Dear Parishioners

For those who are familiar with the plans for All Saints, Beighton, at last we are able to bring you some further news on the major project for our Grade I Listed parish church. If this is the first newsletter you have seen on the subject, a brief account of what the project does entail:



The nave roof thatch needs completely replacing and a number of the trusses and2 scissor-brace beams need repairing or possibly replacing.

This will entail erecting scaffolding inside and out so the roof can be accessed and whilst this is in place it seemed logical to include in the project work needed on the higher level (clerestory) windows. Inside, on the south aisle wall there are large areas of plaster which need attention. The church council also felt it was time to upgrade facilities in the church (of which there are none at present) so an accessible toilet is planned for what is currently the vestry and a kitchen server added to the west corner of the north aisle. To make room for the kitchen and create more space for entertaining a number of pews will be removed and relocated where possible to replace those with worn and worm-eaten seats.

Because of the size of the project, the Heritage Lottery Fund ('HLF') was approached for grant aid and funding secured to develop the project. This entailed the architect, Matthew Thomas, submitting a report on the condition of the roof along with draft scheme drawings for the improvements and written specifications to encompass the full scope of the work along with specialist reports on the glazing, possible wall paintings and surface water drainage. A copy of the roof report is available to view in the church along with draft plans.

It took a long time for Historic England (acting on behalf of the HLF) to accept that a more detailed beam-by-beam report would not be possible until scaffolding was in place. A cherry-picker was out of the question due to access difficulties. Meanwhile, the drawings and written specification which had also been submitted to the Diocesan Advisory Council ('DAC')



met with some disapproval.
Although the DAC had
expressed broad approval of
the project, the devil was in the
detail so to speak. Finally, in
late January this year, approval
of the detailed specification
and reports was received from
the HLF together with informal

agreement by the DAC. This meant Matthew was at last able to invite itemised tenders from suitable builders and specialists. One crucial factor in all this was the deadline of 30th March 2017 to get all the development work done and the application submitted to HLF for the second ('delivery') phase grant based on the lowest tenders. Had the deadline been missed, we would have had to start from scratch with our bid. Thankfully, we made it and the application is now with the HLF awaiting their decision which should be made in mid-June. Somewhat

crucially, the most competitive combination of tenders and specialists quotes was significantly higher than the figures forecast by Historic England on which the in-principal grant offer for the delivery of the work was based.

HOW MUCH WILL THE PROJECT COST?

The project as a whole was estimated to cost £175,843 in total, split into two phases: Development and Delivery. The development phase was completed at 30 March, budgeted at £22,220. This figure was achieved as shown in the table:

Of the £1,715 to be raised locally for this phase we reached £1,633 which was a real achievement.

The actual work comes under the Delivery phase which we hope to start in late 2017. The Heritage Lottery Fund will not give permission for work to start, however, until all the funding is in place. We also have to work around the presence of bats roosting in the church and the Bat Conservation Trust has advised work should be carried out between mid-September and late March. The estimated costs for this stage were £153,623 whereas the combined most competitive tenders came in at £194,307, the main increase being on the nave roof scaffolding and timber repairs. It is anticipated this figure will be achieved by the following means:

Getting down to brass tacks (as the saying goes). Looking at the table on page 4 you will note that the anticipated amount to be contributed by the church council is £8,468. At present, we have £1,400 in the Fabric Fund which will be used for the project. This may be added to during the year but we have to maintain normal running costs which total around £5,500. Therefore the parish needs to raise the balance of £7,000. Whilst the events planned will hopefully raise quite a large proportion of this, we must also appeal to the very generous nature of everyone residing in the parish and beyond to help us meet this target. It is a lot of money but in very simple terms: if 100 people gave £70 each that would crack it. Of course, not everyone can afford such an amount and please be assured that whatever you can give it will make a difference overall and will be very gratefully received. Just imagine the end result – a fully accessible, heated, flush loo and no drafts from the growing holes in the thatch and the rusty clerestory windows that can't be shut tight!
