Tomorrow, 2^{nd} February is the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple forty days after his birth. You can read the story of the Presentation in the Temple in Luke 2: 22 - 40. In our house it is the day when I take down our stable figures and put them away until next December (I like to keep the stable up so that the Wise Men are on display between Epiphany and

Candlemas!). The other name for today is Candlemas, and it marks the midpoint of winter — halfway between the shortest day and the Spring equinox in mid March. In the past people would take candles to their local church to have them blessed; it was also when the candles to be used in church throughout the year were blessed. Traditionally, all the candles would be made of beeswax. The wax was to show the purity of Jesus; the wick represented His soul and the flame represented His divinity as well as Jesus bringing light into the darkness of the world.

There are differing traditions for Candlemas around the world – if you are in France, Belgium, Italy or parts of Switzerland, you could expect to be served crepes or pancakes today; in Luxembourg, children go from house to house carrying lanterns and wishing the residents health and happiness. They sing them traditional songs and receive sweets in return (a little like our tradition of Carol Singing!); in Mexico it is a public holiday with people eating a traditional tamales (a traditional Mexican dish made with a corn based dough mixture that is filled with various meats or beans and cheese).

Like some other Christian festivals, Candlemas draws some of its elements from Paganism and may people would light candles to scare away evil spirits. People also believe that Candlemas predicted the weather for the rest of the winter – giving rise to this little rhyme:-

"When Candlemas Day is bright with sun; Then Winter's power has just begun – But when Candlemas Day is dark with rain Then Winter's power is on the wane!"

Or this short snappy little saying: "If Candlemas be fair and clear; There'll be two winters in the year." I am rather hoping that one doesn't prove to be correct!

There is also a tradition that any Christmas decorations which were not taken down by Twelfth Night should have been left until today and then taken down and packed away.

One fact I didn't know is that snowdrops are known as "Candlemas Bells" because they often bloom early in the year around the time of Candlemas. According to one legend, an angel helped these Candlemas bells to bloom and gave them as a sign of hope to Eve, who wept in despair over the cold and death that had entered the world. Many Christians still see snowdrops as a symbol of Jesus being the hope for the world. I shall view snowdrops differently now!

One of the many traditions around Candlemas is that people place lit candles in their windows at home to remind them of Jesus as the light of the world, so I will be putting one in our window tomorrow evening and might even flip a pancake or two to celebrate this reminder of Jesus being born to bring light and redemption to us all. *Carol*

Let us light a candle in the darkness, in the face of death a sign of life; as a sign of hope where all seemed hopeless, as a sign of peace in place of strife. AMEN





Readings for Sunday 4th February 2024 Theme: Take the High Road- Baptise Reading: Romans 6:1-11

- 6 What shall we say, then? Shall we go on sinning, so that grace may increase?
- 2 By no means! We died to sin; how can we live in it any longer?
- 3 Or don't you know that all of us who were baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death?
- 4 We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.
- 5 If we have been united with him like this in his death, we will certainly also be united with him in his resurrection.
- 6 For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin—
- 7 because anyone who has died has been freed from sin.
- 8 Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him.
- 9 For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him.
- 10 The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God.
- 11 In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Readings for Sunday 11th February 2024 Theme: Take the High Road- Share Readings: Mark 1:29-39

- 29 As soon as they left the synagogue, they went with James and John to the home of Simon and Andrew.
- 30 Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told Jesus about her.
- 31 So he went to her, took her hand and helped her up. The fever left her and she began to wait on them.
- 32 That evening after sunset the people brought to Jesus all the sick and demon-possessed.
- 33 The whole town gathered at the door,
- 34 and Jesus healed many who had various diseases. He also drove out many demons, but he would not let the demons speak because they knew who he was.

- 35 Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed.
- 36 Simon and his companions went to look for him,
- 37 and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!"
- 38 Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so that I can preach there also. That is why I have come."
- 39 So he travelled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons.

Readings for Sunday 11th February 2024 Theme: Take the High Road- Share Reading: Matthew 28:16-20

- 16 Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go.
- 17 When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted.
- 18 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me
- 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,
- 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."



FEBRUARY Go green for Lent.

The weeks leading up to Easter are a time for self reflection, repentance and emulating Jesus' obedience to the Father.

Ideas and inspiration for a Creation Care Focussed Lent.

Fasting has long been a Christian Spiritual Discipline practised and encouraged by Jesus to help his follower's emphasise the Kingdom of God in their lives over our earthly, physical, immediate and emotional wants and desires.

You could use Lent to as a time to fast from some of our excessive consumption of the creation's resources and appallingly high levels of waste of all kinds? Live lent, love life is a good strap line for this approach.

We can help to inspire others to commit to a personal discipline to reduce our carbon emissions and preserve the good life of God's good creation, while helping each of us develop greater self-control and simpler lifestyles. The following ideas suggest themselves for action, all of which will result in reducing greenhouse gas emissions into the atmosphere.

Reduce Carbon: Reduce your use of fossil fuels during Lent. Do an energy audit to measure your carbon footprint and design ways to reduce it.

Switch to a 100% renewable energy supplier if you haven't already.

Reduce your gas consumption at home by improving insulation, lowering the temperature by a few degrees, heating fewer areas in the house or shortening heating periods. Use less gas heated hot water.

Travel: Make fewer journeys by car; walk, cycle and use public transport when possible. Fly less and find other ways to travel on holidays.

Shop local to reduce the number of journeys and if possible buy homegrown food to reduce the journeys of the products.

A Plastic/Waste Fast: This is difficult as excessive plastic packaging is enmeshed in our society.

But we can make progress. There are products which reduce or eliminate plastic packaging. Eg. Shampoo and conditioner bars of soap. Refillable cleaning containers that enable you to refill your own containers with food items.

A Circular Economy: A different way of reducing the waste in our daily lives is by moving from a linear economy to a circular economy. We can do this in a small way by recycling goods we do not need, books, bicycles, fashion items, small electrical goods and so on. Find a repair café or look out for a local recycle and irepair event




Black Park



Cleaning St John's


The next big clean will take place on 17th Feb at 9:30am all cleaning supplies will be provided. If you would like to help but are unable to attend on 17th and have some free time during
