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In writing just before we reach the Easter weekend, I was left wondering what aspect of the whole Easter story to focus on. It doesn't feel right to rush through Holy Week, paying scant attention to

the last days Jesus spent with his disciples and all that he shared with them. Some of my favourite chapters of the New Testament are John 14-17, where Jesus talks to the disciples at the Last Supper, prays for them and amazingly prays for us too! Look up John 17:20, Jesus prays for you and me on the night before he dies! Later that same night he asks three of his friends to wait with him and keep him company in prayer in the garden of Gethsemane.

A few days ago I had the privilege of being sent on retreat by college to Launde Abbey in Leicestershire, a beautiful and peaceful place. This gave me a wonderful opportunity to spend some time in the presence of Jesus, keeping him company in prayer, and so I thought I would share some of my experiences with you. I wasn't tested beyond my limits by being on a silent retreat, as those that know me well enough would know how difficult that would be! There were a number of guided sessions in prayer as well as plenty of free time to walk in the beautiful grounds, be alone or share time with my fellow retreatants. There was a well stocked library(my own particular heavenly place) and a comfortable lounge overlooking the sheep grazing in the fields. The food was plentiful and delicious and I spent time with old friends and made new ones. I don't blame you if you stop reading at this point and think 'Well lucky old you Caroline, I was busy having a crazy time at work, feeling fed up at home, worrying about the kids, my parents, exams, my health worries...' I know, I do get it.

What I really wanted to share with you is how I connected to Jesus most deeply when I gave him my undivided attention in prayer and asked if I might keep him company. We can do that anywhere and at any time because of Easter; the risen Jesus is the first fruit of a new creation that through the Holy Spirit, we too are invited to be a part of. We are no longer confined to meeting with God in the temple, the church or even Launde Abbey! We can simply invite God to be with us, to accompany us, to listen to us and to share with us the things we need to know. On the last morning we had a passage read to us from John's gospel; Chapter 21:1-14 is the last of John's accounts of Jesus appearing to the disciples after the resurrection. It tells how the disciples had returned to the sea at Galilee, perhaps not knowing what to do next and deciding to go fishing at Peter's instigation. Five of the disciples present are named or identified but two are not. Jesus is waiting for them on the beach, cooking them breakfast, patiently waiting for his friends to recognize him and join him.

In a practice known as Lectio Divina, the passage was slowly read aloud three times and we were invited to place ourselves within the scene. I could really feel the sand under my feet, the gentle warmth of the early morning sun and I could hear the waves breaking on the beach. I knew that I was one of those unnamed disciples and as I realised that, a space opened up for me to join the circle. Without anything being said aloud, I knew I was totally welcomed and accepted among the disciples but more importantly by Jesus. I was aware that Jesus was next to me and he promised that he had much to say to me but first he had important business with Peter and needed to talk to him first! You can read on in the chapter to see what this was! This sense of Jesus promising to 'sort me out' but that I needed to wait and trust him for the 'when and how,' was very prominent throughout the retreat. If all that sounds maybe rather fanciful, I can only say that it felt extremely real and powerful and that I was left with the need to tell others that those two unnamed disciples are us. There is always a place, a gentle invitation for you and me to join the circle and let Jesus care for us. We may not literally get served fish and bread for breakfast this Easter, (a hot cross bun and coffee will do for me), but our risen saviour longs to spend time with us and meet our needs.

I took this photo in the grounds and this sculpture forms part of the Launde Abbey logo. It is part of a series of Stations of the Cross within the grounds and whilst I presume the outstretched arms represent the crucified Christ, I also see the welcoming arms of the risen Jesus. My prayer for you all this Easter is that you may encounter the risen Jesus in a way that best speaks to you and may you be blessed and comforted by knowing there is a place in the circle just for you. *Caroline*

Sunday 17th April
Easter Day
Luke 24:1-12

24 On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. 2 They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, 3 but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus.

4 While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. 5 In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? 6 He is not here; he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee:

7 'The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, be crucified and on the third day be raised again.' "8 Then they remembered his words. 9 When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. 10 It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles.

11 But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense.

12 Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened.

St. John's Services Update

Following the recent Government announcement of relaxation of some of the Covid measures, St. John's PCC reviewed, discussed and decided:

Front Doors- We are now using the main front doors as the weather is getting better.

Face Masks - This is now a personal choice. For those that wish to wear your mask you may prefer to sit at the back in the last rows, to help you feel more comfortable around those singing without a mask. However, you are equally free to sit anywhere you would like.

We will still have face masks available for those that wish to take them. We ask that you continue to be mindful to others.

