Looking out into the future from my youthful days of the 1970's I thought two things were certainties. One was that Christmas would always feel and be the same and the other was that buoyed up by the undented confidence of youth, I was obviously going to grow up and have a huge impact on the world! Well who knew - it wouldn't and I didn't!

You would at least have thought Christmas would have continued the same, although my tinsel and Cindy doll filled Christmases faded with the 1970's, Christmas was always guaranteed to be filled with people, packed shops and even packed churches. The last two years have left us feeling uncertain about what to expect Christmas to look and feel like. However, it does rather annoy me when the media speculate as to whether or not politicians have the power to cancel Christmas. They don't. The certainty of Christmas was assured approximately 2021 years ago when Mary's youthful trust allowed her to say yes to God. I can't believe she wasn't filled with uncertainties as to what it might mean when an angel delivered this message to her:

"Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus, He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High." (Luke Ch 1:30-31)

The beginning of John's gospel, read at our own carol service last week, gives us a very different description of how God planned to enter the world as one of us. John talks of a true light coming into the world. When both the news and short days can conspire to make many of us feel as though we are in dark times, we can look to this light and be comforted by it.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John Ch1:5)

I may have felt the brightness of the tinsel lit Christmases of my childhood dim with the passing years but this light never will fade away, it will only ever grow steadily brighter. God is light and in him is no darkness at all.

I've come to terms with the other unfulfilled certainty of my youth, as you too will have realised by now, I didn't grow up and have a huge impact on the world! I'm ok with that as I don't think I could have coped with all the packing that would come with all the international travel I would have had to undertake whilst going around impacting! In all seriousness, I believe that along with most of us, I am called to the ministry of the small. By that I mean we live out our lives in the ordinary and everyday. We affect the lives of those we live with, our families, friends and colleagues. We exchange a smile with a stranger on a bus, chat to the person on the checkout or maybe in the vaccination queue. We do small everyday acts of kindness, sometimes known only to ourselves but always to God. We make a phone call, send a text, say a prayer. These examples may be small but that doesn't mean they are insignificant. I believe God delights in the small and it's worth remembering that what we call the incarnation is God deciding to become one of us. God does that by becoming small, we've all never been as small as at the moment of our birth.

I wish you all a very Happy Christmas, praying that you may all experience the light of God in your lives during this season and beyond. *Caroline*





Sunday 19th December Jesus as Immanuel Matthew1:18-25

18 This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. 19 Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

20 But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. 21 She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

22 All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had said through the prophet: 23 "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel"—which means, "God with us." 24 When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.

25 But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

Christmas Eve Birth of Jesus Luke2:1-20

2 In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (2 This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) 3 And everyone went to his own town to register.

4 So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. 5 He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. 6 While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born,

7 and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Christmas Day The Shepherd's Visit Luke2:8-20

8 And there were shepherds living out in the fields near by, keeping watch over their flocks at night.

9 An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. 10 But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy

that will be for all the people. 11 Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord.

12 This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

13 Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, 14 "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favour rests."

15 When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another,

"Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

16 So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger.

17 When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, 18 and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them.

19 But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. 20 The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

Boxing Day Genealogy of Jesus Matthew1:1-17

- 1 A record of the genealogy of Jesus Christ the son of David, the son of Abraham: 2 Abraham was the father of Isaac, Isaac the father of Jacob, Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers,
- 3 Judah the father of Perez and Zerah, whose mother was Tamar, Perez the father of Hezron, Hezron the father of Ram, 4 Ram the father of Amminadab, Amminadab the father of Nahshon, Nahshon the father of Salmon.
- 5 Salmon the father of Boaz, whose mother was Rahab, Boaz the father of Obed, whose mother was Ruth, Obed the father of Jesse, 6 and Jesse the father of King David. David was the father of Solomon, whose mother had been Uriah's wife, 7 Solomon the father of Rehoboam, Rehoboam the father of Abijah, Abijah the father of Asa,
- 8 Asa the father of Jehoshaphat, Jehoshaphat the father of Jehoram, Jehoram the father of Uzziah, 9 Uzziah the father of Jotham, Jotham the father of Ahaz, Ahaz the father of Hezekiah,
- 10 Hezekiah the father of Manasseh, Manasseh the father of Amon, Amon the father of Josiah,
- 11 and Josiah the father of Jeconiah and his brothers at the time of the exile to Babylon. 12 After the exile to Babylon: Jeconiah was the father of Shealtiel, Shealtiel the father of Zerubbabel,
- 13 Zerubbabel the father of Abiud, Abiud the father of Eliakim, Eliakim the father of Azor,
- 14 Azor the father of Zadok, Zadok the father of Akim, Akim the father of Eliud, 15 Eliud the father of Eleazar, Eleazar the father of Matthan, Matthan the father of Jacob, 16 and Jacob the father of Joseph, the husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus, who is called Christ.
- 17 Thus there were fourteen generations in all from Abraham to David, fourteen from David to the exile to Babylon, and fourteen from the exile to the Christ.

