# Trustees' Report Year ended 31 December 2024

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

### **Objectives and Activities**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

We are a community of people who have found joy and peace through faith and fellowship in Jesus Christ. We are committed to sharing with others the good news of God's love and care for all, and to participate actively in the wider work of the Church.

St. Ninians has been a centre of Christian worship for over 800 years. The present church was built in 1751 and now serves a Parish including St. Ninians, Torbrex, Cultenhove, parts of Bannockburn and an extensive rural area including the Carron Valley. Rev. Gary J McIntyre provides full-time ministry and leads worship weekly on Sunday in the Church. He also conducts a service each month in two residential homes for the elderly and in a retirement complex (Eccles Court). Each Sunday during term-time, our Sunday Club offers Christian insight and fellowship for children in the 4 to 12-year age range, and a crèche is provided for younger children during Sunday Morning services.

The Parish Halls, nearby in Kirk Wynd, provide a centre for our work and activities during the week. It has a main hall and several rooms, which provide the Parish and community of St Ninians with a meeting place for a variety of organisations, both Church and community based. In 2024 groups such as Kettle Bells, Karate, Taekwondo, Sensory Tots, a dance group, the Boys' Brigade, Sunday Club, Tuesday Group and Craft Group have met in the Parish Halls. Start Up Stirling holds a food bank in the Parish Halls every Wednesday. Numerous parties are also held in the Parish Halls.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

The Rev Gary J McIntyre has been Minister of St Ninians Old Parish Church since 19<sup>th</sup> November 1998. He finds the work challenging and rewarding. Much of Mr McIntyre's time is spent preparing for Sunday Worship, visiting the sick and bereaved, engaging with the Schools, conducting funerals and weddings, and chairing meetings. Since March 2023 he has been Interim Moderator of Bannockburn Allan Church.

Mr McIntyre is Chaplain to two primary schools and is a member of the Chaplaincy team in the High School of Stirling, all three of which are in the parish. He enjoys a very positive relationship with the schools.

Mr McIntyre is Chaplain to two care homes where he conducts a monthly service. He also conducts a monthly service in Eccles Court, a retirement complex within the bounds of the parish.

St Ninians Old has 417 members and there is a Supplementary Roll which has the names of 3 people recorded on it. There are 43 active elders, 28 female and 15 male.

The Sunday service can be viewed online via the Church YouTube Channel. CD's of services are delivered to those who do not have access to the internet.

Within the Kirk Session there are a number of committees which involve elders and members. We also have a Pastoral Care Group which maintains contact with elderly and housebound members.

The number of children involved in the life of the congregation is approximately 42. This includes children in the Sunday Club and the Boys' Brigade. Like many other Churches there are not as many children as there once was but we have a loyal core of children who attend on a Sunday morning and there are over 30 in the Boys' Brigade.

Fellowship is important. Tea, coffee and biscuits are served following the service on the third Sunday of the month. The Tuesday Group meets monthly and is open to men as well as women. It is well attended and there is a varied programme of speakers and entertainment throughout the year.

St Ninians Old works closely with the congregations of Park Church and Holy Rude Viewfield. There are joint lunches, Bible studies and programmes with the local primary schools. A united Songs of Praise Service was held in Park Church in September and a united Service of Lessons and Carols was held in St Ninians Old in December when we were joined by the Right Rev Dr Shaw J Paterson, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. The Ministers and Session Clerks of the three congregations meet regularly to discuss further opportunities to work together.

The Church continues to be exceptionally well served by Mr Antony Baldwin, our gifted organist.

A quarterly magazine is distributed to members and contact is maintained through the Church Facebook page and website and there is a weekly submission to the Stirling Observer.

Outreach is important and in 2024 the congregation supported WaterAid, Blythswood Care Christmas Shoebox Appeal, Christian Aid, Erskine Hospital, the Salvation Army, Neuro Central and CHAS.

The congregation is an eco-congregation, and we seek to alert people to the need to protect the environment and to reduce our carbon footprint.

The fabric of our buildings is in good condition. Routine maintenance of our buildings is important as is our endeavour to ensure our buildings are welcoming.

St Ninians Old Parish Church is very much at the heart of the community and there is a considerable degree of goodwill towards the Church. We provide a caring and sympathetic ministry which affirms the value of every boy and girl, man and woman and we promote values which we believe are essential for the wellbeing of society.

2024 has had its challenges and we lost through death a number of good and generous members. The year to come will without doubt be equally challenging, but with God's help we will continue our work, and in collaboration with other congregations, will do all we can to fulfil our calling.