Space - After a review on Wednesday 6th April We are trialling different ways for Holy Communion so that we can make full use of the church pews.

Zoom- Will continue.

Testing prior to attending church- Not now needed however if you feel unwell then please stay home, you may wish to test if you have any of the coronavirus symptoms and connect via zoom.

Refreshments - This is now up and running. For this to continue we really need more people to sign up for volunteering please see Nikki or Alan if you can help in anyway.



Plants and their Uses

At this time of year everything is growing and springing into life in our gardens, parks and other green spaces. Many of the plants that we see and think of as weeds and a nuisance were once used or grown for a purpose or had a use. Discoveries are still being made of the importance of plants and the interconnectedness of the earth which includes us.

Here are some plants that you may spot locally in your garden, park or along the roadside when walking and for interest only some of their uses.

Comfrey - This plant has many medicinal uses. It can be used to make a tonic for your plants in the garden.

Hazel - The wood from this hedgerow plants was used to make hoops, sticks and fishing rods. **Stinging Nettle** - This plant can help improve the soil as it adds nitrogen as well as other nutrients and can help our other plants that grow alongside it to flourish. The young leaves can be eaten as a vegetable.

Groundsel - Once grown as a food for animals. If composted it adds nutrients to the soil.

Coltsfoot - Used for coughs and bronchial complaints. The down on the back of the leaves was used in the past as tinder to create a spark. The fluffy seed heads are used by birds to line their nests.

Goosegrass - The seeds of this plant which along with the leaves stick to our clothing were once roasted as a substitute for coffee and were also pushed on pins in their green state to make a soft pinhead.

Hawthorn - The young leaves of the hedgerow plant can be eaten Jack -by-the-hedge - The leaves were once used in salads and as a sauce for fish.

Clover - Red Clover works as green manure to improve the soil as its roots store nitrogen. White clover can be grown to create a clover lawn.

Dandelion - If left to grow a Dandelion plant can be quite large and in the past the leaves and flowers were important ingredients. It is a source of copper and iron.

Eco Tip - Score your shopping. Impact Score Shopping is a helpful app (free on Apple and Android) that lets you scan a product's barcode to check its ethical and sustainability credentials. The app will suggest an alternative product if whatever you've scanned scores poorly and you can ask it to prioritise information about the environmental or ethical issues you feel the most strongly about. **Chris Rodrigues**

Churchyard News

On Thursday 7th April at 4:30pm we were alerted to a substantial Spruce tree that had fallen in the churchyard. Alan promptly went to investigate and could see that the tree was resting on a Yew Tree on the east side of the Churchyard near to the Coney Green Boundary wall. See photos below.









As you can see the spruce fell in the middle of quite a few headstones and was right above the Cox family tomb! Some of you may have seen this on Sunday 10th April.

The team of tree surgeons attended on 12th April at around 8:45am to remove the Spruce.

Thankfully It was a mild warm day.

I asked the team to go gentle with the spruce as both myself and Mark Hamlin were extremely worried about what could happen to the Cox family tomb (which has a marble top) and the other historical headstones which lie in the trees path. The tree surgeon response was "There is nothing gentle about a chain saw!" but they promised to do their very best to limit the damage.

The problem the team faced was the tree was resting on the Yew tree which was under quite a bit of pressure. With every section cut this could have placed the Yew under more pressure resulting in the branches of the Yew giving way and the Spruce to drop. The Spruce was also still being held up at an angle by half of the trunk which in the centre was rotten (The main reason the tree may not have coped under the high winds of Thursday!) although the outer exterior of the tree was in quite good condition, there was a possibility that this could have snapped and the spruce to roll causing anything in its path to be crushed. At this point myself and Mark decided to leave the team to it.

I popped out occasionally to serve tea and see how things were progressing. One time I popped out the team were at a crucial point when everything could go wrong! I very promptly came back inside and hoped when I returned that all would be well.

I have to say the team were brilliant and kept their promise. When I went out near the end of the work about 11:30am, I was AMAZED to see that the Cox family tomb was intact and all the headstones and tombs untouched it was like it never happened. Rick popped along near the end of the work and was equally surprised.

We needed to loose a few branches of the Yew tree which was inevitable as these had been damaged due to the weight of the Spruce. The Yew tree really did save the day!

All in all a great job by a great team of tree surgeons and a massive sigh of relief from your administrator! See photos below of work in progress and the finish. *Nikki*

Alpha Course March/April 2022 7:15 for a 7:30pm start


Alpha is an exciting opportunity to come together as a group and discuss all things faith, life and what is the meaning of it all!
