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View from the Manse:

"How long will you judge unjustly and show partiality to the wicked? Give justice to the weak and the orphan; maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute. Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked." (Psalm 82: 2-4)

This week I went to the cinema to see a new film called 'Lion' which is based on an amazing true story. It was a brilliant film that had me weeping all the way through. I recommend that you take a good supply of tissues with you should you wish to go and see it! It is the story of a little boy (around 5 years old) who was raised in a loving family of mother, younger sister and older brother. The family lived in a remote and poverty stricken part of India. Through a series of unfortunate events the little boy ended up lost, thousands of miles away from his family and was eventually adopted by a loving Australian couple living in Tasmania. This could have been the happy ending. The boy was loved and well educated and living comfortably as Australian. However, as a young man in his twenties, the call back to his past life and family became an obsession that he could not shake off. The void left by his birth mother drove him to seek her out in the most impossible of circumstances. This film contained issues of poverty, both economic and social; of global inequalities; of society's treatment of children and more specifically orphans; and it also dealt with people's personal sense of spiritual lostness.

The 'Night Light Winter Shelter' will come to an end on the last day of February. They have been a huge success. They have been running since 1st December. It took a little while to build up relationships and trust amongst the street homeless community. However, since Christmas the shelters have been pretty busy. They have provided food, beds, entertainment, company and safety for up to fifteen street homeless for five nights a week. It has been hard work but it has also been very rewarding work. Since the shelters started, around six have moved on to more permanent housing and one has returned to work. Of the regular night shelter attendees we have noticed many looking healthier and several have reduced their intake of alcohol. It has been a privilege to journey with them over these three months and to learn more about the daily struggles and often chaotic circumstances of their lives. Amongst the street homeless the sense of spiritual lostness is often guite profound. We have been able to express the love of Jesus through offering this hospitality, to show in a tangible way that we, and Jesus, care about them.

The more I read the Gospels, the more I get a sense of Jesus calling us to minister to the least, the lost and the lowly. To the orphans, widows, poor and oppressed. What Jesus demonstrated to the world turned the world's expectations upside-down. The Pharisees, scribes and Sadducees, had studied and worked hard at maintaining spiritual holiness and ritual cleanliness, which often demanded separation from those in society regarded as sinners. Their quest for religious purity brought them respect and good standing in the community. Their role gave them status and security. But in their human desire for righteousness with God they seemed to have lost sight of love. Jesus put together the command of 'Loving the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your mind, with all your soul' with the law of 'loving your neighbour as yourself'. Jesus radically placed one alongside the other as the greatest commandments. Then Jesus taught that your neighbour was anyone you meet, especially when they need your help. Especially those neighbours who are among the least, the lost and the lowly in society. That is those who feel oppressed, lonely, isolated, voiceless, powerless or feel spiritually lost. Jesus showed that in the topsy-turvy world of the kingdom of God such folk are the ones that will become blessed

As we journey into the season of Lent let us be mindful of those whom the Lord wishes to bless. Perhaps rather than giving something up over Lent, as many do, we as a faith community could engage with the Christian Aid 'Count your blessings' Lent challenge....... 'Based on the beautiful hymn "When I needed a neighbour, were you there?", our Lent calendar Count Your Blessings guides you through to Easter with daily ways to give thanks for life's blessings. You'll find inspiring opportunities to give, act and pray for your global neighbours' (from the Christian Aid website). These are some of the neighbours that we can help through sponsorship, action and prayer. But there are many 'neighbours' around us every day within our community here that we need to bless too. Let us together seek out those who most need the love and the healing touch of Jesus. All of us have the ability to pray for our neighbours.

Prayer Focus

1 Cor. 1: 26-31 Brothers (and sisters) think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many...... But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong......

The year is gathering pace, it is Lent and will soon be Easter, spring and then it will be May, June and then the 'Who Cares' mission starts. With our fellow Christians in the town we will have the opportunity to help with the survey, to ask, listen and then hopefully be able to respond to friend or stranger in whatever way seems appropriate; words, actions, silence, a hug, a prayer or an invitation to coffee, Memory Tree, or an information event. I imagine for many of us the whole idea of this up front approach feels guite daunting; not our normal way of doing things. Yet we are called to be witnesses in a hurting world that does not now automatically come to the church for help, support and a different way of seeing things. Very many of us would, I am sure, love the folk we meet to share the joy, the assurance and the hope we have in knowing that the God of love loves us and so also loves everyone else too. It's not rocket science. You don't have to be clever, or eloquent, or be able to quote chapter and verse, to witness, we just have to say it as we know it.

When I was working at the hospital some years ago I had a patient, an elderly man who was physically frail and had dementia. The plan was for him to go home to live with family but he was very depressed and could see no positives in life. No amount of saying that his family loved him and wanted him home and that the hospital staff, who he had got to trust also felt it was the best possible option would sway him. I knew he needed to know someone cared. And I couldn't think of anything else to say, so I took a deep breath and said "There is someone who loves you" and he said quite belligerently "Who is that?" And I said "God loves you and sent his son" and waited expecting a derisory laugh or remark but instead he said quietly. "Yes, he suffered too didn't he?" With which it was as though someone had switched the light on in him. His whole demeanour changed and he became alert and positive. I nearly fell off my chair! The dementia didn't go away. The following morning he couldn't remember our conversation but his outlook

remained positive and every one could see the change. He went home a happy man. I wasn't in the habit of talking about my faith at work, unless someone raised the subject. I have to be honest, I didn't expect a positive response but it was all I had to give him. It was a real joy to see that man so changed.

That event really taught me a lesson. All I can give is what I have known of God's grace in my life, the rest is up to Him. We can't know all the answers but God does and he knows who he wants to bring us into contact with.

Can I encourage you this Lent to pray and think and ask God how he wants you to be a part of 'Who Cares?' It doesn't have to be lots, it can be a little. If you want to know more look out for more information or ask Kay or one of the Elders.

<u>Prayer</u> – Loving Lord Jesus, you know me, you love me and I would love others to know you too. Please give me the courage to share that knowledge with others, as you bring them into contact with me. Amen

The Night Shelter - for guests as they return to sleeping rough every night. Pray for their safety, health and that plans to meet their future needs may be formed and come to fruition.

Time to be as passionate about religion as they are about sports.

".....for many of us the anticipation of a new season of sport fills our thoughts and our conversation. We often hear it said "their sport is their religion!"

'That's an interesting thought. I have taken a little time to isolate five key attributes of people whose friends might suggest that sport is their religion. See if you agree.

- Those involved are enthusiastic and often raise their hands and voices.
- 2. They do not have to be pressured into attending. The Game (or "service") is a priority and other things take second place.
- 3. They part with money and are willing to travel as part of their "religious experience".
- 4. They really enjoy it especially if they win. But win or lose they will be back.
- 5. The meeting up with others who feel the same way is a very important part of the experience.

'We all know people whose life looks just like that in regards to a particular sport.

'But when we say "their sport is their religion" we are intimating that this is exactly what "God and real Christianity" should look like. Wow!

'Could it be that we humans are wired in such a way that we need something in our lives to incorporate those five attributes? Is it possible that rugby or football has become a religion because that basic need was not met in the "venues" that represented God? And if "God" and "Church" were presented differently - excellently and passionately - might people even change their religion?'
