In some ways it could be most depressing to look forward into 2023.

Why? Simply out of concern for those in our community who are struggling.

How would I, or you, face making the decision of whether to eat or to stay warm? Not a decision I would relish.

Those who care for our communities warn of the challenges to come: the old unable to stay warm; children going to school feeling hungry; those families unable to meet the rising costs of fuel and food. There is a growing dependence on Foodbanks and other organisations providing all kinds of help. These groups are overwhelmed and crying out for volunteers. Our own Hot Food Table has already had to close on a Friday because we don't have enough volunteers (we are trying to address this need), in fact we have become dependent on our Iranian friends who are working most days in the kitchen, trying to give something back to the society which has made them welcome.

As we begin the New Year we remember we have just celebrated Christ's birth, in that coming of the Christ Child we met with God, active in our lives and in our communities. As the carol says, 'God surprises earth with heaven, coming here on Christmas Day' Life is full of surprises!

When the Commonwealth Games were held in The City of Manchester Stadium (now The Etihad) in 2002, a piece of art work was commissioned to stand outside the stadium. This was in a very deprived area of Manchester. The art work was entitled 'The B of the Bang' and was based on a quotation from Linford Christie, the 100m runner, who famously said that athletes should be ready to run on the 'B of the Bang' (of the starting gun!). It was a great expression of the explosion of energy and the element of surprise. It evoked images of bursting out into new life and the feeling of hope at the beginning, on the 'B of the Bang! We are at the beginning! The beginning of a New Year.

Our God, a God of surprises, encourage us to be the B of the Bang in our shattered communities as we try to bring your love to our neighbours.

God of surprises, challenge us to be a part of the help and comfort that people need.

God of surprises, help us to be open to finding new ways to help those around us.

God of surprises, help us to see your way forward, into this New Year, so that we don't face it feeling depressed about the challenges, but rather, supported and strengthened by your presence in our lives, feeling enabled to be your face, your touch, your love to those we meet each day.

God,

go before us to light the way, go behind us to comfort and encourage, go with us; go with us.

Sadly, the 'B of the Bang' was deemed to be dangerous, bits of metal were falling off gradually and it was dismantled in 2009. It was sold for scrap metal! Maybe you can see a metaphor in its demise? Maybe, if we don't respond on the 'B' maybe our communities will continue to suffer??

Stamps

We have, for a number of years, collected stamps to raise funds for people affected by leprosy and Chris Ayland has forwarded them on to the Leprosy Mission. In the last couple of years, the value of stamps has greatly reduced. With the introduction of bar-coded stamps, stamp value has been further decreased. Sadly, it has got to the point where there is not really any money to be made in this area. So it is with regret that the Leprosy Mission have made the decision to wind down stamps and collectibles in line with many other charities. Used stamps will be collected by Chris for the Leprosy Mission until 31st March 2023.

With barcodes now being added to stamps, a reminder that after 31st January regular stamps without a barcode will no longer be valid. You can swap your regular stamps for barcoded stamps by completing a form and sending them to the Royal Mail. See <u>royalmail.com/barcodedstamps</u> for further details. Non-barcoded Christmas stamps and Special stamps (i.e. pictorial stamps issued to commemorate anniversaries or special events), will remain valid and do not need to be swapped.

SIGNPOSTS OF HOPE

An uplifting message for the new year from our interim minister, Josh Thomas.

Tom Wright recently wrote: 'This is a time for lament. For admitting we don't have easy answers. For refusing to use the crisis as a loudspeaker for what we'd been wanting to say in any

case. For weeping at the tomb of our friends...The initial calling of the church, first and foremost, is to take our place among the mourners... The call of Jesus' followers, then, as they confront their own doubts and those of the world through Jesus and behind locked doors, is to be sign-producers for God's kingdom.

We are to set up signposts – actions, symbols, not just words – which speak, like Jesus' signs, of new creation: of healing for the sick, of food for the hungry, and so on... For these tasks we will need the living presence of Jesus, and the powerful breath of his spirit. That is what we are promised.'

The amazing thing about a New Year is that we have just enjoyed Christmas in which we are given the opportunity to reflect on the story of Christ's birth and in particular this year the words of John chapter 1 – The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. No matter how bleak things feel – we have a hope for the future.

We are called to imitate the light that Christ brings to the world, to try and offer hope to those who otherwise feel hopeless, to set up those signposts which Tom Wright mentioned – We are called to serve our brothers and sisters and throughout the many crises we have seen in our world over the past twelve months from the war in Ukraine to the cost of living difficulties faced by so many, the evidence of people doing this in our local community has been outstanding. We are so fortunate to have a hope for this New Year and we have a real opportunity and responsibility to share that hope with those in our world. What opportunities might we take in 2023 to share the good news with those we meet? There is light and hopefulness on display in the actions of so many people and I am certainly praying for a more hopeful, joy filled 2023.
