



#### Memories of Coryton past

In the congregation at a well-attended United Benefice service of Holy Communion in St Andrew's in late August there was a gentleman who has fond memories of playing cricket in Coryton against the local team. He also remembers the village stocks which at the time were still located outside the church. He was interested to see them preserved and mounted on the wall in the church tower. Have a look next time you're in St Andrew's.

#### Harvest Festival and more memories of Coryton past

St Andrew's will celebrate Harvest Festival at 6.30pm on Sunday 8th October, followed by refreshments. There is an interesting description of a traditional harvest in Coryton in times past in The History of Coryton by Thomas Newman (1940). It reads as follows:

"In the summer there was the usual harvesting. Fields of corn and wheat, yellow and ripening, in the hot sun. Parties of women and children would collect up the sheaves of corn and stack them in stooks. Work continued late into the evening until perhaps ten o'clock at night, and would commence again at dawn the next day. Many a draught of cool cider was drunk at midday when the sun was at its zenith. When the corn had all been collected the gleaners would be allowed on to the stubble, a girl and child perhaps together with an old man. Their hands were hard and brown and pricked by the thistles and weed in the stooks. They were carrying out the same roles that their forefathers had played for centuries."

### A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

The Parable of the Talents

Think about some of the special gifts or talents God gave you. Maybe God has gifted you with a musical talent like singing or playing an instrument. Some of you may have been given athletic skills which make you very good at playing a sport. Some of you may have artistic talents and can paint, draw, or sculpt. No matter what gifts God gave you, I know He's given each and every one of you at least one special gift or talent.

When God gives you a gift, He expects you to use it. He doesn't want the gift to go to waste.

In the Bible, Jesus tells many parables. Parables are stories that teach a lesson. Today, we'll hear Jesus' parable called "The Parable of the Talents."

Jesus' story starts with a man who went off on a long trip. Before he left, he called his servants together and gave each of them a part of his wealth to take care of while he was gone. To one he gave five bags of gold, to another two bags, and to a third he gave one bag. Then he left on his journey.

While he was gone, the servant who had five bags of gold worked hard and doubled his five bags so he ended up with ten bags of gold. The man with two bags also doubled his; so he had four. But the servant with one bag dug a hole and buried his boss's money.

When the boss returned, he asked his servants to share what they did with the gifts he gave them. The boss told the two who doubled their bags, "Well done! Because you have used what I gave you well, I will give you much more."

Then the third servant told the boss, "I was afraid, so I took



what you gave me and hid it in the ground so that it would be safe."

"You lazy servant!" the boss answered. "You could have at least put the gold in the bank so that I could have earned a little interest on it." The boss took the gold from the servant and gave it to the one who already had the most. He explained, "To those who make what they have been given better will be given more. But from those who do nothing, theirs will be taken away."

Sometimes we might think God hasn't given us very much talent. We might even be tempted to hide our talent. But when we use our Godgiven talent to be all that God planned for us to be, He will give us even more!

Dear God, we thank You for the gifts You've given each of us. We pray that we will be faithful in using these gifts to show others how wonderful You are.

# Can declining churches revive? Answer is YES!

I once helped start a business networking breakfast for a local Chamber of Commerce. It was based around four basic


principles. These were that breakfasts were to be held when people were available, include business networking, a good breakfast and a relevant talk - to help people develop their businesses. It was an immediate success. Soon 30+ people joined us for every breakfast. However, after a couple of years a new Chamber team took over. They limited the networking time and replaced the business talk with a Chamber update (Yawn!) Within months we were down to half a dozen. Happily, the earlier format was soon restored and the buzzing breakfast was back to normal – to the great benefit of the business community. This proved that all four principles were vital for a business breakfast to be successful. Miss one at your peril!

After over sixty years in the pews and latterly as a LLM I would suggest the similar principles apply to churches. Successful ones meet at times people are available, provide refreshments after services (for the allimportant social catchups) and crucially have a service format which is universally inspiring, accessible and really supports people's spiritual lives. Churches miss one of these at their peril!

Like the popular breakfast meetings, a whole church event has to be a vital cog in peoples' lives. Services have to be inspirational, enjoyable, understandable and crucially have a vital role in filling spiritual needs of the community. Forms of service which seem to be most effective appear to take the form of a thinnish golden frame of liturgy based around bible readings, a talk and wonderful popular songs – all of which of course change every service.