2nd January 2021 Day of Epiphany Magi Visit Matthew 2:1-17

- 2 After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem 2 and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him." 3 When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him.
- 4 When he had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Christ was to be born. 5 "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written:
- 6 "'But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for out of you will come a ruler who will be the shepherd of my people Israel." 7 Then Herod called the Magi secretly and found out from them the exact time the star had appeared.
- 8 He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and make a careful search for the child. As soon as you find him, report to me, so that I too may go and worship him." 9 After they had heard the king,

they went on their way, and the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was.

10 When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. 11 On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh.

12 And having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their country by another route.

13 When they had gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up," he said, "take the child and his mother and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for the child to kill him." 14 So he got up, took the child and his mother during the night and left for Egypt,

15 where he stayed until the death of Herod. And so was fulfilled what the Lord had said through the prophet: "Out of Egypt I called my son."

16 When Herod realised that he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi. 17 Then what was said through the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled:

18 "A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because they are no more." 19 After Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt

20 and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who were trying to take the child's life are dead." 21 So he got up, took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel.

22 But when he heard that Archelaus was reigning in Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. Having been warned in a dream, he withdrew to the district of Galilee, 23 and he went and lived in a town called Nazareth. So was fulfilled what was said through the prophets: "He will be called a Nazarene."

Have festive veg delivered by an organic delivery company such as Riverford.

Cut back on meat.

Eat more vegetarian meals.

Over Christmas It's estimated that 40 million crackers end up in our bins on Christmas Day. While some crackers can be recycled, those that use foil or glitter can't – and the plastic toys inside are often headed straight for landfill!

Replace your Christmas crackers with eco-friendly alternatives, including fair trade chocolate, wooden toys, fabric ties and upcycled charity finds.

Hosting Christmas festivities means decorating the house and trying to keep warm! These tips focus on making a cosy environment while reducing the harmful impact on our planet.

Make your own tree ,be creative ,use boxes or use a pruned branch from a tree or shrub in your garden

Energy use - try to ensure your house is well insulated as much as possible and draughts sealed. Also, look at your energy supply tariff to try to ensure you use renewable electricity.

Time to reflect. Many of us use this end-of-year season to take stock. It's a good opportunity to review your daily choices and habits, and prayerfully consider what the next steps towards more ethical living might be. Some thoughts from Tearfund campaigners



Meeting of Eco Action Group I attended another meeting of this group in November. Due to the workload of those due to attend and those attending and also some internet problems it was a small group and only ran for half an hour. Topics intended for discussion, a review of COP26, the subject for lent and the next event to be held in February.

It was decided that the topic for lent in 2022 should work around care for creation, making changes to our lifestyle. Dave Bookless will ask for a grant to help further establish Outdoor church which he leads in Ealing and would like to expand to other areas. There will be an event in the new year to continue to support and encourage other churches to register with Eco Church. A few more churches have signed up now over the diocese.

Local Art I belong to Hillingdon Artists and the group has just taken over an empty shop in the Pavilions as a 'pop up' gallery to show our work. The space is near Wilko.

You are welcome to drop in and to see the work and you may find that original hand made gift! The empty shop spaces are being offered as an incentive to encourage people to return to the town after lockdown. At the moment we have the space until the end of March. There are other spaces available until they are open again as a retail site. *Christine Rodrigues*



This edition of "Hillingdon Histories" is about Francis and Elizabeth Godby who are buried under the floor of the church in the North Aisle so we have probably all walked over it many times! The writing on the gravestone has survived remarkably well, this is what it says:

Here layeth the body of Francis Godby late of the Strand London, who departed this life

December 15th in the year of our Lord 1770 aged 54 years also Mrs Elizabeth Godby relict of the

above died 24th September 1779 aged 50years.

A search on google led me to a genealogy website and a conversation on a blog between 2 members of the same family who had an ancestor that worked for Francis Godby. It seems that Francis Godby was a button maker with a business, possibly a shop, in the Strand, London. The burial register states that he is from the parish of St Clement which is in The Strand.

In the 18th century, buttons were mainly worn by men whilst women's clothing used laces or hooks and eyes. Wealthy individuals in the 18th century bought hand-crafted buttons, sometimes made out of semi-precious materials, and hand painted or engraved. Many innovations in the world of buttons were noted in the 18th Century. Metal buttons were used and button covering was created. Buttons were used in most ancient civilisations, the earliest being thought to be in approximately 5000BC in Asia. Fascinating!!! *Christine Bartlett*









