Luke 2:1-20

- 2 In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. 2 (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) 3 And everyone went to their own town to register.
- 4 So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. 5 He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child.
- 6 While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, 7 and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.
- 8 And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. 9 An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified.
- 10 But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. 11 Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.
- 12 This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."
- 13 Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,
- 14 "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests."

15 When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."
16 So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger.
17 When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, 18 and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them.
19 But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. 20 The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.



A Sustainable Christmas Tree

Up to 8 million Christmas trees are bought every December in the UK alone.

That's a lot of intensive production, and potentially a lot of waste. It is not too late to look into sustainable options for your Christmas tree.

You can check that your tree has been grown sustainably by looking for the FSC-certification logo. If you want one that's certified as organic and pesticide-free, get one that's approved by the Soil Association. Alternatively, there are options to rent a tree. Or buy one in a pot that you can use again next year. Royal Horticultural Society has a guide to care for your tree, year on year. If you have already bought your tree, try to recycle it so it can be used as mulch. Real Christmas trees are now available to purchase from the RAGC. There are a wide selection

of cut, potted and rooted Christmas trees. Trees can be chosen, paid for and collected from the RAGC (15-minute collection slots are available) or you can have a tree delivered for free. Full details on pricing and further information is available on


Hillingdon council has again been granted 3,000 new trees as part of the Trees for Cities tree-planting project - a partnership between the council, Trees for Cities and for the first time Ecosia. This year's tree planting is dedicated to NHS key workers as a long-term tribute for their response to the COVID-19 pandemic. These are being planted in Colham Green, which is near Hillingdon Hospital, with 500 already planted this month. *Christine Rodrigues*.

Praying for the Planet

It is good to remember our beautiful planet in prayer, meditation, awareness or involvement, with love, hope and gratitude.

We are about to witness an exciting planetary alignment when Jupiter and Saturn appear so close together in the sky that they seem to merge. It will be on the solstice, December 21st, so two important planetary events on the same day. They have not looked as close as this for nearly 800 years. Some believe that their alignment in 7BC was the star of Bethlehem followed by the magi at the time of Jesus' birth, and another name for this conjunction is the Star of Bethlehem or the Christmas Star.

To see them, look above the south-southwest horizon about 45 minutes after sunset. You can start looking now to see them moving closer, and then moving apart again after the 21st. Jupiter is the brighter of the two. *Jane Upchurch*



The Building

St John's is built of flint with bath stone dressings and, like many old buildings, has been altered and enlarged over the centuries to meet the changing needs of the parish.

The earliest written reference to a church in Hillingdon is the grant by Brian Fitz Count, Lord of Colham Manor, of Hillingdon Church to Evesham Abbey shortly after 1100. Nothing remains of that building.

The earliest part of the present building is acknowledged to be the chancel arch, dated around 1270.

The western three bays of the nave and north and south aisles are dated mid 14th century, with the south aisle thought to be the earlier of the two aisles.

The tower was built in 1629 to replace a medieval one taken down in 1623 because it was "ruinous." It is embattled, of three stages, with a cupola containing a bell and topped by a weather vane. The cupola is made of oak and is supported on six octagonal columns. The tower contains a peal of ten bells.

By the 1840s it was agreed that the church was not large enough to accommodate the growing local population (in 1847, it could seat about 600 people) and Mr (later Sir) George Gilbert Scott, a young architect, was appointed to report and advise. His report, dated 22 October 1846, recommended pulling down the existing chancel and extending the church eastwards and adding north and south transepts.

The extension was built 1848-49 by Messrs. James Fassnidge of Uxbridge. The organ chamber was built alongside the south side of the chancel in 1887.

Major restoration was again undertaken in 1902. Dormer windows, removed in the 1848-9 rebuilding, were replaced in the roof of the nave and in the new part of the north aisle, and the chancel arch was raised in height by 4 feet 6 inches, thought to be more in keeping with the dimensions of the chancel. The gallery under the tower was removed in 1906 and tower repairs carried out in 1911 and again in 1981-6.


The east end of the north aisle was remodelled as a memorial chapel to the fallen of the First World war in 1922 and the war memorial was brought inside the church from its position on the outside of the north wall.

In 1964 the new vestry block, designed by Norman Haines, was built to the north east of the church.

The latest development came in 2012 when the coffee bar area was added in the South Aisle and the altar platform removed. *Christine Bartlett*

Cupola Update

This week the cupola was inspected by our QI Alex Veal following the completion of the works. It has been signed off as a good and satisfactory job. The stabilisation work itself comprised of fixing a timber collar around the top of the cupola and fixing this by way of six cables to the inside of the stone tower parapet. Four of the cables are shown in red on the drawing below. The cables are very strong, the type that would be used for a crane. They are held in tension to support the cupola and will enable the stabilisation of the cupola for something like five years, This will enable a more permanent solution to be investigated over the next few years and a plan to be formed for a permanent solution following the reception of a detailed timber survey that was done while the scaffolding was up for the recent works. The opportunity was also taken at this time to repair the lightning conductor at the top and tighten the fixings that support the weather vane.