There are little traps in the process of recovering a declining church. The first is asking the existing congregation what they want. They usually like what they have – which caused the problem in the first place! However, the actual congregation is in fact the whole community – which is usually sadly absent and so cannot vote. The checklist to recovery seems to be to firstly have services at times most people can come - around 10am or 6pm on Sundays or any evening in the week. Secondly, provide refreshments for social catchups. Lastly, and crucially, always have a consistent service already known to appeal to whole communities. The good news is that, like the business breakfast, the church decline is almost always reversible!

#### RECRUITMENT OF ANNA CHAPLAINS AND ANNA FRIENDS... ..... across our local Communities.

Anna Chaplains offer spiritual support to older people, wherever they may live, in their own homes , in care settings or for people living in sheltered accommodation.

Another way of describing this work is akin to giving pastoral care support. Anna Chaplaincy has a training built in ( paid for by Exeter Diocese ) which covers all skills required to be a volunteer chaplain. This includes, listening skills, learning in more details about the ageing process and talking through issues such as dementia management.

Rev'd Andy our local incumbent is very positive about this model of giving spiritual support, and would happily have a conversation with anyone who is interested in working more closely with elderly people.

The number of hours that you commit is entirely dependent on your availability. Anna Chaplains usually commit to 1-2 days a month, although when you make visits is based on your own diary flexibility. Anna Friends who support the Chaplains doing very similar work, usually have less time available, and may find

that 1/2 day a month is sufficient time to still be of value in offering spiritual.

#### NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



"Season of mist and mellow fruitfulness, Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun; Conspiring with him how to load and bless With fruit...." To Autumn; John Keats

On the wooden table in Bluebell's courtyard lay three ripe figs, pulled off the tree already damaged by birds and insects. They could have been apples, dropping to the grass, to be eaten by slugs, rabbits, birds and squirrels before the winter comes. There are an astonishing 300 or so varieties of Cornish and West Country apples.

It was a sunny day and the figs, and two half apples, were soon visited by Red Admiral butterflies, at first two, then more, until there were an amazing thirteen Red Admiral butterflies on the Harvest Festival bounty. They were joined by a single Comma butterfly.

A few flies came too, then small wasps, finally the big boys arrived, - three hornets. The hornets aggressively drove off the butterflies, which is typical, just flying in little rushes at them, not harming them.

Next day it rained and Bluebell has not seen the butterflies again. Some Red Admirals hibernate here, most fly South and migrate for the winter. The Comma, with its distinctive ragged edge wing, often seen on blackberries, hibernates here. The caterpillars of both butterflies feed on nettles.

A few swallows are still gathering on the telegraph wires before they fly South. Soon the winter thrushes and other birds will arrive from the North.



Bluebell has seen a beautiful Wheatear on a fence post preparing to migrate. They are attractive summer visitors, between thrush and sparrow sized, upright in pose, found on upland and coastal regions and farmland. They come early, even before the swallows.

They like sheep- and rabbit- nibbled turf, where they hunt insects. Their numbers have been in decline since the deliberate spread of the myxomatosis virus.

When it flies away, unhurriedly and low, the wheatear can be identified by the distinctive white flash of its tail (both sexes) which is edged with an elegant black tip. The name comes from the Anglo-Saxon White Arse. Like Skylarks, Wheatears used to be eaten in huge numbers here, and were known as the English Ortolans. They only weigh about an ounce.

W H Hudson denounced the horrible habit and they are now protected.

#### **GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG**

Doug's been hosting cabbage white fly and white butterfly caterpillars. The former are tiny and have really enjoyed the kale in the greenhouse, making little holes and leaving some

mouldy patches under the leaves.

The white butterfly caterpillars have munched their way through the leaves of my early sprouting broccoli leaving just the stems (see the photo). It wouldn't have been so bad if the netted cage had fulfilled its duties - or, did I put the broccoli in the cage already covered in eggs? Oh, I should have had my glasses on!

Either way, they're obviously fond of brassicas.

I could have sprayed them but, if I'm going to eat them,

I'm not too keen to do that. Maybe they will recover....

Now is a great time to think about planting tulip bulbs and daffodils. Although tulips are fabulous they don't really perform for years.

You should get somewhere between 3 and 5 years but they will be at their best the first and, maybe, second year.

Daffs on the other hand get better as the years go by provided they can naturalise and spread out a bit. If they enjoy where they are, they'll do well without any help from us poor gardeners. But, tulips do look so magnificent in the spring.

> We inherited a fig tree in the garden which, although it looks good and provides ornamental and architectural interest, has never produced many figs worth picking and eating.

> Now, this year, it has gone bonkers! Covered in them and we've had some of the ripe

ones with biscuits and cheese. Very nice. It's the weather again? Perhaps the conditions have just been right - heat, water, sunshine. See 7 fFgs on the

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
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
