I am writing this having returned from our Remembrance Service in church this morning. I always find it a very moving service, as we think of those who have fought in various wars to enable us all

to live the lives we all currently enjoy. Last night, we watched the Festival of Remembrance from the Royal Albert Hall. I always find it profoundly poignant – especially when the poppies fall from the ceiling during the two minutes of silence towards the end of the Festival. I always think of my great uncle, Richard Matthews, who was killed in the diversionary attack on Gommecourt Wood, during the Battle of the Somme in 1916. His body was never recovered and his name is inscribed on the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme. The Memorial carries the 72,337 names of missing British and South African servicemen who died in the Battles of the Somme between 1915 and 1918, and have no known grave. Richard was only 19 years old when he died along with all those other young men. It is a reminder that in war there are rarely winners, but losses on all sides of the conflicts. If only we could all remember what Jesus was at pains to remind us – love your neighbour as yourselves, how much better the world would be.

The 12 th November is also the final day of the Diwali celebrations and our evening has been punctuated with the sound of bangs (some very loud!) and fireworks as they celebrate this festival of light triumphing over darkness. Something that we believe in our own faith was achieved by Jesus dying and rising for us all.

We are, of course, now firmly in the season of autumn, with winter not too far ahead of us. We have been guite lucky this autumn so far, as we had a lot of sunny days in October - so many in fact that there was a delay in the trees changing colour. I always love it when the leaves turn to russet, gold and yellow before the wind and rain cause them to drop leaving the branches bare for winter, but ready to blossom again in the spring and remind us of new birth and growth. As was said on Countryfile this evening - autumn gives us the chance to wrap up warm and enjoy the delights of nature. There is sometimes nothing nicer than going out on a bright autumn day (well wrapped up against the often chilly winds) and just enjoying the beauty all around us. We had a week away in Tenerife in mid September - with lots of sunshine and beautiful sunrises (the sun didn't come up until about 8am); another reminder of God and his amazing creation, as we watched the sun coming up over the mountains and flooding the sky with glorious colours. In the villa we were renting there were two small paintings of flowers -one bearing this message - "A mind must be open to bloom" and the other "Every day consists of at least one small miracle". I was so taken with the truth of these two sayings that I took a photograph of the paintings to remind me. I particularly like the second one, because we often overlook the small miracles that happen around us – like the leaves on the trees when they change their colour, or the sun bursting forth and lighting a dark sky. A wonderful thought to carry with us on our daily lives. Maybe we should all start looking for that small miracle every day and, as a result, look at the world around us in a different and more positive way. Carol

Linda has always been very caring and taken care of her family and husband lvan. They are both very committed to their faith and church community in Devon.



As explained previously we are revisiting some of the history of St. John's and after an overview of the building itself we will be going inside the church continuing to look at our Brasses.

Tenuous link between a famous horserace and St John's!

The brass by the altar rail in the Chancel shows a man in a suit of armour with chains around his neck. It is in memory of Henry Stanley who died in 1528. Henry's father was the second Earl of Derby. The Earls of Derby were and have been ever since one of the prominent wealthy landowning families in England. Henry is the great grandson of John and Jane L'Estrange whose brass is opposite the cafe area in church.

Henry died at the Manor House of Colham, although this was probably not the family's main residence This house once stood at Patcott field which was about one mile north of the bridge at Longford which crossed the River Colne.

The brass was originally on the floor of the chancel and in 1893 the 13 th Earl of Derby paid for it to be moved.

And finally, here is a bit of trivia for you. In the 18th century, the 12th Earl of Derby and Sir Charles Bunbury (the president of the Jockey Club) decided to hold a horse race. They spun a coin as to whether the race should be called the Derby Stakes or the Bunbury Stakes. The Earl won! *Christine Bartlett*