#### **Financial Review**

Our principal source of income is our Sunday weekly offerings although significant numbers contribute directly by monthly, quarterly or annual standing order to our bank account. The number of gift aid donors is however reducing, and at the beginning of 2024, the budget for the General Fund predicted a deficit of £7,047 for the year. The trustees continue to monitor the longer-term financial position of St. Ninians Old.

The congregation has responded positively and income from offerings and donations increased by 4.2%. Overall income in 2024 showed an increase of 14.6% over the comparable income in 2023, principally as a result of increased legacy donations. Efforts continue to be made to find new users of the halls and other income streams to help maintain the charity finances with the aim of becoming 'cost-neutral' as well as being a significant asset to the congregation and local community.

Another major contributor to the financial position of the congregation has been that the cost of overall repairs and maintenance in 2024 was significantly higher than in 2023. External building maintenance required extensive scaffolding, and the Trustees agreed to utilize this to bring forward planned works from the following year. Most other categories of normal expenditure have been similar to the previous year. Energy costs have increased significantly in line with national trends and are expected to increase further in 2025. They maintain a vigilant approach to energy usage in all areas. Weekly hall occupancy lets continue to increase and the halls are in use nearly every day.

There was little change in Restricted funds during the year.

Overall, total income in 2024 increased by 14.6%. Expenditure was increased in 2024 as a result of a higher Giving to Grow allocation, higher fuel costs, and increased costs on repairs and maintenance. This resulted in the total funds being carried forward increasing from £145,678 at the end of 2023 to £166,209. This corresponds to an increase in our financial reserves by 14.1%.

Our principal financial objective for 2025 will be to consolidate our financial reserves, to provide scope for further development activities as well as protection against unforeseen requirements for expenditure.

# **Investment Policy and Performance**

No material investments are held, to avoid the associated financial risks.

### Risk Management

The risks faced by the Congregation in 2024, were increased fuel costs in a volatile market resulting in increased supplier costs and pressure on salaries. The recent quinquennial survey highlighted various works and the Trustees have put in place a planned diet of repairs. The risk to the Charity has been contained by continued care and upgrade of the fabric as necessary. The water ingress problems with the west wall of the church building, and the adjacent flat roofs over the Chapel and Session House, had been resolved by the remedial work undertaken in 2020, and have not reoccurred. It may be that routine redecoration is the only practical means of coping with unavoidable minor damp ingress through the west wall stonework. However, the need continues to have adequate financial resources to address unexpected, as well as planned, remedial works.

The remaining financial reserves are still considered to be adequate (see below).

The other principal challenge remains, in common with many other churches, the ageing profile of the congregation. In financial terms, this is leading to the steady loss of donors to the Church, which is having a noticeable impact on voluntary income, and has only been manageable through the generosity of members of the congregation increasing their voluntary donations, and through careful management of expenditure. This is a long-term issue, and it is hoped it will also be mitigated by attracting new members to the congregation.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months' expenditure including designated funds. At the year-end, the Church held unrestricted funds of £160,994, which has met this objective. It should be noted that of this, £11,161 has been designated for longer-term development of the work of the Church within the community.

The restricted funds (provided for the purposes specified in Note 10) had a net balance of £5,215 at the end of the year.

### Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC016320 and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church who were elected by the congregation on the basis of having appropriate gifts and skills.

The Kirk Session is chaired by the Minister and normally meets seven times in a year. It is responsible for spiritual and material affairs within the Church. There are a number of committees that comprise of elders and members of the congregation. These committees help with such matters as outreach, publicity, fundraising and organising social events. There is also a finance and property committee and a pastoral care group. St Ninians Old is an ecocongregation and the various committees actively seek to help the congregation reduce our carbon footprint in accordance with a ruling of the General Assembly.

# Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of St Ninians Old Parish Church for the Year ended 31 December 2024

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024 which are set out on pages 10 to 17.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) 2005 Act and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The Charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10 (1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44 (1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

#### Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations. #### Note:

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, halls and manse. The Church and Manse are vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. The Church Hall is locally held but no valuation is available, since it is a listed building with architectural features such as the main hall ceiling which have historical interest. This has led to conservational limitations being placed on the building in recent years, which would strictly restrict the potential opportunities for commercial development of the building. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. St. Ninians Old invested in a new sound system in the church sanctuary in 2017 at a cost of £5,747, but has had no further such investment since.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £31,642 and the maximum stipend (in the 5th and subsequent years of service) £38,884.

#### 8 Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions

During the year payments to one trustee totalled £5,083 (2023: £4,327), related to reimbursement of expenses, including Manse Council Tax and phone expenses.

No trustee or a person related to a trustee had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered into by the charity during the year.

The aggregate amount donated to the church by Trustees in 2024 totalled £31,687 (2023: £30,939), based on Gift Aid, WFO, Ordinary Offerings and Other Donation records.
