### **From the (Reedham) Rectory.**

Peter received a weird card this week but he was absolutely delighted with it. It was from his son Christopher and all his family. It was a picture of a very old man and it said: 'Stripped of his youth, his energy and his money, Dad quietly reflected on the blessings of having children!' I'm sure many fathers will identify with that.

The card arrived because on Sunday it will be Fathers' Day. Father's Day doesn't have the long history and significance in the Church that Mothering Sunday does but it has been happening since 1910 in the United States and is now celebrated all over the world. Many countries, like the UK, hold it on the third Sunday in June. It is really a celebration of family life and a time to be in touch with those we love and appreciate, and to remember the Fathers we loved and are no longer with us. This year Father's day is on the Sunday after the Queen's official 90<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Bishop Graham, speaking about the Queen last week on Radio 4 said that there is such a warmth of admiration for her that even people who have never met her say they love her. The Bishop went on to say that in families we don't just inherit wealth or property but also traditions and stories that are passed down from generation to generation. Perhaps that is why the Royal Family is still so loved within our families. It is a family with which the people of our nation can identify.

The Royal Family, now four generations of them, living and working together, have not always had a smooth run. That is true of all families and perhaps it is comforting that it isn't just us. Families can give so much joy and happiness and, at the same time, there can be pain and distress within a family when it does not work well together. What is important is that we remain together as a family, keeping in touch and respecting and loving one another.

The family is no longer what we used to call the 'nuclear' family of Mum and Dad and two children. Today's families come in all shapes and sizes. There are many single parent families and lots of mixed families where step brothers and sisters learn to live together. Even our Royal Family have a mixed family nowadays. What is important is that, however the family is made up, we all do our best to get on and love one another.

The family of God is much the same. Mostly it sails along very happily, but sometimes there are difficulties and divisions, as there are at the moment in the wider church about several topical issues. The important thing is that, like all families, we continue to respect and love one another whatever our differences.

This Sunday I will be conducting a baptism on Father's Day which will welcome someone into the family of the Church and we will sing a lovely hymn. Here is my favourite verse from it:

*Father, I place into your hands, my friend and family.  
 Father, I place into your hands the things that trouble me  
 Father, I place into your hands the person I would be  
 For I know I always can trust you.*

We need to seek God's grace sometimes in living peaceably with our families but it is always worth it. I hope your Father's Day was a good day either to be together or to remember.

## **God's Acre**

Churchyards are special places – and we've eleven of them in our benefice!

A churchyard provides the setting for a church. While modern developments reflect the packed nature of contemporary life, our church buildings need space from which to speak of a God who offers (and asks for) spaciousness and time. That the churchyard forms the curtilage of a historic building lies behind some of the restrictions on what can be done or placed there; and the fact that it is the Chancellor of the Diocese (a judge appointed by the Bishop) who makes the rules and has the final say, not the Rector!

Most churchyards provide a resting place for the mortal remains of the faithful, gathered around the place of worship. Together, living and departed members of the Church look to Christ, the resurrection and the life. When membership of the Church could no longer be assumed, churchyard burial grounds became more of a community facility – a role widely retained in rural areas, where there is often no secular cemetery provision. Nevertheless, the Christian character of a churchyard is of continuing value – perhaps especially to those whose faith is hesitant – and needs to be respected. A churchyard is also about community more than individuality: whereas in a cemetery it can seem as though "anything goes", in a churchyard the desires of individual mourners need to be balanced with those of other bereaved families and other churchyard users.

And plenty of people other than mourners do come. Some will be visiting the church; for others the churchyard itself offers the experience they seek. Churchyards provide public space of a certain reverential quality. Often the experience will be of a haven of peace; or a sense of history: family lineage or the continuity of a community. But

community events, like church fêtes or Acle’s Farmers’ Market are not out of place: churchyards are places for the living as well as the dead.

“The living” includes plenty of non-human life. While surrounding land has increasingly been built upon or farmed ever more intensively, churchyards have remained undeveloped, unploughed and generally free of chemical inputs – and so have become oases for wildlife. The management regime is important, though. While some people’s expectations derive from garden lawns, churchyards support the most wildlife if maintained as they used to be: like a hay meadow, with a cut-and-rake after plants have flowered and set seed.

Responsibility for maintenance rests with the Parochial Church Council; and has to take its place alongside the other demands on voluntary income. When churchyards were managed mainly by volunteers (or the Rector’s sheep!) burial fees were not set at a level to provide intensive maintenance in perpetuity. Now, commercial contractors often have to be used – and strimming round graves is more labour-intensive than mowing a lawn! Increasingly, churches are dependent on grants gratefully received from Parish Councils – but even these do not always meet the full cost or the expectations of parishioners.

Churchyards are special places. They are valuable in many different ways: ways which often complement each other, but sometimes conflict. So be mindful of the needs of others – and remember, above all, it is God’s acre!

We now need to tidy up Spring flowering perennials and shrubs. Aubretia and alyssums need trimming back, as flowers for next year are produced on new growth. Shrubs, such as forsythia and other May/early June examples, need the same treatment, followed by a sprinkling of fertiliser.

Leeks and celery can be planted out, just make a hole with a dibber for leeks, put in the plant and fill the hole with water. Celery needs to go in a trench.
