

Sunday 1st May Resurrection People: Restructuring Imagination Luke 24:13-35

13 Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. 14 They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. 15 As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; 16 but they were kept from recognising him.

17 He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" They stood still, their faces downcast. 18 One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you only a visitor to Jerusalem and do not know the things that have happened there in these days?"

19 "What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. 20 The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; 21 but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. 22 In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning 23 but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. 24 Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see."

25 He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! 26 Did not the Christ have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" 27 And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.

28 As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus acted as if he were going further. 29 But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. 30 When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them.

31 Then their eyes were opened and they recognised him, and he disappeared from their sight. 32 They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" 33 They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together 34 and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." 35 Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognised by them when he broke the bread.

Sunday 8th May Resurrection People: Resurrection Bodies Luke 24: 36-49

36 While they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." 37 They were startled and frightened, thinking they saw a ghost. 38 He said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts rise in your minds? 39 Look at my hands and my feet. It is I myself! Touch me and see; a ghost does not have flesh and bones, as you see I have."

40 When he had said this, he showed them his hands and feet. 41 And while they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement, he asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" 42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, 43 and he took it and ate it in their presence.


44 He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms." 45 Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. 46 He told them, "This is what is written: The Christ will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day,

47 and repentance and forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. 48 You are witnesses of these things. 49 I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Following the recent Government announcement of relaxation of some of the Covid measures, St. John's PCC reviewed, discussed and decided:

Front Doors- We are now using the main front doors as the weather is getting better.

For this to continue we really need more people to sign up for volunteering please see Nikki or Alan if you can help in anyway.



Another look at decluttering

Now that spring is here, maybe it's time to look again at the things we own, the purchases we make and review with the planet in mind. What do you need to live?

Make your home more sustainable by how you furnish it, reduce clutter and manage your energy use. Clearing clutter can also help clear the mind .

Allocate time to clear one room, cupboard or drawer at a time.

Look at your belongings to decide what to keep.

 Are they meaningful - given as a gift or hold memories?
 Are they useful - have you used the items recently or at all. They may be items needed for everyday, regular activities or for a hobby, interest or study.

Once decided, if the things are in good condition, instead of throwing them away in a bin consider how to pass them on.

1. Would they be of use to another member of the family or friend?

2. They could be sold online or at a table top sale.

3.Donate them to a charity shop.

4.Recycle.Some items could be taken to the local recycling centre.

5. If you or anyone you know is creative, maybe the materials that the item is made of could be repurposed, made into something new.

Making Oat milk

Alternatives to milk can be expensive so have a go at making your own.

You need 2oz oats to 500ml of filtered water

Place in a blender for about a minute until smooth

To separate the liquid from the solid drain over a bowl through a muslin cloth.

Add vanilla or natural flavour to the milk and then store in a reusable jar or container for up to a week.

You can also try to make almond milk in the same way.
