Chimes. To make sure that all were played on that memorable day I arranged to visit the 5 of them and really enjoyed playing a selection of peals, hymns and folk tunes. The 5 churches are Buckland Monachorum, Mary Tavy, Stowford, Lifton and Lamerton. I was made more than welcome at all of them.



The fact that this mechanism was devised two hundred years ago to allow someone to ring bells alone has not been without its merits during the last 18 months of lockdown. The pandemic has prevented bellringers from getting together and ringing as teams but our Ellacombe Chimes have ensured that bells have kept sounding out regardless.



GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



I hope you're enjoying sunshine and blue skies by the time you read this. The past few days have seen some really torrential downpours which have knocked out some nice roses and many other summer blooms. But, the slugs love it and are happily munching their way through the veg patch. Luckily, there is a hedgehog visiting our garden and he/she is very welcome. The photograph from a video capture shows it having a rummage around in the middle of the night. We are hoping there might be some offspring to help out. I stopped putting slug pellets out some time ago and keep meaning to put out some beer traps instead. But it seems a shame to waste the beer - they're not having *my* Jail Ale! Perhaps I should plant a wall of euphorbias because they leave those untouched. They don't like the toxic juice in the stems and leaves. I've also found bits of wool collected off the moor and spread around the stems keeps the slugs away. Fortunately, the dahlias are now growing faster than the slugs can munch 'em. Enough of slugs; they've had too much press recently.

This is the first time I've grown sunflowers from seed and given the weather we've had, I'm impressed with the results. They do need somewhere in full sunshine and as much of it as possible. You can get some great varieties (American Giant was the one I chose). It's a good 7ft now but given a bucket of manure it would be much taller.

My garlic has got *White Rot*. Not very nice and it hasn't happened the last few years. Perhaps I planted them too close together, or perhaps all this dry/wet weather? Just shows you - you can't win every time!

Now is a good time to think about buying, or ordering, bulbs to plant out in autumn. Daffodils and tulips to make some colour and fragrance in spring?

Perhaps it's also a good time to take a critical look at your garden? What looks good? What is disappointing? Are things in the right place? Do you need more colour, more beds, less grass? A tree? A pond? One mistake we all make is buying something which looks good in the garden centre. We take it home and plant it out. Yes, it does look good, but we should have bought 10 of them not one! This is where growing from seed is so brilliant. The packet costs less than the one plant and you maybe get 20. Give ten away. You're winning! If you've got a greenhouse, growing from seed is easy but, if you haven't, you can still sow indoors; on a windowsill or somewhere light, in a little propagator. Biennials and perennials like Calendula and Oriental Poppy? They won't flower this year but they will next.

FARMING LIFE, BY HAYSEED

Out Standing In His Field



Grass grows well here in West Devon - it streams with rain 6 days in 7!

That's another old farming saying and I'm sorry I keep quoting them but they're often true and still very relevant!

A lot of grass silage has all been harvested and regrowth is very positive, in fact on the day of sending this to the Editor, Mrs Hayseed and I have observed a number of fields cut for the second time. One can be at the height of efficiency but the weather always has the final say - for those of you enjoying Clarkson's Farm at the moment it's been pleasing to see Jeremy realising the incredible contribution the weather makes to the success of a farming year - and the bottom line too!

The cows are milking well and the lambs fattening nicely. Many lambs are being sold at maturity but it is a tight margin since they must be at certain weights and at the perfect meat finishing level too. All the beef suckled calves have been through the weigh crush. 100 day weights are part of our recording intervals and the first batch have put on an extraordinary live weight gain (LWG). It works out on average to 1.6kgs a day. In old terms that is over 3lbs and all on grass and milk, oh and the odd dipper of calf cake too, keeps 'em quiet and friendly you see!

The corn crops are all looking well now, the rain saved them and the seed heads are quite full. So far it looks a good crop with plenty of straw. Dependent on the weather some should be harvested at the end of July, early August - that's the winter barley that was drilled last October time. The maize crops, grown for silage, were drilled in April time and largely were covered in "a thin plastic covering" to protect them from the frost. It also hastens the growth and in warm damp conditions it grows at a staggering rate. Let's hope that the protein cobs grow well to give a good harvest in the Autumn.

All the best for some lovely sunshine to come and plenty of work to do, never a dull moment is there.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



*'Morning has broken, Like the first morning, Blackbird
has spoken Like the first bird.'*
Eleanor Farjeon 1931

*'And for that minute a blackbird sang, Close by, and
round him, mistier, Farther and farther, all the birds
Of Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire.'*
from 'Adlestrop' by Edward Thomas. June 1914.

The poem was written just before the outbreak of the First World War, in which Thomas was killed. The blackbird songs could have joined up in one immense chorus far beyond those counties, with millions singing at once, all over England, even all over Europe, suggests Mark Cocker in *Birds Britannica*.

The song of the blackbird is indeed loved and praised. It is a deliberate, loud and melodious warbling, distinguished from Song Thrush's by purer, fluty notes and lack of repetitive habit. When birds sing they form sounds in a fundamentally different way to the way we do, because of their very different anatomy. We use our lungs to pump air through our larynx and vocal chords, then use our lips and tongue to articulate.

Singing birds, when they sing or call, use an organ called a syrinx. This is like our larynx, but with one crucial difference. It is placed much lower down the windpipe than is our larynx, at the junction with the two lungs. This means the bird can mix two sources of sound, simultaneously producing two different songs at the same time. No wonder their songs are inimitable, and we can't easily hear all the melodies they make.

Bluebell loves to see the blackbird's distinctive habit of raising its tail on alighting, swaying on twig or roof, wall or lawn, and seeming to tip and catch its balance, fanning out its tail and drooping and flirting its wings. Hop, hop, hop, across the wet morning summer lawn – a worm! A beakfull for the blackbird fledglings!

There are many black birds here, jackdaws, crows, ravens, swifts (though they are really very dark chocolate brown). But only one blackbird. This because the old word, bird, or 'brid', which used to denote baby bird or nestling, has come to mean all small birds or songbirds. Adult birds were known as fowls, ('fugol'), now only the larger birds are fowls as in domestic chickens, 'wildfowl' and 'waterfowl'. (*Stephen Moss; Mrs Moreau's Warbler.*)






